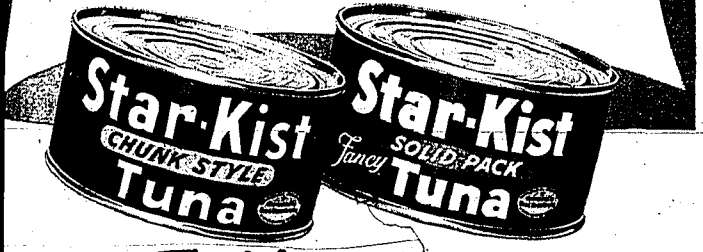

### Local Telephones Double in 10 Years As Population Increases 48 Per Cent

The past 10 years saw a population increase in Twin Falls, Idaho, which was much more rapid than that of the Mountain States Telephone company. The population grew from 11,000 in 1941 to more than 17,000 in 1951, a gain of 55.5 per cent. The telephone growth hasn't kept up with the population increase. The city is striving to bring about a doubling of the number of telephones in the next few years. The result, according to Dolling, is that since World War II, the demand for telephone service in Twin Falls has been the greatest in history, and the company has invested more money to provide service here than at any time in history.

### Court Upholds State Decision For Boice Case

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 6 (AP)—The ninth U.S. court of appeals has upheld a \$50,000 damage judgment awarded Dr. Edward H. Boice, San Benito, Tex., against the Bradley Mining company, San Francisco. The three-man court split 2-1 in affirming the decision of the federal district court at Boise on Sept. 20, 1949, that Dr. Boice was the victim of slander and false imprisonment. A district court jury found the company responsible for an incident that took place in May, 1948, at the company town of Siltwater, Idaho, where Dr. Boice was superintendent of the hospital. At the trial it was held that company officials said Dr. Boice was insane and had committed an illegal abortion. Dr. Boice was discharged after he operated on a woman for cancer and found a fetus unborn after the birth. The jury also found that the officials ordered armed guards around the doctor's apartment. The affirmative opinion was given by Homer T. Bone, Tacoma, Wash., and William Healy, Boise, Idaho. Judge Walter L. Pope, Missouri, Mont., in the minority opinion wrote that a "very thin case has here been whipped into a monster."

### Farming Costs Zooming, University Expert Says

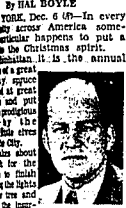
MOSCOW, Dec. 6 (AP)—Don't blame the farmer for your high grocery bill; it's costing him a lot more to produce those groceries, says Don A. Marshall, agricultural economist at the University of Idaho. Marshall says that for the nation as a whole, farm production costs are two and a third times what they were 12 years ago and probably will go even higher. He predicts a further increase of about five per cent next year. He listed these increases in farmers' costs: Livestock and labor, four times where they were 14 years ago; seed, up 220 per cent over 1941; farm machinery, up 200 per cent; and building and fencing materials, up 250 per cent above 12 years ago. In the past year, he said, farm machinery prices went up about 10 per cent, and building supplies and fencing materials, 21 per cent. He expects the farm labor supply to be smaller and somewhat higher-priced next year.

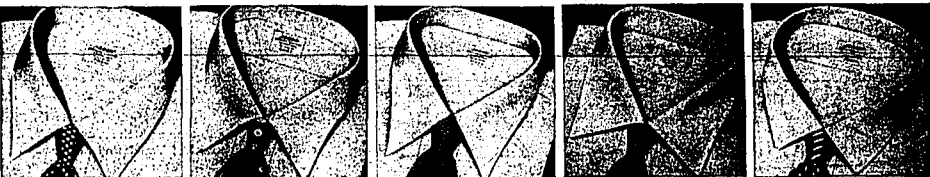

### Forest Blaze Loses Heavy In Past Year

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—About 1,000,000 board feet of federal forest timber through to build nearly 100,000 homes, went up in smoke this year.

The forest service estimated today that 6,233 fires burned over 42,123 acres of timber and livestock range and cost the government \$25,000,000 worth of resources on federal land.

M. M. Nelson, assistant chief of the forest service fire control division, said a report for 1949 was "one of the worst years in the past few decades, from a loss standpoint.

Could he be better?

Millions of dollars could be added to the loss total as a result of fire on state and private land, for which estimates are available.

Drought in the far west and southwest has made it easier for fires to spread through timber stands, and kept about 10,000 fire fighters busy in the area.

The number of fires this year—9,248—is not unusually large. There were 9,216 last year, with an average of 9,500 in the preceding four years. This year's burned acreage, however, is considerably larger than the 319,403 last year and 219,121 average in 1949-50.

The \$26,000,000 billion-board-foot loss is much greater than during any other recent year. The loss in 1950 was \$2,500,000 more than in 1949, and \$4,000,000 more than in 1948.

Plains played southern California, which had its seventh successive year of dry weather in the worst in more than a century.

The plains forest was so dry in August that a fire in the river canyon, over 14,000 acres and traveled 16 miles in one night.

**Federal Tax Cuts State Liquor Take**  
BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP)—The new federal tax on distilled spirits and wines will take an extra heavy bite out of liquor sales revenues this year, State Liquor Dispensary Superintendent A. M. Dyer said today.

Dyer said the state would have to dig up \$371,500 to cover taxes on alcoholic beverages held in the various state liquor stores and warehouses.

Dyer also revealed that the new liquor price list as of Dec. 1 reflected the selling "prices" of all items as set by the office of price stabilization for the state.

"In computing these prices, each item has been figured on the same basis or marked to be the same as previously used," Dyer said. "This method has changed the price relationship in some commodities because of the break of five cents or multiple thereof."

**New OPS Rules Help Businessmen**  
BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP)—Small business operators were given good news today by the district office of price stabilization.

OPS District Director Harry Yost said the agency was adopting two moves to simplify price control for small businesses. In the first, the Seattle regional OPS staff was authorized by national headquarters to set up ceiling prices for newly-opened business centers. All such new price ceilings had to be approved in the nation's capital.

The second order, also affecting the Seattle office, gives it authority to aid service businesses by granting justified ceiling price adjustments. These also had to be approved by the national OPS office before the new order was issued.

**State Still Leads In Silver Output; Mine Dip Noted**  
BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP)—Although the number of active Idaho mines has decreased about 10 per cent, Idaho still ranks first in silver production, second in lead and zinc and has the position as the nation's top tungsten producer.

This was disclosed in U. S. bureau of mine statistics for 1950. Harry Marsh, secretary of the Idaho Mining association, said.

The 155 active mines in the state in 1950 compared with 171 in 1949.

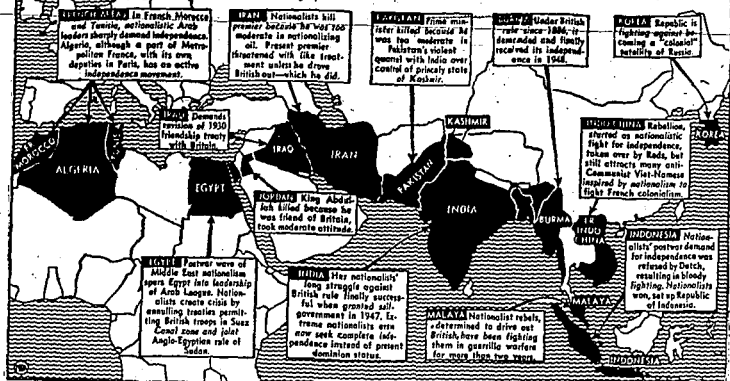
Production of the Bradley mine at Summit was responsible for the state's tungsten lead. The Coeur d'Alene area accounted for 84 per cent of the state's silver, and 60 per cent of the gold came from the Yellowstone mine at Summit.

Idaho produced 28 per cent of the nation's lead in 1950, 35 per cent of the zinc, 21 per cent of the silver, four per cent of the gold and one per cent of the copper.

## 88,500 Minidoka County Acres Cultivated in '51, Report Says

REPORT, Dec. 6—One thousand fifty-nine farms in Minidoka county cultivated 88,500 acres of crops during 1951, according to the annual report of Wilmer G. Pritch, county agent, and Sarah Spencer, home demonstration agent.

The report said irrigated wheat accounted for 15,500 acres; dryland wheat, 3,000; oats, 3,500; barley, 3,000; corn, 80; potatoes, 10,000; sugar beets, 6,380; new seedling,

in the county. The income from all crops and beefs far exceeds income from other sources, the report said.

The report dwelled briefly on dairy, beef herds and sheep. Income from sheep, the report pointed out, is derived from wintering and lambing of range sheep, farm flocks and purebred flocks. The largest phase of the beef program, the report continued, is in feedlot fattening of steers.

### Price Spiral Has Resumed in U.S., Congress Warned

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—Price Director Michael V. D'Alle has told congress prices apparently are rising again and warned it would be dangerous at this time to risk decontrol of any major part of the economy.

D'Alle said the general price freeze last January had checked prices that skyrocketed after the Korean outbreak. He said that after holding firm the first half of the

year, an upward trend began in August. He cited figures from three bureaus of labor statistics indexes to show increases during the last three months in wholesale prices, spot market prices and consumer prices. He said the present conclusion of the office of price stabilization "is that it is not, at this time, safe to decontrol any major segment of the economy. The dangers of inflation and speculation are too severe to permit unnecessary risks."

### Revive Old Mystery

### 30-Year-Old Puzzle Is Revived By Red Seizure of AP Scribe

MARION, Ind. (NEA) — The clamor over the imprisonment of Hoosier newspaperman William Oatis in Czechoslovakia may help solve the riddle Oatis never was able to fathom himself — the 30-year-old mystery of his mother's disappearance.

Relatives and friends in Oatis' home town feel sure all the headlines on the reporter's arrest will either bring Mrs. Cora Eddy Oatis out of self-chosen anonymity, or produce someone who knows what really happened to her.

Already public interest in the Oatis case has turned up a report that Mrs. Oatis was alive and living in Indianapolis in 1920, eight years after she allegedly was presumed dead.

It is true, this shatters the theory accepted by her closest relatives that she fell ill and died on the west coast the year of her disappearance, unable to get word back to her family.

Tragedy first touched the life of Oatis when he was 9 months old, in September, 1914. His brother, Fred, then about 2, died in a tub of wash water into which he had fallen.

Perhaps it was this tragedy which

set the bereaved mother adrift. When her husband went west a short time later, she left Bill with his grandmother in Marion and went to Indianapolis, where she worked during the war.

Shortly after the end of World War I she joined her husband in Arizona, hoping, her family thinks, to re-establish their home.

Mrs. Oatis wrote in July, 1921, saying she planned to leave Arizona to seek work in California. She added she wanted "to come home but am afraid I could not find work."

The next word was a telegram reporting she was in the hospital and asking funds. That December, she sent a Christmas card from Los Angeles, on which she wrote to her mother: "Some of the news is coming along just themselves I am coming home to see you."

After that, she never was heard from again. Her family sought in vain to trace her. An insurance firm which carried a small policy on Mrs. Oatis failed to track her down. But they never succeeded.

After seven years she was declared dead and her estate settled.

That's where the mystery rested until after Oatis' imprisonment in Czechoslovakia. The one of his former junior high school teachers called a Marion newspaper and, in passing, gave some startling information.

In 1920, she said, she had taken William to an Indianapolis apartment house to see his mother. With another teacher, they were driving through the city and William asked the teacher to stop at an address he had. They found his mother's name on the mail box, but she wasn't home. The apartment superintendent told them Mrs. Oatis was away at work, so they left.

Relatives knew he had searched endlessly for clues to his mother's whereabouts, but until now they never knew he had been "that close." Now the secrets of his search are locked up with him in Czechoslovakia, but the story of his imprisonment may still solve the mystery.

### New Aeronautical Map Slated Soon

BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP) — Civil aviation was notified today a completely new, revised aeronautical map of Idaho will be ready for distribution next month.

State Aeronautics Director Geo. Moulton, in a holiday bulletin to the aviation industry, said a new airport facilities directory also will be available to aircraft owners and pilots when they register for 1952.

He reminded that aircraft and airman registrations are due Jan. 1.

At the same time, Moulton informed Idaho's Civil Aeronautics Board for mobilizing all airman, aircraft and airports in the state in a voluntary defense plan would be distributed within the next 30 days.

### 4-Truck Accident Is Fatal for Man

BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP) — A four-truck accident claimed the life of Elmer W. Anderson, 41, Eagle merchant, last night seven miles west of Boise.

Ada County Coroner Clyde E. Summers said a pickup driven by Anderson and a Consolidated Freightway truck and trailer collided at an intersection. The big freighter was deflected into a parked truck loaded with slabwood and hit another parked truck.

Herbert Schoepf, driver of the freighter, and Glen Hudson, Eagle, passenger in Anderson's pickup, were taken to a Boise hospital with injuries.

### No Need to Fret On Tire Supplies

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (AP) — Motorists can stop worrying about shortages of any likelihood of a tire shortage next summer.

The assurance came yesterday from a top rubber products manufacturer commenting on the government's decision to stop allocating American-made general-purpose rubber after next Jan. 1.

James H. Newman, vice president of B. F. Goodrich company, said the government's action "probably has been made in time to avert a limited shortage of tires which would have occurred in some areas of the country next summer."

### Generals in Korea See Small Possibility of Workable Truce

By FRANK BATHOLOMEW, SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 6 (AP) — Every American general commanding a frontline division in Korea with whom this correspondent talked expressed doubt that a workable cease-fire can be attained with the reds by negotiation.

There was similar uniformity of opinion upholding the hard-and-fast stand of Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway and the U. N. negotiating team in support of the basic principles for which the United States entered the Korean conflict.

A division of opinion exists as to whether the peace effort itself has been worthwhile. One substantial school of thought holds that the war eventually have to be fought to

a conclusion anyhow, and that the sooner we cease to mark time and to get about the inevitable job ahead, the sooner the troops can come home.

It becomes clear to an observer in Korea that the aggressive military opinion stems principally from the Americans and South Koreans, many of whom believe in essence that no truce line will result in a permanent peace any more than did the ill-fated artificial border of the 38th parallel.

They feel that the garrison force required to defend a new dividing line across Korea will come partially close to approximating the present number of troops in the line. In addition will be the danger

of fifth-column political eruptions in the rear.

The opinion of the South Korean people themselves is vociferously demonstrated in parades, demonstrations and street scenes in Pusan and Seoul. They urged a more aggressive us unity or give us death.

"This desire to fight the matter out in Korea to military conclusion is not shared by other component units of the United Nations forces. They urged a more compromising attitude, a negotiated peace and an end to the Korean fighting at the earliest possible moment. This policy is spelled out in the English language newspapers at Hong Kong and elsewhere through the orient, with the exception of Manila, and is heard in the foreign diplomatic missions in Tokyo.

Another thoughtful opinion heard expressed in Japan and Korea indicates the combination of one element with another.

Principal benefit from continuing talks, these officers told me, is that time runs in our favor and against the reds. Unlike their brother officers who favor direct and immediate military action, these men hold out cautious hope that a beneficial peace may result if Ridgway is protected from political interference in making the military decisions at Panmunjon.

They feel that, while the North Koreans want to continue to fight, the Chinese carrying the brunt of the war for the reds are sick of their deal and eventually will agree to a realistic truce if they find they cannot outmaneuver and outwait us at the conference table.

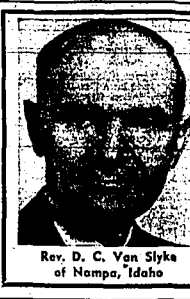

For instance, too often multi-lane roads are built where they are not needed because of political pressure. And that's why you will find two-lane roads being built where the traffic requires two, three, or four times that width.

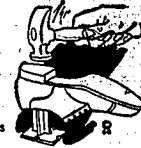

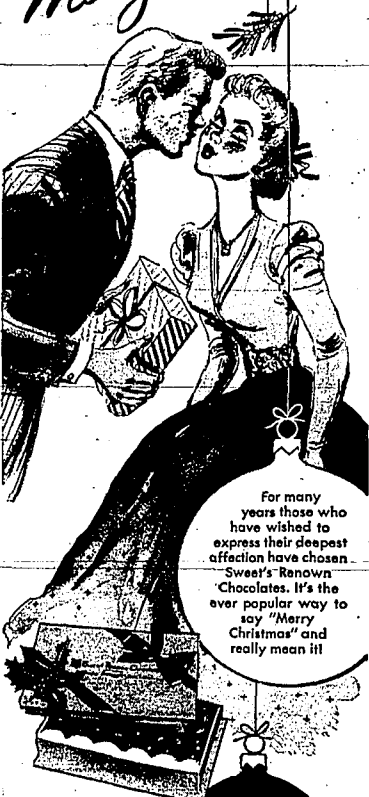

### Price Decline Below Ceilings Proves Embarrassing to OPS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—Present day, but, wanna buy a pair of shoes or a suit for less than the government's price ceiling? Or do you want a radio or TV set for a price below the ceiling?

Where? Why at most any store. And that situation is embarrassing to officials of the office of price stabilization (OPS) who set the ceiling price.

Actual selling prices on a lot of goods have been slipping below ceiling prices since last spring. For instance, OPS officials estimate that wearing apparel and shoes have been selling from 8 to 10 per cent below ceiling.

Prices are still high, of course—higher than last year. But they are not as high, in many cases, as they could go under established government ceilings.

Cholice cuts of meat are selling from 5 to 10 cents below ceiling prices.

Many consumer durables such as radio and television sets, vacuum cleaners, lawnmowers, sewing machines, office machinery and rugs

are selling well below ceilings. Prices on some basic commodities are below ceilings.

Officials estimate about 75 per cent of the items sold in chain grocery stores are at about ceiling prices. But in the smaller groceries—which have higher ceiling prices—about 75 per cent of items sold are "well below" ceilings.

Textiles in general, are selling below ceiling prices. Cotton print cloth is selling for 20 cents a yard. The ceiling is 27 cents. Law cotton is back near the ceiling level after falling way below. But raw wool was selling for \$17 75 per pound on Nov. 20 when its ceiling was \$13.28.

Coffee, fat and oil, rubber, some types of lumber, paper, produce, hides and tallow also are somewhat below ceilings.

What's the result? Critics of ceilings say they should be junked. The U. S. Chamber of Commerce concedes ceilings are useless.

The unhappy OPS has begun a new policy to roll back "excessively high" ceilings wherever possible to or near the selling price levels.

### British Tighten Grip on Suez Canal



The Suez Canal—popularly known as the British lifeline—runs almost due north on the east coast of Egypt from Port Said on the Mediterranean to Port Taufiq (Tavrik) on the Gulf of Suez, long, narrow arm of the Red Sea, gateway to the Indian Ocean. Built through the work of the great French engineer, Claude Ferdinand de Lesseps, it was started in 1859 and opened in 1869. It is a sea-level canal all the way, without locks. Parallel to the canal is the Suez Water Canal, originally built when the canal was being cut to bring fresh water from the Nile for the thousands of workers doing the job. This "most important canal in the world" is not owned by Egypt. It is, in fact, owned by a private French road, owned by an outside concern, the Suez Canal Company. Great Britain and French businessmen between them hold 96 per cent of the stock. The French hold financial control, but defense of the canal is left almost entirely to British forces. Since there are a 20-year treaty signed in 1914. It is this treaty that Egypt wants to break and expel the British troops.

The map shows the 104-mile course of the vital Suez canal that has been bottled up at both ends, pending the outcome of a throw out all British forces. A British cruiser is on the Port Said, two other warships have sailed up the Suez terminus at Port Taufiq, tank-supported troops have seized railroad stations outside Suez and troops are pouring in from England and Cyprus to reinforce those that have already cut off the canal zone from the rest of Egypt.

### Hard-to-Surprise Henry Agog At Mexico's Football Interest

By HENRY McLEMORE—MEXICO CITY—Having once seen a snake, a cross between a snake and a cobra, I am a man who is hard to surprise.

Yet I have been surprised since I arrived in Mexico City by the way this Latin American country has taken up our game of football. The Mexicans have never had played the game 16 years ago—the first game having been played in 1914.

I'll bet you can't guess within 10-000 the size of the crowds that now watch Mexican football games. There are not 100,000 or 50,000 as common, and when Pollock and Universidad come together, 85,000 to 90,000 fans are packed from turf to turf.

The only reason the crowd is so "small" when these two schools meet is that there isn't a stadium that will seat any more. I've been told that 250,000 tickets could be sold in one day if seats were available in Mexico this game is the U. S. parallel of California vs. Stanford, Penn vs. Cornell, Tech vs. Georgia, and Navy vs. Army.

I was lucky enough to see this year's game, and the football was top drawer stuff. If you think Mexicans can't play the game, I'd like to remind you that in 1927 the Mexican team beat Randolph field,

including the Ross bowl. This year's game between Pollock and Universidad started at 2:15 p. m. At daylight, when the snow-capped mountains that look down on Mexico City were just warming their faces to the sun; at least 10,000 unrecruited seat seekers were in line around the stadium. They only had nine or so hours to wait for the kickoff.

I will not tell you that Mexicans play football for keeps. When they tackle they don't tackle to halt the runner for a moment, they tackle to stop the ball carrier forever, if possible.

The university team, which won the big game easily, could link the pants of this year's Harvard or Yale teams, despite the fact that Yale and Harvard have been playing since Cornwallis first introduced the drop kick, and wear ivy for shoulder pads.

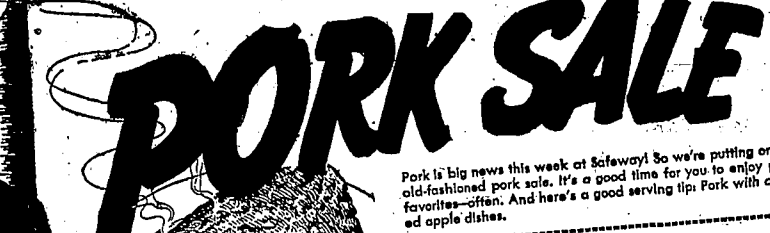
