

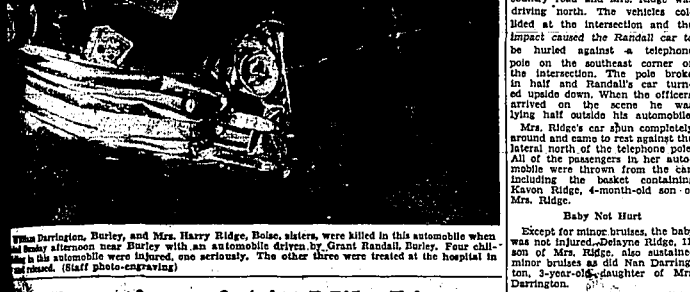
Rural Intersection Crash in Cassia County Snuffs Out Lives of Two Sisters

TWIN FALLS, Nov. 26—Two more traffic deaths, the 99th and 40th for Magic Valley so far this year, were added to the automobile fatality roster Sunday afternoon. The sisters, both in their 30's, died as a result of a crash at a rural intersection at 2:10 p. m. Sunday two miles west and one mile south of Burley. Henry Ridge, 31, Boise, and Mrs. William Darrington, 34, Burley, were killed almost instantly. With them in the automobile were two children of each woman. One of the children, Bruce Darrington, 1-year-old, is in "fair" condition at the Cottage hospital in Burley. Grant Randall, 42, Burley, the driver of the other automobile, also is in "fair" condition at the hospital.

Another Valley Crash Claims Two Lives

The deaths are Cassia county's fifth and sixth for the year. The score in Cassia county at this time last year was seven while the score for the entire valley was 37.

Probing Crash
According to Sheriff Saul Clark and Assistant Chief W. W. Lowery, who are investigating the crash, Randall was driving west on a country road and Mrs. Ridge was driving north. The vehicles collided at the intersection and the impact caused the Randall car to be hurled against a telephone pole on the southeast corner of the intersection. The pole broke in half and Randall's car turned upside down. When the officers arrived on the scene, he was lying half outside his automobile. Mrs. Ridge's car spun completely around and came to rest against the lateral north of the telephone pole. All of the passengers in her automobile were thrown from the car, including the basket containing seven-year-old, 4-month-old son of Mrs. Ridge.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (U-P)—The navy's "Panther" jet fighter, which has been outdistanced by Russian-built MiGs in Korea, may be given sweptback wings to boost its speed, it was learned today.

Naval aviation experts are studying the conversion plan for one of the navy's fastest carrier aircraft. The project is under wraps and the navy will not say how far it has progressed.

With straight wings, the Grumman F9F-5 Panther is listed as having a speed of more than 600 miles an hour and a flying range of more than 1,500 miles. Sweptback wings, designed for the MiG-16, presumably would increase the plane's speed.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—The final elimination of General Eisenhower as a Democratic presidential possibility by the House today was a blow that struck more directly to Chief Justice Fred Vinson of the supreme court's seemingly insignificant incident of a literary rather than a political conclusion.

There recently appeared an article in the Washington Post by Charles Evans Hughes, one of Vinson's most prominent predecessors, by Mario Pusey, an enemy of the chief justice on the Washington Post.

The distinguished jurist selected Pusey for the last and the two volume work is based on close personal collaboration, as well as on a vast amount of notes, memos and other papers Hughes turned over to the author.

RECOMMENDATION—In describing the presidential procedure for filling the vacancy caused by the death of the late President Roosevelt, Vinson consulted Hughes. Based on his talks with the late chief justice, Pusey adds that Hughes recommended Chief Justice Robert H. Jackson, New York, for the position.

The recommendation was quite logical, according to Vinson. Hughes had, in fact, had some same keen, cold, metallic mind Hughes did. They had served together on the court, and, like Hughes, Jackson was hard-working and a conscientious member of the court.

He never shared his job, as did the late Frank Murphy, who, as the late Justice Charles E. Clark wrote, "was the only Justice who tried to avoid work and handle only the easy cases."

VERSION—But when President Truman was asked why he rejected the Hughes suggestion, appointing Vinson instead of Jackson, he bracketed, grew red and said, "I would not have done that." Hughes, but he repudiated the Pusey version. He said the late chief justice had recommended Vinson.

Truman had served in the district of Columbia, and never had judicial association with Hughes, who was known to be a legal and judicial scholar.

BUILDUP—Among millions of Americans who do not know from experience that President Roosevelt include in "white lists," however, or that their memory of the names of the men who were in the line of their man-killing assignment, Mr. Truman's account of the incident may gain credence. Relatively few know that the late chief justice, however, the Truman rebuttal from his newspaper.

Toymakers Keep Pace With Progress In Their New Products for 1951 Yule

NEW YORK (UPI)—Santa Claus in collaboration with toy designers and manufacturers, is getting ready to deliver a whole batch of new and different toys for Christmas. It's enough to make any parent turn gray just thinking about it.

In his sack this year are items that will (1) give kids grow-up ideas; (2) make lots of new noises; and (3) create revolutionary types of mess around the house. All this is not calculated to bring peace at home and good-will toward Santa.

There is, for example, a new game. It is pegged on the idea of inflation. Included is a generous supply of toy money, with bills up to and including \$100,000. After an afternoon playing with these, a child is apt to sneer at his allowance.

There are two interesting new dolls. One has hair that can be dyed any color, then washed out under the bathroom faucet, the very thing for an impressionable little girl. Another doll has a knob on her head. You twist it and she can put on three facial expressions, just like a Hollywood actress.

To wheel the doll around in, there's a new carriage upholstered in fake leopard skin. Reminds daughter of the fancy car daddy hasn't got.

About the noisiest thing on Santa's list this season is a new set for boys who are fascinated by the radio. It's a sound effects kit, and can make all kinds of nice, loud noises.

There are also dozens of musical instruments—over a toy either—and a new child-sized tap recorder. Now the kids can make a racket—and they'll be back in an hour later.

Realism, in toys for girls, has reached new heights. There is a toy stove, complete with pots and pans, that actually cooks with a tiny heating element. To go with it is a baking set. It has everything needed to turn out different kinds of cakes and cookies. But it is very modern—it's all done with cake mixes.

After she bakes the cake, the young cook can clean up with another new toy. It has all the equipment for fly housekeeping—dish drainer, soap, mop, garbage pail, scouring powder—and all scaled down to size.

There's a new mechanical toy called for boys which can build complicated machinery. The box says it contains "the component mechanical parts for building working models of basic mechanisms and machines." Try that on your 5-year-old on Christmas morning.

Another delightfully messy number is a make-up kit which transforms any boy into a clown. It has fake noses and hair and glasses and lots of gray make-up in colors that will go well on your wallpaper. In the same frightening mold is a shoe shine kit with real polish.

For economy's sake, the toy men have come up with some double-duty toys. There's one rubber doll that connects a big rubber ball. And there's a western costume outfit. Turn the pants and the jacket inside out and put on another headpiece and it's an Indian outfit. Or just turn one part inside out and the kid can be a half-breed.

The trends in toys this season are still in two directions—the western trend, which has swept over into playthings for girls, and the trend toward modern things. In that category, almost all doll houses are ranch-type, and the old-fashioned forms of jack staws has come out in a new version. Now it's electrified.

Jordan Indicates Request for Tax Cut Depends on Revenue

BOISE, Nov. 26 (UP)—Gov. Len Jordan would like to see the state ad valorem tax reduced, but he said it is "too early" to say if he'd recommend it to the 1953 legislature in view of anticipated lower income tax revenues.

The governor said reduction of the state ad valorem tax is an "admirable goal."

The Associated Taxpayers of Idaho has recommended that the property tax be abolished on the state level in view of the increasing levy on local government levels. The state ad valorem tax has produced \$2,000,000 annually since 1945.

The governor said the increased federal income tax, smaller business profits throughout the state and virtual elimination of punchboard revenue in Idaho will take a "sizeable chunk" of the state's income.

State Tax Collector F. O. Nelli has estimated the federal income tax cuts, effective Nov. 1, will result in a loss of \$250,000 to \$500,000 of Idaho's income-tax revenue.

"Profit margins are narrowing throughout the state, especially among businessmen," the governor noted. "This decreased profit will be reflected in lower income tax revenue for the state."

He commented that "it looks like the new federal tax on punchboards will virtually eliminate the punchboard business."

Funchboard license fees and stamps bring in about \$600,000 a year into the state treasury.

Seek Help

The group left Hester in Summit county Friday with light camping equipment on a hike to "this is the place" monument on the foothills east of Salt Lake City.

When it began to snow early Saturday Salt Lake county sheriff's officers were alerted by friends of the Scouts that they might be in trouble. Officers started to look for the group and met Pierson early Saturday night.

Others Join

At that point more than 30 high-way patrolmen, sheriff's deputies, and other persons joined in the rescue operation. Two deputized hikers into the area on snowshoes and found the youngsters huddled around a fire. They informed the radio of their location and a rotary plane was dispatched into the area.

The youths had frost bite, but their cases were not termed "serious."

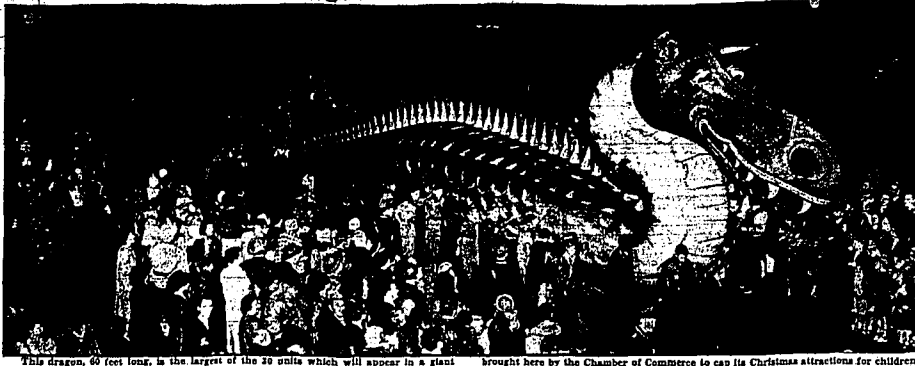

Doctor Asked for Clinical Tests of New Cancer Drug

CHICAGO, Nov. 23 (AP)—The trustees of the University of Illinois have asked Dr. Andrew C. Ivy, a vice president of the school, to intensify his clinical tests on the effects of the controversial cancer drug, krebiozen.

The Chicago Medical society found Ivy guilty Nov. 13 of "unethical" conduct for his promotion of the drug. Ivy was suspended from the society for three months.

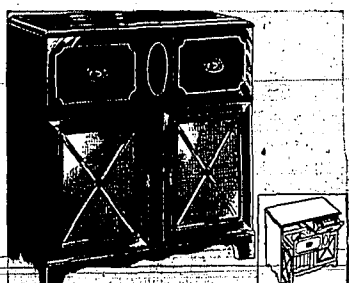

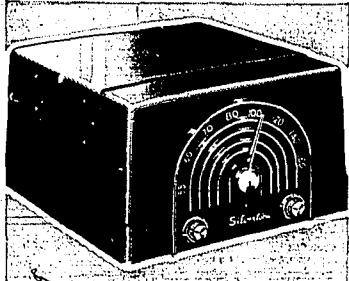
