was discovered the termites had sunk into the floor joists and were eating away at the wood.

The job has been on the ground with no ventilation. The city replaced the joists and floor, added ventilation for the space under the room and treated the joists with a preservative.

For removal of all stumps and roots from the soil, before a new building is erected, to a depth of at least 18 inches below the surface of the ground.

For use of all-terrain rubber-heel shoes on the floor, trade treaded or any species of wood if treated under pressure with an approved preservative.

For removal of wood forms for concrete if they are kept in the ground level or less than 18 inches above the ground.

Against storage of loose wood in direct contact with the ground under any building.
