The bureau statement said construction activities would provide 200,000 jobs in 1952 and another 200,000 in 1953.

Hells Canyon Is 1 of 4 "New Starts" Desired by President

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (Special)—Hells canyon was one of four "new starts" recommended by the President in his budget message today.

The others are the St. Lawrence project in New York, the Hartwell reservoir in South Carolina, and the Snake river locks and dam on the Snake river near Walla Walla, Wash.

The president's message authorized the St. Lawrence development and Hells canyon power project re-

quire authorization by the congress. I again urge the congress to authorize these two projects without delay.

"The accelerating pace of defense production, coupled with the anticipated expansion in civilian needs, is placing a growing demand on our power-producing facilities. Of the \$135,000,000 of expenditures for projects under way by the corps of engineers and the bureau of reclamation in 1951, about \$150,000,000 or over 50 per cent will be spent on multiple-purpose projects providing power benefits.

"These four new projects and units will provide ultimate capacity of 3,500,000 kilowatts. This capacity, together with the 2,000,000 kilowatts presently installed in federal projects, will ultimately be in production under way, will make a substantial addition to our power supply.

"In order to make it possible to meet defense power requirements in the Pacific northwest, it also is recommended that legislation be enacted to authorize the construction, operation and maintenance of full-fired electric-generating plants. Such plants would provide an early increase in capacity and would make more effective existing hydroelectric facilities.

"The steam plants would be located in Washington and have been authorized by the War Relocation Authority. He contends they would require coal and steel needs of more vital use and produce far more costly electricity than by water. Their advocates, like Rep. Henry Jackson, D. Wash., contend, however, they are necessary to backstop hydro-electric dams during water shortages.

Use of American Produce Advised

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 21 (AP)—A spokesman for Utah's wool growing industry called today for "an American market for American products."

James A. Hooper, executive secretary for the Utah Wool Growers Association, spoke at the annual meeting of the Utah Wool Marketing association, a session preceding the opening tomorrow of the wool growers' convention.

"The entire livestock industry," Hooper said, "is dependent on Italian, control and support price, but strongly favors an American market for American products."

U. S. Savings Rise at Peak Pace in 1951

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—Americans saved a whopping 414,900,000 in the fourth quarter of 1951. September through December, the savings and exchange commission (SECO) has reported.

The liquid savings—those easily converted to cash—totalled \$5,700,000,000, the highest amount since the fourth quarter of 1949. Such savings in the comparable period of 1950 were only \$4,500,000,000.

The commission said the high rate of savings in the third quarter last year reflects a further rise in disposable income and a leveling off of consumer spending. In addition, the commission noted, there appears to have been a diversion of funds from non-liquid savings, such as the purchase of new home appliances.

Dank deposits, equity in savings and loan associations, private and government insurance, and repurchase agreements and certificates of deposit are included in liquid savings.

Reserve liquid savings, the commission listed three quarters ago, totalled \$1,200,000,000 in the purchase of bonds and \$2,000,000,000 spent on the purchase of consumer durable goods.

Individuals reduced their holdings of U. S. savings bonds by \$100,000,000 in the third quarter of 1951, compared with an increase of \$200,000,000 in the second quarter, and a decrease of \$200,000,000 in the first and second quarters.

Pueblo's Newest School Named After Janitor Who Made Career of His Job

PUEBLO, Colo. (NEA)—On the newest school in this city are the words "George Spann Junior High School." The school is named after a janitor who made a career of his job.

School officials say it's the first time in American history that a school has been named in honor of a still-living custodian. They say the school is named after Spann because he has been a janitor since he was 14, and he has been a janitor for 37 years.

To students he was "dad away from home," a guidance officer, a counselor, a provider of quarters and fights and a healer of wounds.

School officials put it, this way: "Though he performs his janitorial tasks dutifully, Spann's extra-curricular work with the children highlights his 37-year service with the school.

And teachers and his school principal say: "He's unassuming, his work is unobtrusive. I don't know what he would do without him when he's gone."

The terrorists used a new technique. They attached plastic time bombs to bicycles, rode the bicycles into the crowded center of the city, and abandoned them beside government office buildings.

Police found one bicycle before the bomb attached to it exploded. They rendered the bomb harmless.
