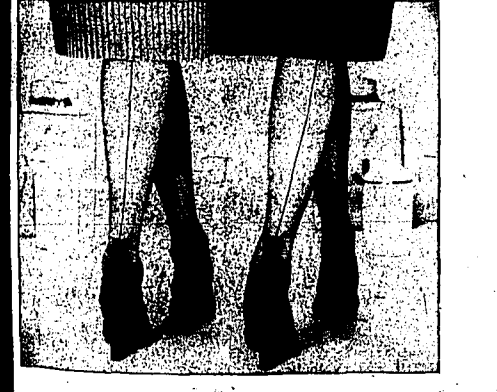

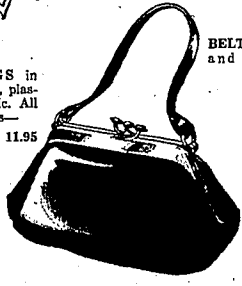

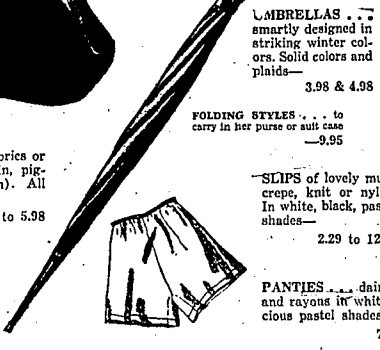

Seventh-day Adventists may be a little different, all right; but if you've ever considered, they are just ordinary folks.

They do not exhibit long faces, wear funny clothes, or bother anybody. They are just like you in the community chorus or the Red Cross drive or other civic activities. Just like your other neighbors.

But still, they are "different." They don't smoke; they won't swear at you if you are late; they don't drink. They go to church faithfully (but on Saturday instead of Sunday) and they try to observe the Sabbath even when they aren't in church.

They operate 4,164 schools, 150 hospitals and clinics, 50 publishing houses and are established in 225 countries.

What is it that makes your Adventist neighbors the way they are? Well, in the first place, they put a great deal of emphasis on the future.

They believe the end of the world is near and feel an urgent obligation to prepare themselves and others for it. They believe that a vital part of their message is "the hour of his judgment is come" (Revelation 14:7), and that this message must go to all the world to prepare a people for the soon return of Christ, the Savior.

Your Seventh-day Adventist friends are quite orthodox. They believe the Bible from Genesis to Revelation. They adhere to observance of the Ten Commandments, having no part in present-day attempts to establish them as a rule of right and the standard of God's judgment.

They also believe that the law condemns man completely, because its sole purpose is to point out sin—and we all have sinned. Our only hope of ever receiving life eternal is through the mercies of Jesus Christ. We are saved by His grace. But the law is still there and will condemn us as often as we sin.

Adventists believe that the seventh day of the week, now called Saturday, was consecrated by God, according to the fourth commandment, at creation (Exodus 20:11) and has been observed by many faithful men ever since, and they observe it today.

But they certainly do not believe that, because of this, they have an exclusive title to salvation. They believe that the fact that many an honest soul with an imperfect knowledge of truth will be saved by the grace of Jesus. But so far from being an unimportant quibble, they believe the matter of Sabbath observance is fully as important as any other commandment. (The Sabbath is called God's "sign." No other day would do, any more than another flag would do for patriotic citizen.)

They will show you that the substitution of Sunday for the Sabbath crept into the church long after the death of Christ, and was admittedly sanctioned by church leaders of that era, and thus passed along to Protestantism today.

Seventh-day Adventists feel that they have a divine mission today in helping to restore the old paths—pointing mankind again to the requirements of God's law, and the grace of Jesus that saves even the penitent.

They feel the urgency of world conditions permits no frivolous conduct, but demands a sober, rational conduct, brightened by the hope of an eternity in a new and perfect world.

Europe Balks At Increasing Defense Costs

PARIS, Dec. 10.—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower today told European nations balking at increased military expenditures that their security will cost a lot of money and they must pay their share.

He made a blunt and sometimes angry speech to the 12-nation North Atlantic Treaty Organization committee of planners, which has drafted a blueprint for bigger arms budgets among some members to build up European defenses.

Nations Rebel His appearance dramatically underscored the problem that arose when some nations began rebelling against boosting their military spending in the fear that it would upset civilian affairs at home.

The supreme allied commander told the NATO delegates they would have to run through the buildup of a force sufficient to deter Russia, and only then "can we start thinking about lightening the defense burden."

"By carrying on, we can reach a point where I hope to be foisted on an enemy to attack," he promised.

40 Divisions Sought Eisenhower is reported asking for a force of some 40 divisions, with 20 of them to be ready by the end of 1935, 20 more by 1937.

The NATO committee report is described as a "firm, precise plan for 1932, and a projection for 1933 and 1934 which will be revised annually to meet changing conditions."

To get 40 divisions by the end of 1932, the committee is reported asking eight of the 12 NATO nations to do better than they are doing now.

Wool Grower Official Speaks Here for Annual Meet of Stock Marketing Group

C. C. Clear, secretary of the Idaho Wool Growers association, was the chief speaker at Friday's annual meeting of the Twin Falls County Livestock Marketing association at the Park hotel. The board of directors was relected.

Discussing the wool market, Clear, who attended the annual meetings of the national and state associations, said it is still undecided but a little more interest in wool has been shown within the past two weeks. He said there may be greater stability after Jan. 1.

Clear discussed lamb ceilings and said he did not believe synthetic wool would be very harmful to the natural wool industry. He said synthetic wool may gain a little in the novelty lines, but buyers who wish durability and comfort will continue to purchase real wool.

Clear discussed accomplishments of the Idaho Wool Growers association during the 58 years of its existence. He pointed out efforts of the association which led to classification of animals held for breeding purposes as capital investments.

The speaker also pointed out the lower shipping rates which have been granted to wool growers through the association. He pointed out the great distance from Idaho

ranges to the eastern markets, as compared with the range-to-market distance for farmers in the mid-west. He said railroads had been hauling foreign wool from the west coast to Boston cheaper than they hauled Idaho wool to the same place.

Clear said railroads wanted to cut their services without cutting rates and wool growers fought against it. He complimented the marketing association for its income from wool pools this year, pointing out it was far above average. He said some Idaho wool remains unsold.

County Agent C. W. Daigh, secretary of the marketing association, reported on the five lamb pools conducted by the association this year as compared with four last year. Clear credited the handling of sheep at the Ogden stockyards for much of the decrease in shortage this year. He said the animals arrived at the yards in better condition to eat hay and drink instead of sleeping as in the past.

Court Delays Final Ruling In Child Case

JEROME, Dec. 10.—Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sirucuk, who live three and one-half miles south of Jerome, comply with certain conditions laid down by Probate Judge Theron Ward Friday, their children, Nancy, 9, and Dick, 7, will not be taken from them.

Mr. and Mrs. Sirucuk were ordered to appear in court to show cause why their children should not be taken from them. Complaints against them was signed by residents of the Canyonville district. After hearing testimony, Judge Ward laid down conditions for the parents and continued the case indefinitely.

Witnesses Testify Testifying against the parents were Mrs. Ruth Gwin, Canyonville school teacher, Mrs. Gertrude Howell, Mrs. Fay Simmons, Guy Hayes, Mrs. Florence Carls and Mrs. Marie Hafer. Sirucuk, appearing without an attorney, testified in his own behalf.

The testimony against the Sirucuks was substantially the same from all witnesses. They also testified the children were not adequately clothed for winter weather and that they were not kept clean. They also testified the two children had boarded the school bus and had hidden in various places to visit without invitation. In one instance, a witness said, the children had announced that their parents had gone to California and that they were going to stay awhile.

Father Is Witness Sirucuk testified that neither he nor his wife knew the children had been invited to visit at the homes to which they went after school. They had told their parents, he said, that they had been invited to birthday parties.

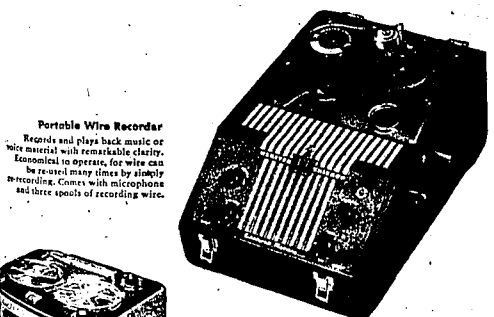

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

Mothers are worn out at the end of each day in their efforts to teach the children right from wrong, to teach them to be industrious, to be helpful and friendly, to be good children. If they are not careful they are likely to nag themselves to nervous prostration and their children into rebellion.

Children fumble a lot in their early years. They are clumsy and break things. They have no formed habits of behavior or conduct. They make another mistake every time they act. If their mothers try to correct every mistake they make, the end is disastrous for both.

Many mistakes the children make are not likely to recur. Once the child learns the right way he is more than likely to follow it. Sure things need no mothers beyond their own effects, so mothers should teach themselves the energy and let them pass.

Before taking measures to stop a child's activities, before correcting or punishing him, ask, "Is this just the passing phase of his growth or is it becoming a habit that will handicap me to make an issue of it?" If it seems important enough to call for correction or discipline, it must have attention there and then. If it does not threaten a child's healthy growth and development, it is just a passing inappropriateness, the expression of an inexperienced, childish nature. If it is characteristic expression of a child of his stage of intelligence, let it pass. When a two-year-old child has had cup spilt on the table before him and spurs his milk laughingly, a gentle

"No, no" is all that is needed. In time he learns.

"But Jimmy is 9 and he ought to know how to behave by this time!" He knows in terms of words, but he does not and will not for some time ahead, know in terms of personal experience and it is that growth in experience that enables him to behave.

What are the important things? Fine character traits: good manners and good morals, resulting in fine character traits; habits of usefulness and fair dealing with others. Good health habits. 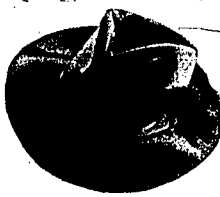

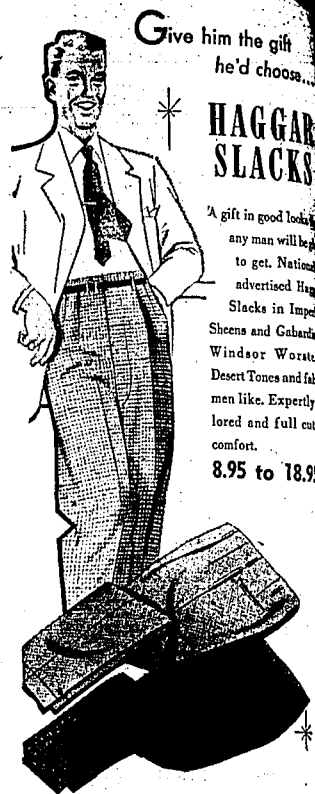

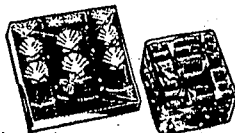

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Recognition has been given six veteran cooperative U. S. weather observers in Magic Valley by the weather bureau in a 200-page book recently released by the bureau.

Two of the six are real veterans, each having served the bureau for between 30 and 40 years. A third observer has served between 20 and 30 years while the other three have between 10 and 20 years of service.

Brief biographical sketches are included in the book on the first three while the other three are listed only by name and length of service. E. D. Stone has been observer at GLENN'S FERRY for 12 years while E. F. Beagle has been observer at SUN VALLEY for 14 years. J. M. Douglas, in TWIN FALLS, is the veteran in the 10-20 year group. He became an observer for the bureau in March, 1928.

The only observer in the 20-30 year group is a woman, Marjorie L. Shaw who turns in her reports from CHISELTON. Miss Shaw was born at HAILLEY and began her duties as a weather observer at Chiseleton in 1919 when her father, F. W. Shaw, had been observer since 1918, died.

Miss Shaw's observation station is located at 8,000 feet on her large stock ranch. In addition to sending in weather reports for the government she raises cattle, sheep, horses and the hay to feed them. She lives in a ranch house made of lava.

E. Pinkenburgh of the North Side Canal company has been an observer at HAZELTON since May, 1918. He was born in Minnesota and following his graduation from Cornell university in 1915 came west up the first weather station for the company in 1918 and while his thermometers are his greatest concern he watches the barometer closely for good fishing days.

Frank O. Redfield, BURLEY, is the oldest weather observer in the valley. He established the station in July, 1917. Redfield was born Jan. 8, 1860, in Wisconsin and attended

But the "Hub" never entirely left the minds of business men and, in 1928, this old slogan became prominent again when it was revived to advertise the town once more. This "Hub City of Magic Valley" has remained with the town for more than 40 years.

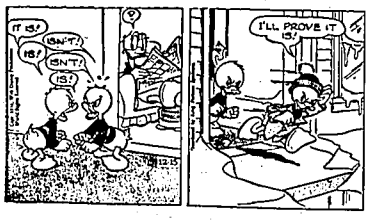

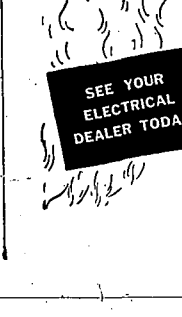
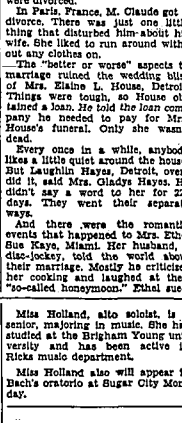
