

## Wendell Men Plan Ultimatum On Move to Transfer Hospital

Wendell, Jan. 3 (AP)—An ultimatum was issued today to the Gooding hospital board by Wendell businessmen to bring county commissioners to a decision on the transfer of the Gooding hospital to Gooding county.

Gooding county residents last Friday voted overwhelmingly to take over the hospital. In the vote, however, residents of Wendell were much opposed to the proposal as the rest of the county was in favor of it.

Following the election the commissioners announced they would meet Wednesday afternoon to take action on the transfer.

Wendell businessmen and the Chamber of Commerce set Wednesday and appointed Julius O. Peterson and Charles Gates to present Wendell's proposal to the committee.

## Plan on Shakeup of Tax Bureau Draws Wary Reaction by Solons

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—President Truman's proposal for a "sweeping reorganization of the general-internal revenue bureau got a cautious reception on Capitol Hill.

Advance of the return of the main body of congress members next Monday, lawmakers already in town are divided in their reaction. Few showed any enthusiasm.

With government corruption charges, a shakeup of the bureau is a public list of election-year issues, Mr. Truman made plain his move was not a mere reorganization of the bureau to insure honesty, integrity and fairness—in Washington.

"In addition to the reorganization of the bureau of internal revenue," he said, "it is necessary to take further administrative action and to make other recommendations to the congress to insure complete integrity in the operations of the government."

Mr. Truman's statement was followed quickly by disclosure that 53 members of the House of Representatives had signed a resolution to support the plan.

The House vote was based on the first 40 members in 1950 and 21 in 1951.

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## Twin Falls Has No Auto Death For Year Period

For the first time since 1947, Twin Falls went through an entire year, 13 months to be exact, without a traffic fatality, according to records of accidents and traffic violations at the city police station.

The last fatality in Twin Falls was on Nov. 29, 1950, when Dan Norton was run over by a truck at Shoshone street and Fourth avenue. Prior to that, the last fatality was Dec. 19, 1949.

Since May 1 city police have kept a monthly record of accidents, injuries and fatalities in traffic collisions, with complete records for December showing that month to be far ahead of all others in the number of accidents recorded.

During December, 23 accidents with damage estimates of less than \$50. Other monthly figures were May 30, October 18, September and November 62 each, June 22, August 47 and July 38.

October was second with 20, with 25 in July. Other monthly figures were November 22, August 21, June and May 19 and September 19.

Ten persons were injured in traffic accidents in the city during October. The records do not indicate the seriousness of the injuries, but include the minor ones. Second highest in injuries was September with eight. Followed by June with five. Other figures were July three, May and November two and August one. ## Order for Spud Lids Is Prepared by OPS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—The government said today an order to slap price controls on white potatoes has been completed but no decision has been reached as to when it will be issued.

An office of price stabilization aid said the regulation could be issued "on short notice."

Potato prices have been rising rapidly since September.

Price Director Michael V. Disalle told reporters the order has not yet come to his desk. He has been away on a Christmas vacation and has just resumed his duties.

Disalle said the price control order already has been drafted and a few hours before a conference between Idaho potato growers and federal price officials.

Opposition Viewed

Meanwhile, the National Potato Council said OPS was preparing to issue the order over opposition of the industry's advisory committee.

The council said in a statement that OPS is using the committee as a "front" to give the impression that industry approves price ceilings.

The council said "nothing could be further from the truth." It added that several committee members have considered resigning, as a public protest against OPS' arbitrary action. The members were not named.

The average national price of white potatoes rose to 103 per cent of parity as of Dec. 15. Parity is a price calculated to give the farmer a fair return for what his crop is worth.

The average as of Nov. 15 was 98 per cent of parity. Oct. 15, 78 per cent.

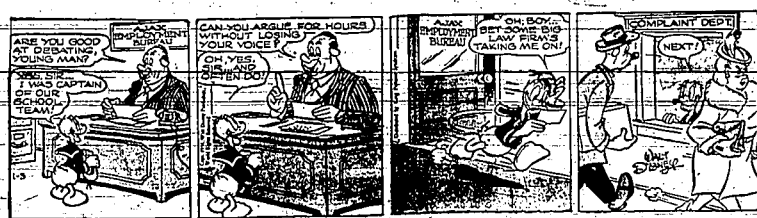

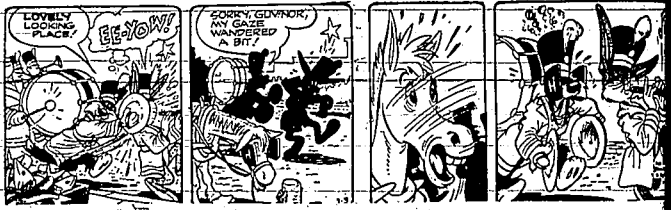

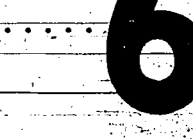

Details Given On New Plan To Halt Graft

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—President Truman's plan announced yesterday for remodeling the federal tax collection service has these main points: 1. Abolition of the 64 collectors of internal revenue. 2. Appointment of the committee of internal revenue by the president, with all other offices subject to civil service. 3. Placing of operating functions in not more than 25 district offices under commissioners responsible directly to the commissioner of internal revenue in Washington. 4. Establishment of an independent inspection service with authority to set up a system of audits and inspections aimed to detect any irregularities. There would be an inspection office in each district under a chief inspector independent of the district commissioner. 5. Reorganization of bureau headquarters in Washington—three assistant commissioners would have charge respectively of (a) the inspection service, (b) field operations and (c) technical matters dealing with tax forms, regulations and rulings. 6. More "adequate salaries" for officials responsible for administering the revenue service in order to "obtain the services of the best-qualified persons in this highly intricate and technical field of government."

Only One County In State Escaped Polio in 4 Years

BOISE, Jan. 3 (AP)—Only one Idaho county has gone without a case of infantile paralysis in the past four years. Clark county, with a population of 918, has not reported a single case of polio in that time, according to a survey of state health department records made by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. But the rest of the state has recorded the highest incidence of the disease in the country. During the first 12 weeks of the epidemic disease have been reported in Idaho, Weeks said. "The state's incidence during this period is the highest in the country with nearly one case of polio reported for every 450 people residing in the Gem state. "These high incidence years have not only depleted the treasuries of local county chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, but of the national March of Dimes organization as well," Weeks said.

Job Shortage for Area Continuing

Travel to Site Of C-47 Crash Was Not Easy

By JACK STEVENSON PHOENIX, Ariz., Jan. 8 (U. S. Press)—A group of men and a pack of dogs had to wade through a mountainous today to reach the bodies of 28 persons who perished in the crash of an air force C-47 transport plane. I went with the advance party of an air force evacuation team to the summit of Armer mountain, a 7,000-foot peak jutting out of the Sierra Ancha range, 65 miles northeast of Phoenix.

Parallels Noted in Writings of Traveler With Sharp Eye, Pen

ATLANTA, Jan. 8 (U. S. Press)—A traveler passed through the land nowing with a sharp eye and pen that parallels existed in the national capital. He noted, too, that a great many routine agents were accused of misconduct and that high taxes were causing grumbling among the people. The country, he observed, was beset by wars and rumors of wars. The fear of a fifth column was causing distrust in high places.

The 2,000-foot climb was tough going all the way. We struggled over icy rocks in running streams which still-erased a cattle trail. One section was so rocky the horses had to be led. As we approached the wreckage we had to get down on our hands and knees to make safe footing.

We found the first body on a little ledge. It was George Manning, 23, Richmond, Calif., one of the 19 West Point cadets who died while going back to the military academy from their vacation. Then we came upon several bodies lying in a group near a place of fuselage about five by 15 feet. All were frozen and scattered over a wide area.

"It is a heavy and sorrowful church," he said. "I must bring the church itself which should strive to appease God—what else does it do but bring Him to anger? except for a few individuals who attain equal, what else is the whole congregation of Christians but the very dogs of vice?"

# Local Extension Agents Expect First Consideration Unless Outlook Changes

Service changes in the national and regional situations, first consideration to regular extension service projects and programs is anticipated by extension agents for this county by their annual report.

This county's members of the University of Idaho college of agricultural extension division are O. W. Daugh, county agent; Florence McNeill, county home demonstration agent; and Robert D. Kearns, county 4-H club agent.

"Fundamentally we need to stabilize and protect the agricultural resources and wealth we now have," their report states. "One outstanding problem that will have to receive attention is that of crop insect and disease control."

The report points out this problem doesn't just affect field crops—it affects garden and fruit crops, too. The report says that the family food supply. All three workers in the office can make some contribution in the educational phases of this problem, their report states.

In their outlook and recommendations, they point out the difficulty of getting facts on what farmers think about present economic conditions and how they seem to be a distinct turn toward the conservative angle in most operations.

Farmers are concerned about further inflation but could not stand much lower prices for crops because of the rapidly increasing cost of production, according to the annual report, which also states:

"Farmers haven't said they were interested in agricultural conservation in all its broad phases in those terms but they say it in different words."

"They say they are interested in improving soil fertility, making better use of irrigation water, noxious weed control, and in balancing crop farming with livestock."

Interest also was noted in health and safety programs and home management programs that will reduce costs.

"Therefore," the agents report,

in looking ahead we should fabricate our extension programs to meet these needs and help bring some stability in a situation that is badly off balance."

Turning to this area's principal crops, the report lists these acreages—beans, 22,000; alfalfa, 53,000; grain, 91,000; potatoes, 12,000; sugar beets, 12,000; and peas, 8,000. Livestock populations are listed as all cattle, 61,000; poultry, 280,000; sheep, 125,000; and swine, 6,000.

After describing climatic conditions as not too unfavorable for crop and livestock production, the annual report states this turned out to be one of the best grains producing years in the history of the area. Some wheat yields exceeded 100 bushels per acre and practically all yields of mixed grain were above that figure.

Unseasonably early hot weather last July was blamed for a big percentage of misshapen tubers in the early planted potato crop. On the other side of the weather pic-

ture is this statement: "The fall harvest was completed with some of the most favorable weather conditions on record."

The report cites good yields of hay from three crops of excellent quality. Fruit crops it describes as average in yield but with peaches and apples having unusual size and quality.

In discussing objectives of the extension program, the annual report again states the program is designed largely to help protect and stabilize this county's agricultural resources.

Declaring reduced net farm income is a big problem, the report explains programs to help reduce costs and losses were fundamental objectives in 1951. "Along with these objectives," it continues, "agricultural conservation in all its broad phases is increasingly important."

Plant and animal disease prevention, soil and water conservation, insect, weed and rodent control, human health and safety, improved family living and cultural improvement are all subjects to be included in an extension program in Twin Falls county.

"With lower net farm returns the home demonstration program can be

a big help in making the farm home and farm living more attractive. More processing of family food supply; greater conveniences in the family kitchen and improved water supplies all will help."

The report emphasizes county extension agents are engaged in an educational program as representatives of the land grant college in the state and the U. S. department of agriculture.

"The report stresses the importance of conferences with local people to make the extension program fit local needs. On this subject, it states: "We make an effort to talk over all improvement projects not only with agricultural leaders but also with local people. We want people to know that we want to work with them in all worthwhile programs with which the extension service is qualified to participate."
