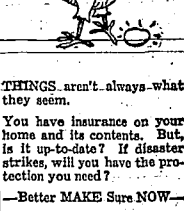

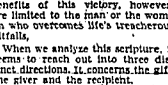

Idaho Falls Routs Twin Falls 60-39 In Big Six Battle

Controlling play all the way, the Idaho Falls Tigers out-classed the Twin Falls Bruins 60-39 in a Friday night in a Big Six conference contest. In other Big Six action Friday, the undefeated Caldwell Cougars rolled over Pocatello 53-40.

The nifty Tigers, paced by six-foot, five-inch Joe Lockyer, had little trouble with the Idaho Bruins who were their worst showing of the young season. Idaho Falls was ahead from the opening seconds.

The Bruins, still shocked by the death of a team member, displayed none of the aggressive spirit and brilliant basketball play they have utilized to advantage in earlier games.

By comparison, Idaho Falls' attack worked like clock-work and its defense was tight.

The defending state class A champions shot ahead to a 12-2 lead at the end of the first quarter and pushed the margin along to 27-18 at the half. Idaho Falls was coasting along with a 41-20 lead going into the final quarter. At one point in the fourth frame, Idaho Falls led by 24 points.

Lockyer sank the first basket of the game seconds after the opening jump and it was followed by quick baskets by Jay Webb and Neil Sedgwick. Les Bartlett hit the first basket, a 25-footer for Twin Falls, and that 6-3 score was the closest the Bruins came all evening.

After that, the Twin Falls boys could get only one shot away at the basket as the Tigers, holding a big height advantage, swept both baskets.

Defensive honors for Idaho Falls went to Eddie E. Brown, while Lockyer paced the offense with 18 points. Bartlett on offense and Bud Sweet on defense stood out for the Bruins.

It was the second straight conference loss for Twin Falls. The Bruins dropped a nip and tuck battle with Caldwell after struggling in Nampa in the conference opener. It was Idaho Falls' initial conference win. The Tigers had dropped games to both Boise and Caldwell, who pace the league with 10 wins.

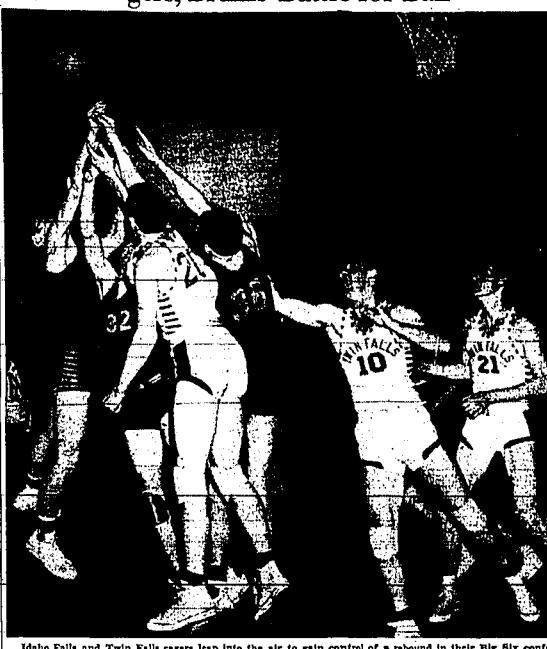
