### Lower Rating Reported for Firms in T. F.

Nearly 28 per cent of this city's manufacturing and commercial establishments have grade B ratings in comparison with only seven per cent at this time last year, according to James R. Ingalls, city sanitary inspector. Others have grade A ratings.

He explained this is a result of enforcement for closer compliance with the city's sanitary code which was enacted in 1940 and went into effect in 1942. Enforcement started with more leniency, he stated, but the time allowed for improvement has expired and establishments failing to make corrections have been graded lower.

Ingalls said grade B ratings now are held by 10 of 40 graded establishments, not including two which went out of business during the past two weeks. He said drinking establishments have a little higher percentage of grade A ratings than existing establishments, city only five with grade B among 25 graded establishments, or 20 per cent with grade B.

Grade B establishments must attain an absolutely clean scoring sheet three weeks. He said drinking grade A, although grade A establishments with only minor temperature and plumbing defects are graded immediately. Ingalls said he has just received U. S. public health inspectors' reports on standards for scoring.

Under these standards, operation is not permitted from zero through 60 per cent, provisional approval is given from 60 through 80 per cent, corresponding to the city code (grade B) and approval is given from 80 through 100 per cent (corresponding to the city code's grade A).

Hamilton was named executor of the estate April 9, when the probate court admitted a will drawn up at Buhl May 23, 1935.

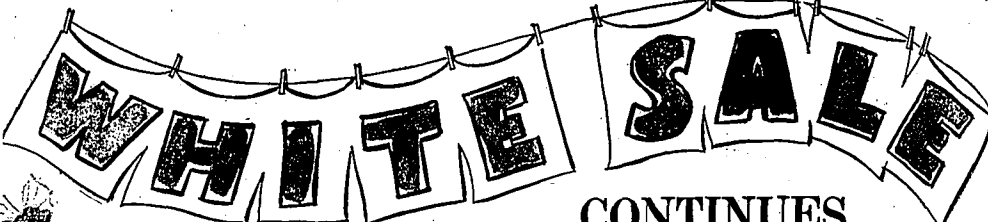

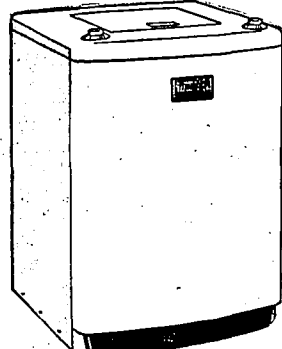

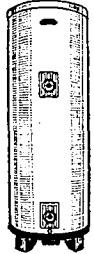
