from state or federal aid. Text of this letter is:
"As you may know, several county boards of health have been dissolved with the methods of the state health department for several years, and this feeling seems to be spreading by a number of prominent civic and political leaders.
Meeting Called
The situation finally became so serious that a meeting was called by commissioners from the Boise and Magic Valley areas was recently held to discuss this problem and to try to find a solution. At this meeting, these questions in particular were brought up and discussed:
"1. Can we continue to cooperate with the state health department? Should we withdraw from the organization of the state health department be changed and continue the cooperative working arrangement in force?"
Accord Reached
Answers in general were as follows:
"1. Most of the men present felt there is little chance of continuing under present conditions. The concept of government, the political and economical philosophy and the attitude of the public and the local people that it was agreed there would be no real meeting of minds."
"2. At first thought, this appeared to be the simplest and best solution. But since the local health workers have insisted there should be some connection between state and county offices in order to give the people those services they want and are willing to pay for, the matter becomes complicated."
"3. It is recognized that local boards of health have no authority in the appointment or dismissal of the director of public health and that what happens in the state is the state's none of our affair. We know we have lost control of local affairs under the administration of the state health department and that we do not feel such a situation enables us to properly discharge our responsibilities to our people. We think the present cooperative arrangement would work in this state office and, if a really business-like group administered it."
The letter closes with an expression of regret for adding to the governor's problems and a request as soon as possible. Commissioners said no officials have been received, although sources close to the governor indicate he is under great pressure from other problems.
