

# 1951 Revenue Law Discussed At Tax Parley

BOISE, Dec. 9.—The revenue law of 1951 came under discussion today at the third annual Idaho state tax conference.

William C. Chaffin, director of the Washington tax bureau of the Research Institute of America, was the principal speaker at the first day of the tax meeting.

An increase in the capital gains tax was recommended by Chaffin. Jacob Haskin, New York university law school professor, also spoke.

Discussing the tax problems of the future, Chaffin said that the senate tax committee had approved the breakup of corporations into smaller units for legitimate business purposes.

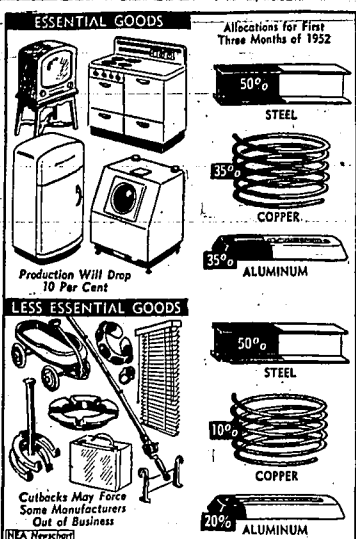

# Survey Shows Use of Fluorine in T.F. Water Would Cut Tooth Decay in Half

Fluoridation of water here would cut in half the rate of decay in children's teeth, according to a preliminary report on a dental survey conducted here Oct. 26.

The complete analysis of the survey findings was given to local dentists Tuesday noon at a meeting in the log-cabin hotel dining room, by Dr. W. O. Young, Boise, director of the state department of public health. The complete report also has been given to city officials.

Before describing the survey results, Dr. Young said it has been proved in the last 10 years that children drinking water with a fluorine content have much less dental decay. He said it has been found the maximum reduction of decay occurs when the water contains one part fluorine per million parts of water. Twin Falls water has one-half that amount, Dr. Young said.

He said the survey was made to determine what added benefits would be brought by the local fluorine concentration to one part per million. The survey was made by local dentists in cooperation with the school system. Parent-Teacher associations and public health nurses from the south central district health unit.

Dr. Young said the survey showed the general condition of Twin Falls children's teeth is good. All elementary school pupils were examined in the survey, but the findings were analyzed only from those who have lived here continuously.

The rate of decay for local children was found to be one-half that of the rate in towns with no fluorine in the water is one and one-half teeth per year and the rate in St. Paul, which has slightly more than the recommended amount of fluorine, is one-fifth tooth per year.

Dr. Young said fluoridation of the local water supply would not be extremely expensive and would result in fewer cavities, fewer teeth extracted and a lower dental bill.
