NEW YORK, Jan. 14 (AP)—A North-east airlines Convair plane came down on the East River today, with 36 persons aboard were rescued by life rafts.

Not often have we Americans any cause to regret the passing of a top Russian communist figure. But we may properly mourn the death of Maxim Litvinov as almost the only symbol in the Soviet union of a once better type of leadership.

For a decade, from 1929 to 1933, he was the Kremlin's foreign minister. In that span, Russia emerged from its isolationist cocoon, gained general diplomatic recognition for its revolutionary regime, won a seat in the old League of Nations.

Litvinov was a decisive promoter of all these developments, and when he moved onto the League scene at Geneva in the mid-1930's, he became a bulwark of support for the old League doctrine of collective security.

With militant Japan, Germany and finally Italy bolting the League in the thirties, Litvinov's activities helped the stunned democracies to keep hopes of peace alive.

But Litvinov never had the courage or capacity to act in real crisis, and Litvinov did not give it that.

By the time of Munich in 1938, Geneva was virtually dead as a center of peace-making effort. The spotlight had shifted back to persons like Chamberlain, Daladier, Hitler and Mussolini.

Litvinov's usefulness plainly was at an end. He was dismissed, his position became threatening gestures toward Poland. To any realist, it was evident Hitler was not to be dissuaded from the path of conquest.

Stalin, hoping to buy the Nazi dictator off, or at least to buy time, made ready to conclude his infamous deal with Germany. Litvinov was shunned.

Termites Not New Here; Expert Points Out Ways to Control Wood-Eating Bugs

"Lots of times you don't find out about termite damage until you fall through the floor," said J. R. Douglas, a prominent entomologist in the discovery of termite damage in the old city hall and the city's early enforcement of termite control provisions of the building code.

Douglas, who is the entomologist in charge of the local station of the U. S. bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, said he and his staff have been receiving an increasing number of calls to identify termites.

But he added he doesn't know if that means more termites or just more people noticing them through more people living in termite damaged in relatively new homes have been reported to him.

Douglas said calls for termite identification have been coming into the station for a good many years. "I've been reading about them being in this area and they're found in every state of the country."

The wood-eating insects have been found on entomology station stakes in desert experimental tracts as far as in the jungles of the desert. Entomologists even found termites in a post in the station's grounds.

Douglas warned termites can work all winter in houses with partial or dirt basements if the basements are warm. The insects attack all but special types of wood. The damage to the wood is done in the first report here, he said.

"Termites, of the ground-nesting varieties found here, nest in the nation's residences many millions of dollars annually for repairs and concrete measures, and the U. S. publication on damage prevention and control of the insects. It creates preventive measures than cure and states:

"Some infested buildings will require only fairly simple treatments, others, repairs or chemical treatments, all of which can be made under the supervision of the owner.

Ex-Convict's Revenge Attempt Boomerangs; He's in Hospital

BOISE, Jan. 14 (AP)—An ex-convict's attempt at revenge on an Idaho hospital guard resulted in the former prisoner was in a hospital today, charged with robbery.

Sheriff Don J. H. Smith notified the ex-convict at Delmar Theater, Swatzenberg, 36, Pocatello. He received multiple head injuries in a fight on lonely Highland valley road with L. A. Painter. The cab driver, Headrick Quoted Shelby as telling this story:

Shelby was sitting in his cab at a downtown intersection yesterday when Swatzenberg pushed Painter into the taxi at gunpoint and ordered Shelby to take them out on the Idaho city road.

He threatened to kill Shelby when the cab driver reached for his taxi radio microphone. He robbed Painter, saying "You won't need any money here you're going."

He threatened to kill Painter "at least 20 times as they drove along the road until the car became stuck in mud. Shelby stopped the car, and Swatzenberg told Painter to "get your prayers." The cab driver said "if you're going to kill this guy, don't do it here and mess up my mob."

As Swatzenberg turned to get out, Painter lunged at him. The men went out into the mud. Swatzenberg firing one shot over his shoulder as they tumbled down a slope. Painter grabbed a rock and knocked out Swatzenberg. The two men bound the state penitentiary guard and brought him to a Boise hospital.

Headrick filed a robbery charge against Swatzenberg, but as Painter was after the guard because Painter assisted in a hanging at the state penitentiary.

Swatzenberg served two terms at the prison and was released last May after serving a sentence of 10 years.

Since his release, Swatzenberg has been a used car salesman at Pocatello, and was in Boise after delivering a car at Enterprise, Ore.

Retail Prices Of Food Rise

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Wholesale prices were unchanged for the week ended Jan. 8, but retail food prices climbed 0.4 of 1 per cent from Dec. 15 to Dec. 29.

The bureau of labor statistics yesterday reported the wholesale price index at 171.2, with the 1926 average as 100. This was 1.1 per cent above the year ago and 12.9 per cent above the month before Korea fighting began.

The retail food price index was 222.8, using the 1923-9 average as 100. This was 0.8 of 1 per cent below a month before, according to an eight-city survey of grocery prices, and almost 15 per cent higher than pre-Korea.

The retail survey showed a 2.6 per cent gain, caused mainly by seasonal factors, in prices of fresh fruits and vegetables. Butter, 2 per cent higher, now stands at the highest price since mid-1934.
