Snow and cold plagued the northern states today, with deaths attributed to the weather rising to a total of 152. The toll in snow and sub-zero cold bore down on the Three states of snow fell in Cleveland, topping the already on the ground. U. S. Trying to Head Off Steel Strike Dec 31

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—The government today called a meeting of the CIO Steel Workers union and 10 big steel companies here on Thursday in an effort to head off a strike threatened for Dec. 31.
Cyrus S. Ching, director of the federal mediation and conciliation service, messaged the 10 companies and the union that the possibility of a steel strike is "a matter of grave concern" to the people of the United States. He added: "Any curtailment of operations in this key industry will seriously affect our national economy and have a direct and critical impact on our defense effort."
The union is asking a 15-cent-an-hour pay boost and other concessions. Negotiations have been going on in Pittsburgh but have made little apparent progress.

3,198 Americans Listed As Red Prisoner Roster Handed to Negotiators

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Dec. 18 (UP)—The communists gave the United Nations today the names of 3,198 U. S. war prisoners—all they hold out of 12,795 Americans missing in the Korean war. The total, at least 2,000 lower than previously predicted, appeared to substantiate Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's estimate of 2,000, but that nearly 6,000 missing American troops had been murdered in communist atrocities.
Although, the reds turned over the names of 11,559 allied war prisoners in approximately 11 North Korean camps to United Nations delegates in a surprise about-face in an armistice subcommittee meeting.
A communist spokesman said the Americans on the list included Maj.-Gen. William F. Dean, who disappeared in July, 1950, while commanding the U. S. 24th division in battle at Taegyon-South Korea. Also on the communist list, the spokesman said, was Associated Press

Only in 1948 and 1949 were larger crops grown in the United States.
The final agriculture department report of the year showed that the combined production this year of such major products as wheat, corn, cotton, soybeans, and livestock products, set a new record.

SEOUL, Wednesday, Dec. 19 (AP)—A B-28 light bomber carrying a list of allied prisoners reported by the communists tumbled out on the runway at 3:35 a.m. today to take off for Tokyo.
A dispatch from Korea said the plane probably would take off at 7 a.m. Wednesday, but best estimates in Tokyo were 8 a.m. (4 p.m. Tuesday, MST).
That would mean that the lists may be available here by 11:15 a.m. or 12:15 p.m. (7:15 to 8:15 p.m. MST Tuesday), allowing three hours for flight and the delays in getting the list from the airport to allied headquarters, which will release the list to the press at Seoul.
Even with daylight, there was no guarantee that the flight would start at any precise time. The dispatch from Korea said there was a chance of a further long delay because of the uncertain weather.
The list will include names, rank, serial numbers and unit designations. It will have to be checked against the roster of the missing to avoid home town addresses.

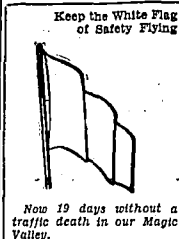

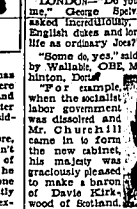

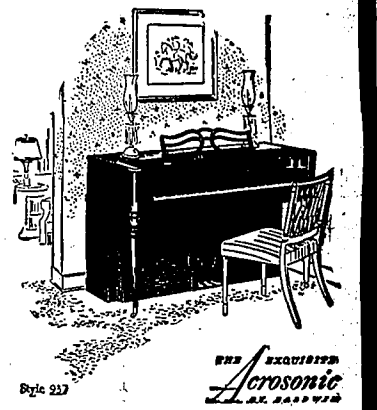

Americans Spent More Money for Food in 1951; New Record Looming for '52

By JACK R. RYAN
 NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Americans spent more money for food in 1951 than ever before. And the food bill is expected to push even higher in the coming year.

Our total expenditure for food, including meals eaten at home, in restaurants, hotels and hospitals, in the armed forces and on farms, is expected to add up to about \$40,000,000,000 for the year just ending, that's \$3,500,000,000 more than in 1950.

Virtually all of this increase is believed to reflect higher prices rather than any notable change in the amount of food consumed.

Retail food prices had climbed to a record high at the close of the year. The latest government figures available show the overall price level rose the country at the end of November was about 5.7 per cent above last January.

Many important individual foods rose much more than that, of course. A few, like eggs, beef and pork, have just recently, but the declines have been outweighed by seasonal advances in other items like fresh fruits and vegetables.

Economists of the agriculture de-

partment don't look for any big jump in food prices in the new year, barring unusually bad crop weather or other emergencies. But they do foresee a slight uptrend for the following reasons:

Heavier spending for defense will mean more jobs, higher consumer incomes, more spending money. At the same time, because of sharper cutbacks in critical materials, there will be fewer durable goods like refrigerators, refrigerators and appliances. A lot of this extra money is expected to be channeled into food buying. Per capita consumption may rise as much as three per cent.

In addition, the population is growing. And the armed forces are expected to need more food in 1952. Further, marketing costs are expected to go up some more as wages in the food industry edge higher. Many grocers contend they're already being squeezed by rising operating costs. An industry advisory committee recently asked for price stabilization to boost the amount which grocers are allowed to add to the cost of goods in figuring their selling price. The margin hike they want could raise price ceilings on packaged groceries about two per cent.

Supplies of food as a whole are expected to be higher in the coming year, but not enough to offset the anticipated larger demand. Federal forecasters say the situation could shape up something like this:

Meat will be more plentiful, especially beef and veal. Consumption compared with 1941 this year. The 1952 crop of chickens, turkeys and eggs should top even 1951's huge

production. Milk output won't go up much, and lively demand probably will result in slightly higher prices at retail.

Fresh and frozen fish should be more abundant than the canned product, at least until the 1952 pack starts to market. The military will take a bigger proportion of canned goods. Carriers of canned fruit may reduce processing in the coming year, leaving more fresh fruit for consumers. Less non-citrus fruits will be produced, and less grapefruit, but more oranges at lower prices. Banana imports may be smaller. Prices of most fresh vegetables should be lower than in 1951 and supplies of canned and frozen vegetables will be adequate.

Far-Reaching Data Learned In Atom Tests

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—Military scientists expect the results of experimental underground atomic explosion in Nevada to have far-reaching effect on both battlefield tactics and strategic bombing.

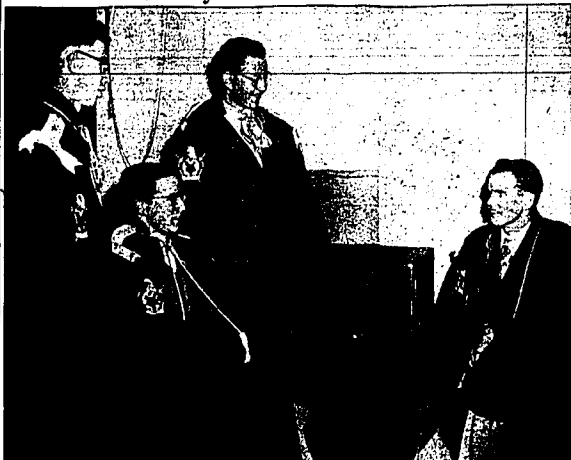
The research information obtained in the test explosion on Nov. 29 at the Frenchman Flats proving ground presumably will be used for development of a dual purpose nuclear weapon for use in blasting out subterranean strongholds or a war front or destroying underground factories or military headquarters in an enemy homeland.

Two obvious methods The armed forces already have to use in these are at least two obvious methods for delivering such an earthquake producing weapon. Through use of a atomic warhead either on a conventional deep penetration bomb dropped from high altitude by a plane or on a guided missile, fired in high trajectory to produce deep penetration of the earth as it drops groundward almost vertically.

From preliminary tests conducted at a western Utah proving ground in which standard TNT explosives were used in large quantity, the military already had some idea of results to expect from the Nevada atomic test.

Results indicated Thus the reasons for reasons to believe, even before they detonated the atomic charge in Nevada, that several military uses of atomic force would be produced. Among them was the area of primary blast destruction, the crater caused by the explosion, cracks in the earth which, radiating out from the crater, would shatter or destroy the underground or surface structures not actually at the point of impact; shock transmitted to structures in the vicinity to destroy or damage structures, equipment within structures, or both. If another factor could be determined with certainty until an actual atomic explosion was tested, how much damage would be done by the atomic explosion would be determined by setting off a nuclear fission detonation underground and how long would it take for the atomic explosion to reach the surface in the debris of the crater? This could be an advantage in the bombing of an underground factory, denying the use of its equipment to enemy use for some time. But it could be a disadvantage in a battlefield, where friendly forces might want to move into the area quickly.
