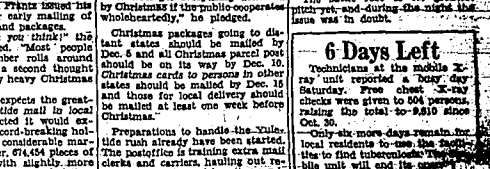

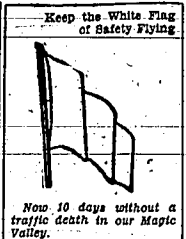

The Soviet government announced today these new aggressive designs which are embodied in the establishment of a middle east command in regions close to the boundaries of the USSR, the note said.

The state department said tonight in Washington that the note had been received here and that the Russian charges against the middle east command plan "are nonsense."  
"The proposed middle east command is strictly defensive in character and will be fully in accordance with the United Nations charter," declared Press Officer Gurnea.

While said that if and when the United States decides to make a formal reply to Russia, it will consult with the British, French and Turkish governments on the content of the reply.

On the other hand, there is no denying that people building new homes in the same vicinities may find animals and fowl objectionable, to the point they'll put up a fight.

To our way of thinking, the only solution to this problem is by as much of a compromise as possible, in which all the parties involved agree to give and take.

And any such compromise, obviously approached as the result of these conditions, always go hand in hand with progress of the country over, should be based upon such fundamentals as public health and public nuisance.

These fundamentals, in turn, should be determined according to law and in keeping with accepted practices elsewhere, instead of by personal feelings, resentments and other approaches which will get no one anywhere.

Perhaps, for an intervening several years, both sides of this controversy could make concessions in good faith. In this manner, time itself may provide the solution as is often the case in the normal evolution of things always associated with municipal growth.

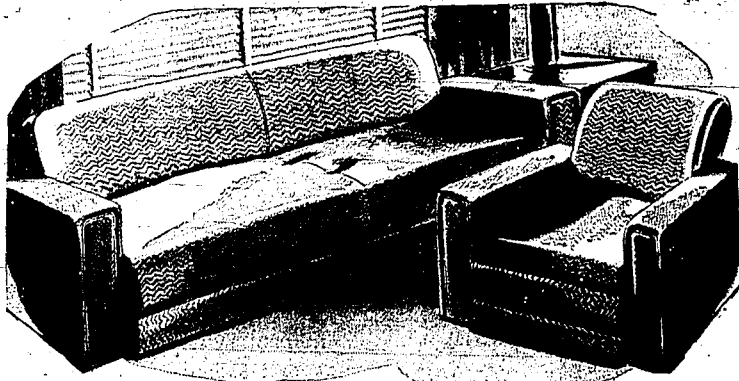

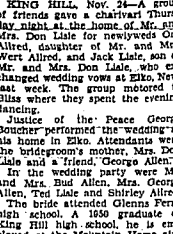

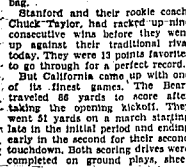

Mrs. C. T. Connelley, executive secretary of the Red Cross, said no date has been set for moving her office pending completion of plans by the engineering department.

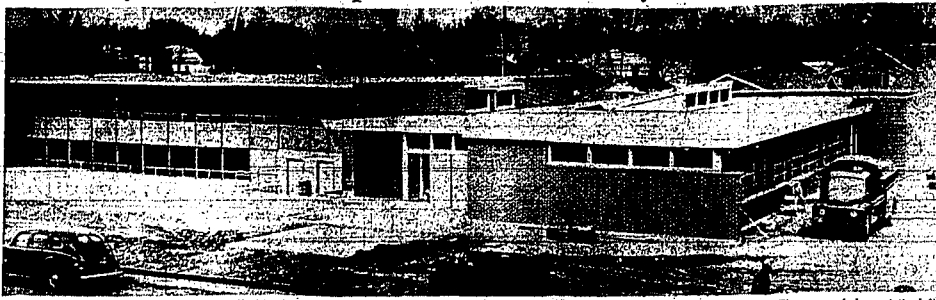

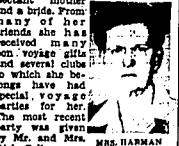

George E. Denman, head of state reorganization, and transportation in schools, discussed the reorganization problem. W. M. Swartley, Piler, county school board member, is district president and John M. Barker, Buhl, school board member, is secretary of the state group, also attended the meeting.

Among the problems which the delegates suggested for consideration by the legislature are higher local tax levies for schools, better

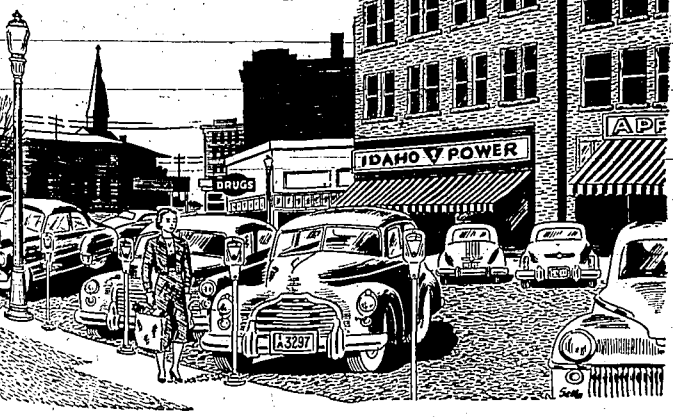

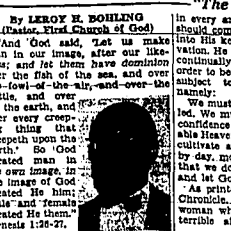
