\$10,000,000 Slated For Construction Of Utah's Roads

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 20 (AP)—The Utah road commission announced today it would spend a record \$10,000,000 on road construction during 1952—thanks to a one cent per gallon increase in fuel tax voted by the last legislature. Nearly \$2,000,000 will go toward speeding traffic through the Salt Lake City metropolitan area. State street will be widened and channeled from Ninth to 33rd south. The rest will go toward an overpass, rights-of-way and approaches leading toward the new westside expressway. Delays Cited In Drive for More Planes

EAST HARTFORD, Conn., Dec. 20 (AP)—Four times since the rearmament drive started one of the world's chief aircraft engine manufacturers has been forced to cut back production schedules. Executives of the Pratt and Whitney aircraft division of United Aircraft corporation place the bulk of the blame on the government's delay in helping to expand machine tool output and in fixing reliable priority for materials.

Effects Far-Reaching
The effects of any slowing of Pratt and Whitney's rate of expansion are far-reaching. Piston and jet engines produced here power air force and navy fighters, B-36 bombers, navy attack and anti-submarine planes, long-range transports of the strategic air command and turbine-propeller transports now under development. General Manager William P. Owin says the company is a year behind. It will reach maximum capacity in mid-1953 instead of 1952. Owin says the company originally furnished the government an expansion plan based on World War II aircraft engine production. The prompt federal aid on machine tools and materials.

Worst Problem
Machine tools—both existing types and wholly new ones needed for advanced jets—have been the worst problem, according to Owin who at 44 has 24 years of experience in aircraft engine production. For example, it took 15 weeks before the Korean war to obtain a 34-inch vertical turret lathe, a vital tool in machining jet engine parts. Today deliveries are promised in just under three years. The damage was done, Pratt and Whitney men say, when the government failed to tackle the machine tool problem until a year after the Korean war started. Up to now,

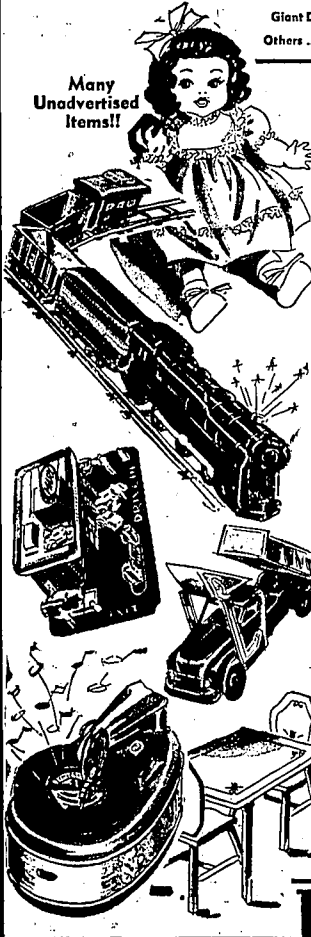

Help Treat Alcoholism, but No "Magic Cure" Is Known to Scientists

longer up to the patient as long as he takes antabuse daily. The medicine makes the decision for him. There is no "magic cure," the specialists say. Additional treatment, such as psychological guidance, is necessary. The antabuse causes users return to their uncontrolled drinking habits once they stop taking it.

The reaction to this drug can be so severe that it must be used only in a hospital, although it is sold in a bottle on prescription.

Vitamin: Dr. Roger J. Williams, director of the biochemical clinic at the University of Texas, who received a grant from the research council, believes alcoholics have inborn deficiencies in body chemistry. He thinks the appetite for alcohol is permanently altered when the deficiencies are made up by vitamins and other necessary nutrients.

Despite some dramatic results achieved by Williams, most medical authorities believe antabuse treats the effect, rather than the cause of alcoholism. Massive injections of vitamins are an established part of the treatment for partially repairing the damage to the nervous system every alcoholic suffers.

Food Prices Are Hiked for British

LONDON, Dec. 20 (AP)—Winston Churchill's conservative government hiked the price of cheese and bacon today and told the British people they'd have to get along with less bacon and candy.

Cheese and bacon went up a whopping 12 cents a pound. Both are rationed.

The food ministry also slashed the bacon ration from four to three ounces per person a week and cut the candy ration by half an ounce to six ounces a week.

The government blamed rising costs for the price increases and an outbreak of foot and mouth disease, which affects livestock, for the drop in bacon supplies. The disease is raging both in Britain and on the continent.

Americans today on an average drink only half as much alcohol as they did 100 years ago. They use three times as much wine and 11 times as much beer.

Annual Polio Drive Begins In U. S. Jan. 2

BOISE, Dec. 20.—Faced by an unprecedented financial burden arising from major polio epidemics in the United States and elsewhere, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today announced that the annual drive to raise money for the fight against the disease will be held on the traditional date, Jan. 2, instead of on the traditional date, Jan. 15, it was announced today by Dr. B. Overstreet, Idaho March of Dimes chairman for 1949.

Overstreet said the decision was made because of the time that has been required to complete the preparations for a double-effort, month-long March of Dimes prior to the Christmas holidays.

The year of severe and tragic polio outbreaks have left Idaho chapters and the National Foundation with the greatest financial burden it has ever carried. Overstreet said the drive to raise \$2,000,000 for the year will be held with a debit in excess of \$500,000 owed by county chapters for medical care responsibilities.

"During the last five years nearly 1,500 victims have been stricken in Idaho. The problem is becoming an sharper focus when we realize this incidence is twice that of a century prior to 1947.

"We do not yet know the full price of the polio outbreaks which struck down men, women and children in 1948. Idaho's fifth annual polio drive, however, do we know that we are caring for at least 800 children and adults stricken in Idaho during prior years. Costs for medical care for some individuals cases have been as high as \$25,000, which few if any Idahoans could bear."

Overstreet emphasized that it is all the old values of polio incidence have been wiped out. The concept of normalcy has been established by harsh experience. We must now learn to live with polio to receive when all our knowledge points the other way.

While the March of Dimes grows greater each year, polio continues to wipe out all hope of a favorable season. This year the March of Dimes is to keep pace with the march of polio, we need as many volunteers, our campaign period must be twice as long and our work must be twice as hard. It is the only way we can win.

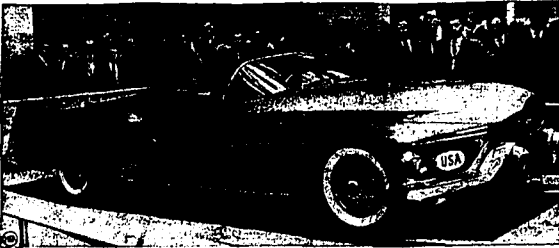

Auto of Future Will Be More Efficient and Easier to Drive

By HARLEY J. EARL
Vice President, General Motors
Detroit, Mich.

DETROIT (NEA)—I have been told that Le Sabre probably is the best known automobile in the United States today. Certainly the public response is beyond anything we anticipated, both in the United States and Europe.

At its Paris and Antwerp showings, Le Sabre attracted more inquiries and spectators than any automobile display I've seen, and for the past 25 years I've seen and my business is to attend European shows.

It never has been our intention to imply that Le Sabre is such a big car of the future. It is a laboratory on wheels, and as such its value is not in the car itself but in what we will learn from it.

We knew even before we built it that part of it would be impractical for general use, but we knew that it would be a learning experience that would help us build better cars in the future.

We know we have experience that no matter how fantastic an idea may appear to be, it may very well become an important improvement in future automotive design. I can remember, for instance, when Le Sabre's predecessor was exhibited in 1938, quite a few people insisted that the electrically actuated convertible top be discarded because it was too expensive, required too bulky machinery to be practical for stock cars.

You have only to check the cars in the street to see how wrong they were. Similar doubts were raised about push-button door latches, fender extensions over the doors and tail lamps recessed in rear fenders. These "radical" innovations of 1938 design are a conventional part of today's automobile.

Our reasoning for building the 1938 car had been very simple. The automobile more than any other is a symbol of American people; it illustrates our urge to keep moving ahead. We are living in a new era, and we are using our experimental Le Sabre. The use of our experimental Le Sabre is one of the ways we keep ahead of the public demand.

Thinking ahead, plotting future designs on the drawing board is not enough. Some ideas that appear practicable on paper are not practicable in metal. Some ideas that seem desirable but impractical on paper can be worked out in the actual metal of a building.

We know, for example, that because of the expense and scarcity of magnesium and aluminum are not practical to the extent we have used them in Le Sabre. But as the result of our experiment we may be able to make increasing use of them as they become available.

Charge on Passports to Reds Rejected by State Department

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—The state department today rejected a charge by senators that passports were issued to known communists and fellow-travelers to visit Russia and other certain countries on an expense-paid tour.

The senate internal security committee made the charge in a report on its investigation and secret hearings on a trip made last April by 21 American union members, 14 of whom it described as having "notorious communist records."

Witnesses told the committee that the trip was paid for by labor groups, while labor unions in the red nations visited paid their travel expenses behind the iron curtain.

The committee, headed by Gen. Pat McCarran, D. Nev., accused the state department of letting "the enemy's civilian agents move at will between here and Moscow."

It said this "facilitates the communist's courtier system."

Mr. Shipley, chief of the department's passport division, called the charges "preposterous" and said there was nothing in the passport applications to indicate that the union members "were communist or that they were going to the Soviet union."

Mr. Shipley also rejected the committee's suggestion that the department set up some system of spot checking passport applications.

Army Engineers To Let Contracts In Next 6 Months

PORTLAND, Dec. 20 (AP)—Army engineers said today they planned to let \$100,000,000 worth of contracts in the next six months in the Pacific northwest.

The biggest job is the Chief Joseph dam on the Columbia river above Wenatchee. New construction there is expected to total \$32,000,000 before the end of the fiscal year next June.

That will be handled by the Seattle district office, as will \$12,000,000 in contracts for Albert Falls and on the Pend Oreille river in North Idaho.

The Portland district will let two contracts for a total \$9,000,000 for start of construction on The Dalles dam on the Columbia river between Oregon and Washington. Also planned is \$3,000,000 in contracts for the Lookout Point dam on the upper Willamette river, and \$1,000,000 for the Dexter re-regulating dam three miles below Lookout point.

The Walla Walla district will take bids for \$7,000,000 in work on Lucky Peak dam on the Boise river in Idaho.

Meticulous plans for the project are being made. The project is scheduled for bid in January. It is for complete works, intake tower, powerhouse, intake bridges and concrete.

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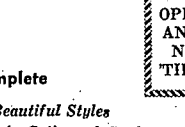

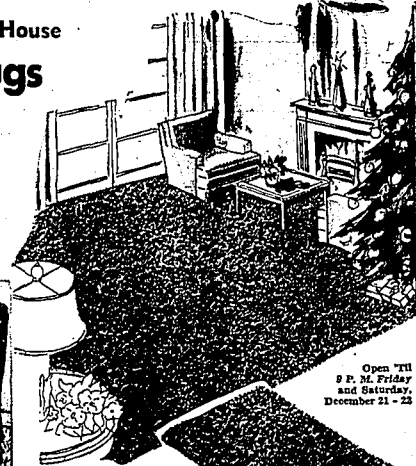

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 20 (AP)—Pacific northwest power leaders recommended appointment of an overall coordinator to take over the region's power pool about an emergency attack strike the area.

Public and private power representatives, including a spokesman for the defense department, met here under the chairmanship of Tacoma's utilities commissioner, C. A. Erdahl, who is also chairman of the Pacific northwest utilities conference committee.

First Human Warmed by Heat of Atom Central Heating Plant Not Impressed

HARWELL, England, Dec. 20 (AP)—Into his own little niche in history today stepped Henry James Grou, the first human ever to be warmed by heat from an atomic central heating plant.

Grou, a businesslike little man of 30, was astonished to learn of a distinction which is unchallengeable to his own—until Russia claims it as another of its fabulous "firsts."

Last Nov. 17 Britain surprised the world by disclosing that it had put atomic energy into actual use as a central heating plant.

The hot exhaust from its atomic pile was being utilized. It was disclosed, to heat one of the big buildings at the secret research establishment here.

There was so much praise and publicity that Sir John Cockcroft (this year's Nobel prize winner in physics) and his staff were so concerned in confusion as they were in secrecy. And no one was more gratified or mystified than Grou.

"I can't understand all the fuss," he said today. "It's not a difficult thing to do—merely a straightforward application of waste heat. I'm sure the Americans could have done it easily had they not all American, at least, were sure it was that easy."

Grou was not aware that anything historic was in the offing and did not record the exact time the heat exchanger was finally installed and set into operation. Grou went up into the building and felt the pipes. "They were getting hot," he said. "I turned the taps. Hot water came out."

Grou washed his hands in the hot water. Later when he got his usual radioactivity test it proved what he felt already knew. The water was perfectly safe.

And how did he feel as he stood there in the building that day—the first human ever to stand next to pipes heated from an atomic central heating plant?

"Warm," said Grou.

About mid-afternoon on Nov. 17 that easy.

"Well," he said, "I shouldn't have thought they'd have had any trouble."

He went on to describe the events leading to the great day.

"Sir John," he said, "had already decided when we built this place way back in 1941 that atomic heat would heat it sometime and he ordered the architects to leave room for an atomic heating plant."

"But it was only about a year ago that we learned to operate the heat exhaust at higher temperatures. At that point it became possible to have heat so cheaply that it would pay for the initial cost of the heating plant. (442,000)."

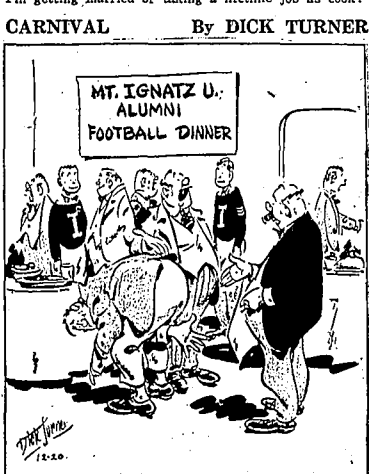

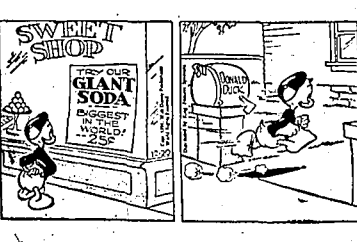

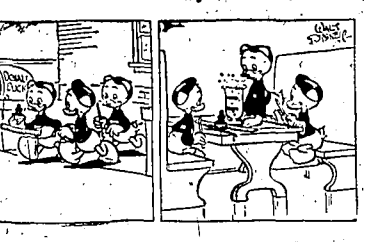

Falls Jail Break Listed in Top Stories of Year in Statewide Poll

Idaho residents to keep the two schools open by diverting sources of income other than state appropriations. It promises to be a big story in 1952 as a main political issue in next year's campaign.

The legislature followed the governor's recommendation and refused to appropriate funds for the schools after July 1. The two schools were shut down after the summer school terms and NICE has been investigated as a possible site for an air force training center.

The other 10 top stories of the year picked by the editors were:

1. Hell Canyon controversy. Many thousands of words were written and spoken both for and against the controversial dam on the Snake river north of Weiser.
2. Southwestern Idaho Water Conservation Project, Inc., members and Jordan made a flying visit to Washington.
3. Idaho's first hanging since 1926. Troy Perdue, 31, and Ernie Walshaw, 20, died on the gallows April 13 for the murder of a Boise grocer in May 1950. A last ditch fight to save their lives met with failure when the state supreme court upheld their conviction. The state pardon board denied clemency after a week-long hearing and the state supreme court refused to stay their execution after their attorneys made a flying trip to Pocatello. It was Idaho's first double hanging in history and the first execution since July 9, 1926.
4. Gunman shoots up Wallace. John Lee Stodard, 48, Los Angeles, fired about 40 rounds of bullets into Wallace streets on St. Valentine's day, killing one man and wounding three others before authorities finally shot him. He made a virtual no-man's land of Wallace streets for four hours, firing from behind linoleum rolls in a hardware store.
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10. Lennie Jones slaying. The body of the 12-year-old boy was found Sept. 27 in a clump of bushes four miles east of Orofino. His throat had been slashed from ear to ear with a razor-sharp knife. His slaying still is unsolved.

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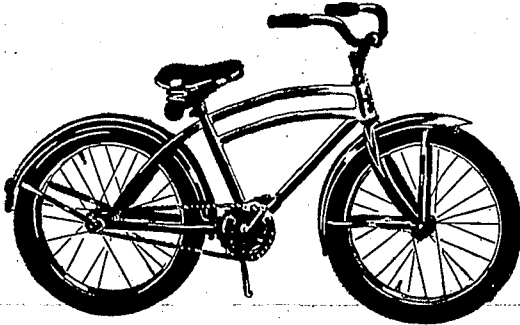

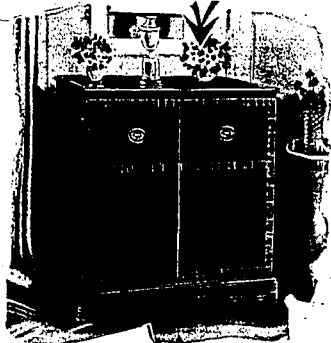

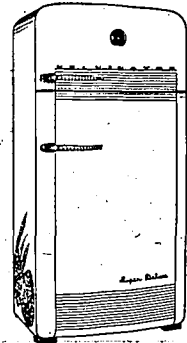
