Local Armory Given Top Priority Rating

The national guard bureau has advised Sen. Henry C. Dworshak that Twin Falls has been put on the top priority list for an armory, according to a telegram the senator sent Wednesday to Don A. Duval, president of the Twin Falls Armory association.

The senator stated the national guard bureau sent a questionnaire to the Idaho adjutant general Saturday and upon its return will process it and submit it to the budget bureau for release of appropriated funds.

Senator Dworshak stated he shall urge inclusion of the local armory in the 1952 construction program. The Chamber of Commerce has placed in escrow until July 1 the funds for purchase of an armory site and the escrow agreement could be canceled.

Duval said he feels the telegram indicates the beginning of action which will mean something in 1952. He said he believes action will be concrete after July 1, the date upon which Chamber of Commerce funds are to be returned to donors if nothing develops toward armory authorization or construction.

Col. James C. Leighton, commander of the national guard's 1st Cavalry, said he will direct the publication of the report.

The physician for Mr. and Mrs. Peters said both are still in a state of shock which delays more complete examination. However, he said Peters sustained face and head injuries and a crushed chest and possible skull fractures.

Others injured in the crash are Mrs. Minshaw and Jack Stanger, 30, route 1, Hansen, passenger in a truck driven by his son, James Stanger, 31, Durkin.

Minshaw's condition is fair. He received four broken ribs and a fractured skull, according to his physician. His wife was released from the hospital. Five bones in her left foot were broken. Jack Stanger also is reported good and improving.

Highway 93 Plugged In 2 Places by Snow

Most of the main highways in Magic Valley were reported open Thursday morning except for Highway 93 from Rogerson to the state line and from a little south of Sun Valley on up over Galena summit. Many secondary roads throughout the area have been blocked for days and one blocked county road Thursday morning prevented the Jerome rural fire department from reaching a farm fire four miles west and one-half mile north of Jerome.

Snow removal crews expected to have the highway south of Rogerson open by afternoon. Highway 93 over Galena summit has been closed for some time and probably will not be opened until spring. Two Sun Valley buses made their way to Sun Valley Thursday morning but only with the aid of snowplows.

While the highway has not been declared closed officially, travel is not recommended. The fire north and west of Jerome was reported at 8:30 a.m. on state Route 93. The fire started in a barn, hay and strawstack burned. When the fire reached the barn, the roof of the barn fell in a number of places in the building and several calves in the building were killed.

Fire Chief O'Byrd said he has not estimated the damage. He reported that the deep snow made it difficult for the fire truck to reach the burning structure. The fire still was burning at noon, he said.

Rupert, Burley and Jerome report no great change in general conditions. The temperature at Burley at 10 a.m. was 39 degrees. It was reported melting and the snow is being blown off the hills. The snow is reported to be dangerous in spots. A number of automobiles and trucks were stalled in the snow on Highway 93 Wednesday afternoon and night.

Hungary Delaying Release of 4 Jailed American Airmen

VIENNA, Dec. 27 (AP)—American officials waited fruitlessly today for the release of four jailed American fliers in Budapest, and at nightfall western sources said they suspected the U. S. offer to pay the fliers' fine had been referred to Moscow.

The Hungarian government now has delayed for two full days answering the U. S. offer to pay the \$120,000 fine levied against the four fliers forced down in Hungary Nov. 19 by Soviet fighters.

The Hungarian government said only that it was "considering" the offer. This conflicted with the announcement in Hungary's Washington legation last night that the offer would be accepted in return for prompt release of the men.

Tonight's development raised doubts on the status of negotiations for the fliers, convicted of violating Hungary's borders after their plane lost its course on a Munich-Budapest flight. It stressed possible the Hungarians had raised new conditions.

But American officials in Budapest still hoped the fliers soon would be on their way to freedom. Walter J. Donnelly, U. S. high commissioner for the area, said he had discussed this afternoon with the U. S. legation in Budapest.

George Abbott, U. S. charge d'affaires in Budapest, reported to Donnelly he had seen the Hungarians' understanding of foreign affairs at noon.

"Abbott was told that the Hungarians had made no decision on the American note which was delivered on Christmas day," Donnelly said.

The Hungarians told Abbott the note was being considered by judicial and financial authorities and they added they could give Abbott no information when the fliers were released.

Donnelly said he assumed the note delivered Christmas day was the one in which the U. S. government said it would pay the fines.

He was prepared to send a party of American officers to the Hungarian border as soon as he learned that the airmen were on their way to Vienna.

Reds Hint at \$30,000 Death Toll for U. N.

MUNICH, Dec. 27 (AP)—The U. N. has reported a "red" hint that 50,000 untried prisoners were dead of disease or starvation in the hands of the communists.

At the same time allied military regulators indicated that the U. N. should give a full and honest accounting of all prisoners, the allies might consider the all-out exchange that the reds had demanded.

The conference ended, however, with agreement on only one thing: To meet again today at 11 a. m. in the U. N. headquarters in Geneva, to discuss the 30-day deadline on the provisional cease-fire line expired at midnight Thursday.

There was indication here of any plans to extend the agreement through the end of the year, or the past 30 days. The full five man armistice committees which met in Geneva last week to arrange the 30-day deadline, Nov. 27, didn't even meet. An official U. N. spokesman said neither side asked for an extension.

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Miners Going Back to Work After One Day

WEST FRANKFORT, Ill., Dec. 27 (AP)—A back-to-work movement developed early today among miners who staged a spontaneous "wildcat" strike for the company by the 119 victims of the New Orleans mine explosion.

Day crews of miners reported at the pits in Harrisburg, Ill., and Terre Haute, Ind., after a one-day stoppage at Oakmont, Pa., also returned to their jobs after a 24-hour work stoppage.

At the mines in Harrisburg, Ill., the miners returned to work, but refused to change into their working clothes, and went home a short time later.

Officials at the Snow Hill mine in Terre Haute said the return of the men there was a surprise to them.

"I may have been a memorial service, but I don't know for sure," one official said.

Despite the reports that Lewis and Clark is being held up by yesterday's work stoppage, which involved more than 3,500 miners in three states, came quite nationally by official sanction of the U. M. W.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27 (AP)—Gus Hall, one of the 11 convicted communist leaders, was sentenced today to three years in prison for "criminal contempt of court."

The sentence is to be served in addition to a five-year term ordered when he was convicted with the other party leaders of conspiring to teach and advocate violent overthrow of the United States government.

Riots Follow "Pro-British" Appointment

CAIRO, Egypt, Dec. 27 (AP)—Police today over the heads of stone-throwing students protesting the appointment of two "pro-British" advisers to King Farouk.

Two days of rioting in Cairo and Alexandria have resulted in at least 35 police and students injured.

Egyptian authorities closed all universities and proclaimed a state of emergency in both cities following the outbreak of the demonstrations yesterday. The government also was expected to limit secondary schools.

Helmeted riot squads marched 10 abreast with clubs and tear gas and hurled tear gas bombs into swarms of secondary school students surging through the streets of Cairo. The students met them with stones from piles they had prepared after repulsing a charge by 20 students swinging police in a clash on Kasr el-Nil street.

When order finally was restored, the streets were littered with stones and the wreckage of a street car which was overturned and set on fire. At least 100 students were injured lightly in the clash.

Alexandria, mounded police charged through a barrage of stones as 2,000 students thronged into Hameln square on the waterfront. All reserve police were alerted to the city.

Sale of WWP Stock to PUD Groups Slated

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27 (AP)—The American Power and Light Company today notified the securities exchange commission it plans to sell its common stock holdings in the Washington Water Power company to three Washington state public utility districts for a base price of \$5,115,000.
American Power told the commission in a formal notice it hopes to complete the sale to PUD's in Olaton, Stevens and Pend Oreille counties as soon as practicable.
Orval Dubois, commission secretary, told a reporter the agency had not decided whether to hold a hearing on the proposed sale.
Dubois said he assumed American Power's action today would automatically eliminate the need for a hearing on that firm's plans to distribute its common stock in Washington Water Power company to American's stockholders. The hearing was set for Jan. 8.
The secretary said the commission will have to make up its mind whether to let the sale proceed before effective automatically or to hold a hearing to determine if the sale would fall within BEC's jurisdiction.
After such a hearing on a similar sale proposal early this year, the commission voted 2-2 that it did not have jurisdiction. The sale subsequently was blocked in Washington state courts.
American Power now is in the process of dissolution. The BEC had ordered it to arrange for sale of its Washington subsidiary—the Washington Water Power company—by the end of 1951 or distribute that firm's stock among American's shareholders.
The earlier plan for sale of Washington Water Power to public power groups was blocked because Washington PUD's could not own and operate Washington water power facilities in Idaho.

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Booming Year Is Predicted in Idaho; Taxes, Prices Will Be Higher

By Editor

Another boom in the nation's economy is predicted for 1938. It is expected that the price level will rise to a point where the cost of living will be higher than it is today.

Here are some of the look ahead views: The United States department of agriculture, projecting a forecast into the government's 1937 fiscal year, which includes the last six months of 1937, says the total value of goods and services should reach \$280,000,000,000.

The record for 1937 shaped up like this: Gross national product—turning at a rate of \$228,000,000,000 compared with \$222,600,000,000 in 1936 and the previous high record of \$250,000,000,000 in 1934.

Some \$94,000,000,000 is the predicted rate of government spending in 1938, compared with \$76,000,000,000 in the current fiscal year and \$50,000,000,000 last year.

Some \$240,000,000,000, said the department, and that compared with an estimated \$228,000,000,000 this year and \$215,000,000,000 last year.

Steel—production is likely to reach 30,000,000 tons. Last year's output was 29,210,000 tons.

Unemployment—farmers should net about \$15,000,000,000 compared with \$17,000,000,000 in 1936. The high was \$17,000,000,000 in 1937.

Here are some pertinent forecasts for 1938: More—somewhat larger beef supplies, but not enough to lower prices appreciably.

Taxes—new and higher taxes became effective Nov. 1, with an average increase of slightly less than 1 1/2 per cent for individuals and increases along the line of excise taxes.

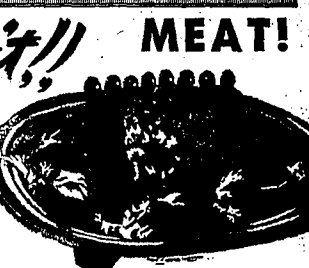

"I jumped our offer to Matthews from 15 per cent to 20 per cent but I can't go higher than that," said Well. "The champion is getting 40 per cent of everything that the fighter gets, including any special television deal. We have a possible offer of \$75,000 or a 100 per cent of the TV deal."

"He's been hollering for the title shot for a long time, but I can't go higher than that," said Well. "I told him 'He ain't until he's champion.'"
