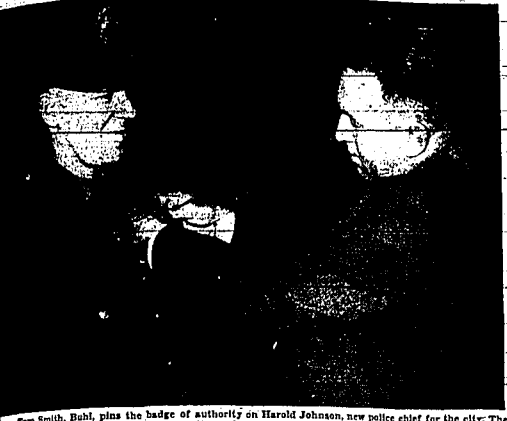

Traffic Death Toll in Rockies Area Hit New High During '51

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 10 (AP)—Deaths from traffic accidents on the highways of Rocky mountain states climbed to shocking new levels in 1951.

Wyoming. It was their second successive year of record high. Utah's death toll was higher than in 1949 but fell short of the 1948 record.

The somber toll stood at 1,513 deaths in six states, a jump of 63 from the previous year. Two states broke all previous records.
