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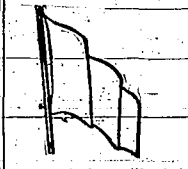
None Hurt in Crash Series On Icy Roads

Now he thinks that while we must continue an international aid program, we must not put the rest of the world on a permanent dole.

"Our present task," as he sees it, "is to find modern ways whereby we can serve the world as did our forebears. We must think more in terms of what is the right thing to do, and thus get into harmony with the powerful force of moral law."

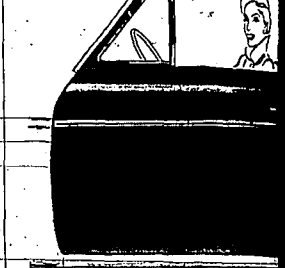

De-Emphasis Move Draws Label Biggest Trend of Year in Sports

NEW YORK, Jan. 16 (AP)—The outstanding trend, or characteristic, of the season was the nationwide cry for "deemphasis of college football" in the majority of sports writers and broadcasters who participated in the Associated Press poll. The leading development was the disclosure that some of the finest college ball players in the land had been guilty of throwing games or shaving points, with the consequent public loss of confidence in the sport.

These two facets of the campaign just ended mentioned on nearly 40 percent of the scoresheet surveys sent in. "The 'cribbing' scandal at West Point, which resulted in the expulsion of 40 athletes, also placed high in the memories of the men who record the sports scene. Typical of the comments about the campaign to cool off college football were the following: "I hope to see college football into a more common sense operation and remove the stigma of substitution and cheating."

"Unfortunately the trend was toward one of suspicion, also a clamor for greater regulation."

Other trends noted by the balloters included: "General aversion against the bowl games, with eventual elimination probable." "Scrutiny of some major league baseball clubs to fact that their network broadcasting of games is definitely harmful to attendance."

"Paul Richards' Chicago White Sox team is the one of great numbers of substitutes as coaches try to keep every body happy by playing reserve."

"Scrutiny of all sports, notably college athletics, for actual values and fitness of the game in general."

"Closing of the book shops by the new federal licensing law."

"The 'ridiculous' and unworkable relationship to sports attendance."
