It is believed that if sportsmen would work as hard in letting legislators know their wishes as they have in the past, there would be no doubt that an effective bill would be passed. He and other sportsmen are working on their desires known when the bill came up in 1951.

It is pointed out that no matter what the people of the state did in the legislature, it could not be as effective overnight by a simple measure of amendments passed in the legislature. He believed a more lasting law would be possible originating in the legislature.

There's no doubt in our mind that the bill can be pushed through the legislature. Writer Says Taft-Eisenhower Contest Lines Coasts Against Rest of Nation

The Taft-Eisenhower contest for the Republican presidential nomination will be a line of both coasts against the rest of the country—on the basis of local political opinion sampled by this correspondent on a trip west from the capital.

Idaho Republican leaders from Gov. Len Jordan down have no doubts that the state's 14 electoral votes will go to the Ohio senator at the forthcoming GOP convention. Utah, Montana and eastern Washington party men also seem unanimous for Taft.

Only in Washington west of the Cascades and among Republicans in Oregon and California does the general find the same support he has won on the Atlantic seaboard. Disinterested observers in the Intermountain are acknowledged that the man in the street was drawn to Eisenhower earlier, but support has faded with Ike's failure to "run" for the nomination.

Idaho's congressional delegation, while not yet publicly on record for Taft as is Utah's senior Sen. Arthur V. Watkins, is in sympathy with "Mr. Republican." All four senators and congressmen have frequently criticized the internationalist policy espoused by Eisenhower.

As for California's Gov. Earl Warren, no Idaho party men mentioned the possibility.

Even northwest Democrats think Taft has the nomination in the bag, although there might be an ulterior motive in their enthusiasm.

"I think the Republicans will stick to Taft and fight in 52 open party lines," Washington's Democratic Sen. Warren G. Magnuson commented in an interview. "And Taft might prove harder for us to beat than Eisenhower—a hard campaigner."

This opinion drew a jaundiced eye from the supporter Rep. Tier G. Tolleson, who covered the campaign. Admitting that Taft is still out in front with the coast GOP organization, he felt that the general is gaining since the western tour of his Pennsylvania campaign. Sen-

American Workers Create New Records for Spending, Saving

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31 (AP)—The American people produced more, saved more and spent more in 1951 than in any other year in history, Secretary of Labor Tobin said today.

And, he added in a year-end report, the 1951 record probably will be broken in 1952.

Despite stresses and strains, he said, the nation's economy maintained a remarkable stability in 1951.

"At the end of 1950," he said, "raw material prices had risen 12 per cent in six months and the consumers price (cost of living) index was rising at the rate of one per cent a month."

"But at the end of 1951, raw material prices were the same or lower than they were at the beginning of the year and the consumers price index had risen only about three per cent since February."

"Though they earned more money, the American people did not go overboard in their spending, he said.

There was little car buying, he reported, and consumers saved \$8 out of every \$100 in 1951 as compared with \$5 out of every \$100 in 1950. The total output of goods and services in 1951 was nearly 10 per cent more than in 1950, he said, and at least five per cent higher than the previous all-time peak year of 1944.

He said that less time was lost through strikes during 1951 than in any previous postwar year. Strike idleness during the first 10 months of the year, he said, was 15,000,000 working days less than during the same period of 1950.

"Under the influence of the manpower program," he added, "employment reached an all-time high of 62,000,000 in August, with unemployment down to 1,600,000. Average employment for the year was a million above 1950, and average unemployment was 40 per cent less."

"Our manpower proved adequate to meet the needs of the armed forces, to staff defense industry and
