U.S. Winning Cold War Vital Middle Eastern Area

ALBANY, N.Y., Nov. 22 (AP)—Soviet victory in the cold war in the Middle East is being won by the United States, according to a leading American statesman today.

"Time is running out for the west in the Arab world," a leading middle eastern statesman told me. "Soon it may be too late to save the Moslems from the Kremlin's death grip."

Andrei V. Vishinsky, Soviet foreign minister, did not even mention the middle east in his opening address to the U. N. assembly. Nor has there been much comment on the middle east in the Soviet press.

But the Russians are racing against time in an effort to exploit the nationalist upsurge in the Arab world, especially the chaotic situation in Iran and Egypt.

According to communist ideology, national revolts in colonial countries are a prelude to "proletarian revolutions."

Stalin, who considers himself a specialist on "colonial questions," strongly upheld this view in his later quarrel with the late Leon Trotsky.

Thus, communist agents—from Tehran to Casablanca—are today preaching a holy war "against Islam" and its middle eastern "outpost"—Israel.

The majority of Moscow's embassies in the Arab countries are Soviet citizens of Moslem origin. They work hand-in-hand with pro-fascist and rabidly pro-nationalist Moslem fanatics, including the ex-mufti of Palestine and the legendary Rifthan rebel leader, Abd el-Krim. They also have unlimited support of pro-Russians working inside the Arab League.

Much significance is attributed in U. N. circles to a call for a holy war recently issued by the Imam of

Calat's Al Hussein Mosque. The Imam's "prayer" was relayed in a nationwide broadcast by the official radio Cairo.

At the same time, the Russians also are reported to have intensified their military activity along the Soviet-Turkish border.

A Polish infantry division and Czech armored units have been shifted to the Iranian frontier during the month of October, according to Polish underground military sources.

The Moslem anti-western nationalist revolt, which began in Iran and then spread to Egypt, threatens to engulf French North Africa where the North Atlantic Treaty Organization has vital air bases.

Both Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and the state department have voiced support of the legitimate aims of the Arabs. But under strong Anglo-French pressure the U. S. has been forced to abandon its pro-Arab position.

WASHINGTON—Million Eisenhower has told friends at Washington and elsewhere that his more famous brother, General Eisenhower, did not discuss politics with any of his associates or personal friends at his luncheon conference with President Truman. The two men were together at a secret conference at the White House mentioned no military problems un-til Blair House waters had left the state room.

AN ENDLESS WAR?

For exactly one-fourth of a year we have been endeavoring to negotiate a truce with the communists in the manner of which was this most close to a record but it has not appeared to bring us too much closer to the goal we seek—a real end to the fighting.

All times speculation has ranged the gamut from the belief the Reds do indeed want a truce to the conviction that their current table game is nothing but another tactic in the war itself.

The weight of evidence leans toward support of those who feel the communists would like to halt the conflict, or at least transfer it to the political arena. Their losses of men and material are well known. They have grudgingly loosened their grip on a fat slice of red territory. The glut reports of their future are read in every capital.

Today their enterprise in limited aggression does not stand high. It has not paid the hoped-for dividends. Worse, it is a burden and a handicap.

All this is beyond the realm of opinion. Yet there can be no proof that the communist negotiators are honestly seeking truce. The dogged persistence with which they deflect the negotiations into side paths just when they seem headed for decisive progress is bound to stir doubts.

Lately correspondents have been refreshing our minds on the reds' cynical use of the truce in their against the Chinese nationalists. The same again is being dangled invitingly in front of the nationalistic eyes, but always the carrot turned out to be booby-trapped. The communists simply seized the chance afforded by the lull to build up for another attack.

If this is the pattern of the communists' policy, the supporting evidence is not so easy to discern. Our military leaders do report a build-up on the communist side. But they are emphatic in declaring it insufficient to sustain an effective assault against our forces.

Perhaps the spring will see more fevered preparation for attack, though everything suggests such a purpose must necessarily hinge on the generous aid from Russia than the Chinese and North Koreans have yet had.

It could be, however, that winning all Korea by force of arms is no longer within the scope of communist aims. Their present goals may be checked by the attempt to keep the United States and its U. N. allies deeply mired in the mud of indecisive battle. Statesmen obviously can tie up our forces as thoroughly as smashing offensive warfare.

And the Reds may always hope that time will destroy the patience of the American people, compelling us either to strike harder—in dangerous disregard of other vital fronts—or to settle on terms which might give the communists politically what they could not gain by arms.

If you rule out the likelihood of a genuine truce, as many are doing, then our dilemma is a great one. Anyone who pretends otherwise is dogging reality. Conflict with communists is like no other of our modern wars. Its terms are many, its rules are new with each day. And possibly it is endless.

TYPICAL TRUMAN

It's not unusual for President Truman to go off the deep end with his impulsive letter writing and impetuous inventiveness. But in making his recent forecast that the Republicans "will attempt to buy the presidency with excessive political expenditures next year," he made himself thoroughly ridiculous.

Why should Mr. Truman, either as a highly partisan individual, or as President of the United States, criticize anyone or any party for the amount of money spent on winning political elections?

He's the last person in the United States in any position to point the finger of suspicion—at anyone else.

Even if money he and his administration have thrown away to build up the political machine in the history of the United States—a bureaucracy sprawling beyond the average individual's comprehension—would dwarf anything the Republican party might spend in seeking to break up the political dynasty which has held the controlling hands in this country for approximately 20 years.

Much as we dislike to use the word, the President's prediction that the Republicans will attempt to buy the presidency with "excessive expenditures" is the height of "nuts."

Students Aid Sale of Christmas Seals; Work, Goal Outlined Here by Chairman

Of the \$3,031.19 collected in Twin Falls county from the sale of 1950 Christmas seals by the Tuberculosis association, about \$800 was raised from the sale of seals through students in county schools.

Each year, students purchase and sell seals. The seals are distributed to principals under the direction of Miss Doris Stradley, county superintendent of schools. Mrs. Stradley receives her seals directly from the association office at Boise.

Proceeds are coming in already from 80 envelopes mailed to Twin Falls residents over the week-end, according to Mrs. J. O. Pumpfrey, county secretary and chairman of the city drive. Between 50 and 100 envelopes have been returned with contributions.

Urging people to take advantage of the free chest X-rays being given in the city and county, Mrs. Pumpfrey points out the many benefits of the funds collected from Christmas seals, 50 per cent of which remains in the county for local use.

For the most part, funds are contributed by nurses at the south central Idaho district health unit. Nurses and other persons there command needy families where

greater supply of milk will help prevent development of the disease, in most cases, these families have had individual cases of tuberculosis or are suspects.

Under recommendation of public health nurses and other health unit officials, cod liver oil tablets are furnished for families where tuberculosis is suspected and transportation and medical treatment are made available to needy victims. The money provides film for the portable X-ray at the health unit in order that examinations may be given at low cost for food handlers. Periodic X-rays are given in families where there has been tuberculosis, Mrs. Pumpfrey says.

In the words of the founder of Christmas seal sales in the United States, Emily Blosell, "household who had no hope, have it now."

The battle to control, prevent and ultimately conquer tuberculosis is not a "doctor's affair," according to Mrs. Pumpfrey. It belongs to the entire public and all can help by buying and using Christmas seals.
