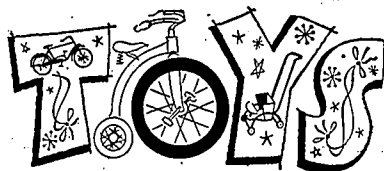

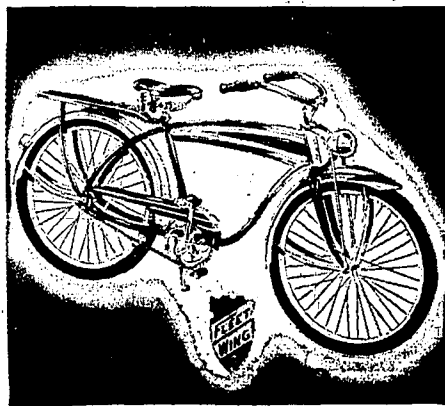

Methodist Bishop Gives Report Here

Impressions of Japan and Christian Work Are Given by Methodist Bishop

Impressions of Japanese people, places and the work of Christian missionaries in Japan were related Monday night by Bishop Gerald Kennedy, Portland, Ore., at the Twin Falls Methodist church.

Bishop Kennedy, the youngest Methodist bishop in America, returned last month from a tour of Europe and a stay in Japan where he visited churches and missions throughout the country.

How to feed 12,000,000 people on such a small amount of land remains a principal problem of the Japanese, Bishop Kennedy said. He described the people as likable, poor, shabby and living on an inadequate diet.

Progress has been made under the American occupation and schools from kindergarten to college established by churches are doing a "tremendous job," he said.

However, Bishop Kennedy said he thought that after the American occupation ends there may be a brief "rebellion" against everything American and Christian. The people have been held down and they may need to blow off steam. The church may suffer some minor persecutions but I don't believe it will be lasting or have any serious effects.

The normal manner of Japanese life, doing everything at a proper time and living by rules, helps them carry through in a crisis and face the unknown, Bishop Kennedy stated, but it also makes it difficult for them to change.

"In the Philippines I was warned by Gen. Carlos Romulo that democracy cannot be taught in four or five years and that the Japanese have not changed as much as Americans think."

Bishop Kennedy said he detected no bitterness among the people but it is difficult for a stranger to know, he added. "They are extremely polite and say yes even when they mean no."

Vitality and enthusiasm of the new Christians in Japan was described by Bishop Kennedy. Turning to this new religion took course and the converts do not take it for granted as persons who have grown up as Christians often do, he said.

He praised missionary workers for their "unceasing efforts" and said the greatest need is additional personnel. The second need is financial aid for missions, schools and social settlements.

The hope for Japan lies in the earnest groups of Christians who are forming throughout the country and working with zest and enthusiasm, he concluded.

Following his formal talk, Bishop Kennedy answered questions from the audience for 20 minutes. Answering a question on Korea, he said he did not believe people in Tokyo were any more conscious of the Korean fighting than people in Twin Falls.

Concern that America's move to return Japan may lead to militarism which brought Japan into the last war was expressed by the bishop.

Presenting Bishop Kennedy's talk, solos were sung by Mrs. Frank Thielson and Sterling Larson and the choir sang an anthem. A prayer was given by the Rev. Dr. H. G. McCullister and the Rev. Dr. F. W. Werts introduced the bishop. The Rev. Albert B. Parrett presided.

A reception for Bishop Kennedy followed.

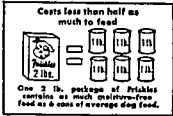

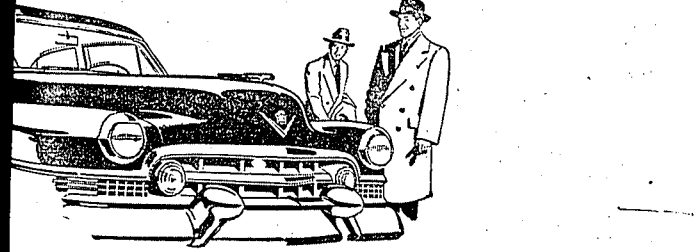

Dentists Hear Discussion on Disturbances of Jaw Joints

The responsibility of dentists in the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of disturbances of the jaw joint that are related to the abnormal position and function of the teeth and jaws.

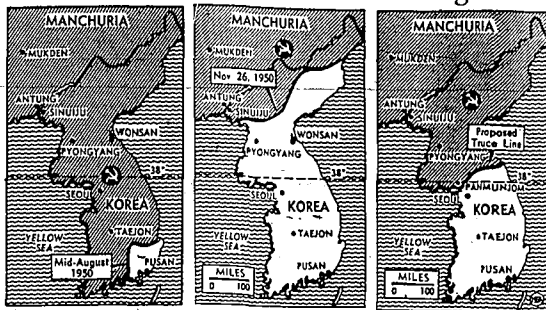

Speaker Sees World Under Rule of God

A secure new world under a government of God's direct administration was described here Sunday by E. Z. Reusch, district minister of Jehovah's Witnesses.

Reusch's address climaxed a 3-day circuit assembly at Alameda school auditorium with an attendance at times reaching nearly 450, according to those in charge.

Reusch urged his hearers not to put their hopes for security in peace pacts, leagues of nations, or political ideologies of men. "These," he said, "have all proved impotent to bring peace."

Reusch said the fear and insecurity of our times would be terrifying were it not for the promise of God's intervention in human affairs.

Reusch voiced the belief that the increasing woes of human society were the visible signs of the coming of the Great Prophet to establish the kingdom of God on earth.

"Worldly Religion" Hit
"Expressing strong disapproval of what he called 'worldly religion,' Reusch said the nations called Christian are so in name only. 'If nations and individuals were really Christian, there would be no racial prejudice, religious hate, national greed, juvenile delinquency, adultery, adultery, divorce or international war,' he claimed.

Modern nations are either outright godless or only pay lip service to God, according to the speaker. "Such a course marks this modern world for total annihilation . . . he concluded.

Senate Demo Leader Rejects GOP List Of Possible Gains, Cites 8 Advances

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (Special)—Senate Democratic Caucus leader, Chairman Clinton P. Anderson rejects the list of eight possible GOP gains submitted by Sen. Everett Dirksen and retaliates with a slate of eight Democratic advances.

Dirksen in a recent broadcast picked Arizona, New Mexico, Wyoming, Kentucky, Maryland, West Virginia, Michigan and Connecticut as the elections which could give the Republicans the three seats they need to control the senate in 1935.

Anderson scoffed at the predictions of defeat for the Democratic floor leader, Ernest McFarland, Arizona, and veteran New Dealer Dennis Chavez, New Mexico.

"The Democrats there have had troubles inside the family," he admitted. "But the Republicans have selected only governors and the Democrats have carried other offices with the usual majority."

Anderson, who has had his share of "family troubles" with Chavez, indicated that internal squabbles would be ended by polling time in both states.

"I am confident that the Republicans will meet their usual disappointment in New Mexico and Arizona."

The Democratic chief burst into laughter at the inclusion of Kentucky in Dirksen's lineup.

"If the Republicans pin their hopes on beating men like Tom Underwood (incumbent Democrat) appointed to finish the term of the late Virgil Chapman) they are really scraping the bottom of the barrel."

Anderson expressed doubt that Wyoming's Joseph O'Mahoney would be defeated. O'Mahoney, a chairman of the powerful senate Interior committee, has been able to wield

great influence for western development.

The New Mexican admitted that Democratic appointee, Blair Moody might have close contests for the seat of the late Senator Vandenberg in Michigan. Another close contest is in store for Democrat William Benton, who won narrowly in a Connecticut special election in 1930.

Democrat Harley Kilgore of West Virginia has the weight of two terms on his side, however.

Anderson's own list of Republican "weak spots" include Utah (Watkins), Montana (Ezard), Washington (Gain), North Dakota (Langer), Indiana (Jenner), Ohio (Bricker), Pennsylvania (Martin) and Massachusetts (Lodge).

"I understand Watkins is facing opposition from many Utah Republicans," Anderson said. He declined to speculate, though, on who would be the Democratic contender.

The surprise in the Democratic list was North Dakota, since it would require a party switch by GOP incumbent "Wild Bill" Langer.

The North Dakota has been the subject of jokes by Republican colleagues who assert that he belongs on the Democratic side of the aisle because of his recent voting, but Anderson indicated that this is a serious possibility.

"If Cong. Fred Aandahl, former

governor, goes after Langer's seat with the aid of Senator Young (Junior GOP senator from the state), it would be wise for Langer to seek haven with the Democrats."

While Anderson refrained from discussing the presidential picture, he predicted that the Tall-Bitten-Horn conflict may cripple the Republicans.

"The Republicans are likely to come out of their convention with a whole section of their party shredded away," he warned. "If this happens, they will be in serious trouble."
