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Steel Union Votes To Delay Walkout For 45-Day Term

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Jan. 4 (AP)—The CIO United Steel Workers postponed their threatened nationwide strike for 45 days today, but warned they will walk out in late February unless the government can't settle the steel contract dispute.

Cheering delegates to a special UAW convention approved a recommendation of the union's top strategists—that work stoppage be held off to give the wage stabilization board time to suggest a settlement.

The vote to delay the strike was by voice ballot. Delegates were asked to rise if they favored adoption of the recommendation. Practically everyone in the convention jumped up amid loud cheering.

When the call for a negative vote was made, one unidentified delegate attempted to get the floor. He said he wanted to cast a no vote but he was drowned out. It appeared that at least half a dozen delegates also stood to register, he believed.

Feb. 21 Date The convention action delays the strike deadline until Feb. 21. The board has scheduled a procedural meeting in Washington Monday. Full-scale negotiations are expected to begin a day or two later.

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U.S. Asserts Safety Council Picks New Officers for '52

PARIS, Jan. 4 (AP)—The United States said today it gravely fears the Soviet move to switch Korean armistice negotiations to the United Nations security council might seriously delay or even torpedo the Panmunjom talks.

American delegate Benjamin V. Cohen called a special news conference here to serve notice that the United States is unconditionally and unequivocally opposed to the whole Russian suggestion.

He said the United States in view of the boys it has fighting in Korea "is more eager than anyone else to see a swift settlement, but is gravely worried that the Soviet maneuver would have the opposite effect."

The surprise proposal unveiled yesterday calls for a security council meeting to attempt "a testing of world opinion, starting with the Korean armistice negotiations deadlocked in Panmunjom and the Acheson-plan program for the Korean peninsula."

In a nearby tent at Panmunjom allied truce negotiators asked for an explanation of reports that the communists are shipping captured warplanes to North Korea. They also accused red China of releasing soldiers of Korean origin from the Korean peninsula.

Nothing Wrong Chinese Maj.-Gen. Hsieh Pang said there was nothing wrong in this. He labeled the entire plan "a ridiculous rumor."

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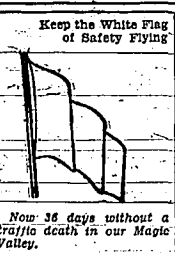

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Food costs in American budgets were down 1.2 percent during the first nine months of 1961, the agriculture department reported today.

This was 28 percent of consumers' disposable income and the same percentage spent for food in 1950, when food costs and income were lower. In 1950 per capita food expenditures averaged \$346.

U.S. Korean War Toll Now 103,739

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—An American battle casualties in Korea now total 103,739, an increase of 321 since last week's report, the defense department said.

The figures represent casualties whose next of kin have been notified through last Friday. It does not reflect all casualties through that period because it requires from one to three weeks to notify next of kin. The total casualties include 17,254 deaths, 73,392 wounded, 11,027 missing, 174 captured, 1,192 previously reported missing but returned to service.

Vaccinations Set Record for State
