### Care of Your Children

I can't seem to get my child to do anything that I want him to do. A good child but somehow we don't hit it off at all. What's the matter with me?

Nothing, I am sure, but inexperienced, and that's something that life can cure. Children do not come into the world with disciplined natures and nice habits. These have to be taught by the slow, hard way of daily practice.

Teaching a child anything is a job and time must be allowed for it. Just any time at all will not do. Waiting for a convenient time will not serve. Suppose you want to teach the baby to go to the toilet every morning and to remain there until he attends to duty. Make a job of it. Get the child ready and be careful not to frighten or weary him beforehand. Put him in his place every day. Encourage him but say little. Just stay by waiting.

Now that is a task there is work waiting to be done. Let it go; this time has been set aside for this one job. Stay by it and see that it is attended to no matter what. Once, twice, and the habit is well on its way to being set. Be sure to attend to it at the same time, in the same way, every day and reward the child with praise when he does well. Don't skip a time; don't change the hour or the place once it has been set.

This same routine is indicated in teaching any habit to a child. He will not learn at one lesson. He will take many repeated experiences. Be sure that the first time ends in success; your child will not try again or so, then begin again but at a different hour, in a different place. Time, place, setting, mental atti-

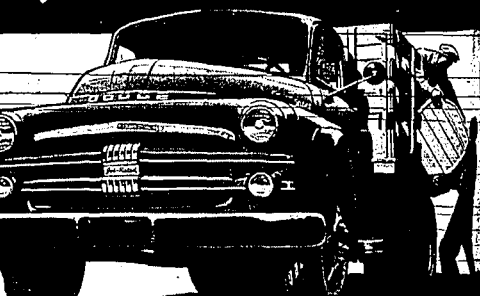

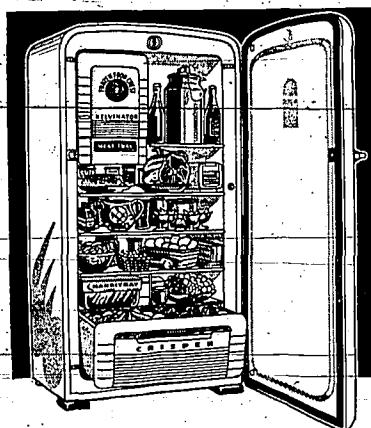
