## ANOTHER FARCE

A few weeks ago President Truman jointly promised "no drastic action" in winding up corrupt officials from the Internal Revenue bureau, the Justice department and other federal agencies.

He indicated at that time that he would set up some sort of commission to make independent inquiry into these agencies. Justice Thomas McGrath, who had been in leadership of this group, but later withdrew.

Thereupon Mr. Truman apparently changed his mind, but he seems to have decided that matters were not so serious after all, and that he could "get by" without radical remedies.

Confirmation of this shift came a short time back when the President told the country that the necessary "clean-up" would henceforth be directed by Attorney General McGrath.

This was a sharp shift in the face to all American citizens who are sincerely concerned over the present moral standards in their government. McGrath's name has been used which itself has been found guilty of corrupt activity.

It is this attitude of the President's which has caused the indignation of his party. In other words, he wants a political rather than a moral solution.

There is just a chance that the President is sufficiently aware of the impact these scandals have made, to realize that such feeble clean-up tactics will not likely impress the electorate.

If that is true, his probable import is that Mr. Truman is genuinely tired of the presidency, doesn't want to run again, and doesn't much care what anybody thinks about how he handles the job.

This may not be a proper interpretation of the President's action. But this much is certain: The designating of McGrath as chief of clean-up is farcical as an earnest move of a man who is not concerned whether he ever gets another vote.

## IT DOESN'T ADD UP

Economists have no great stature as prophets. Only an embarrassing few foresaw the economic "crisis" which is now facing us. In fact, some of the best of them forecast 8,000,000 unemployed. They proved far too pessimistic.

Now five eminent specialists have told the United Nations that prosperous years will be the rule here and in the period just ahead. They're talking about the United States and most of the other free nations.

They believe there may be a "recession" from time to time, but they don't look for a depression. And in a period of recession, they think prosperity will be "not merely around the corner but in full view."

This isn't the first occasion when economists have disagreed. In a few years ago we have known them to be of the past. The great feeling: these days is that governments simply won't let them happen, that there are too many artificial devices which can be used—successfully—to shore up a sagging economy.

No question about the existence of these devices, or of government determination to use them. But what these economists are predicting now would be a lot more encouraging if they would only explain how we are going to get out from under our staggering national debt with a policy of deficit spending.

# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The inside story of how the Truman administration is high-pressureing Iran into making a petroleum settlement with England makes an interesting study of the "oil politics" of Franklin D. Roosevelt and Cordell Hull tried to scrap forever.

The oil interests who have resolved the dispute long ago, if it had not been for the top-level opposition of the American oil companies. They have dragged these firms into supporting the two nations' economic boycott against Iran, which is designed to produce a collapse and surrender in this middle country lying along Russia's border.

**DANGER**—The international oil trust recently entered the dispute in an attempt to solve it on a straight, businesslike basis fair to both sides. But the American-Europe axis interposed diplomatic objections which may throw Premier Mosaddeq into the arms of Stalin, although the Iranian leader has not yet accepted the Soviet ultimatum.

With adjacent countries sharing Iran's indignation against the oil trust, as demonstrated by the tragic killings in Egypt and along the Suez canal, there is grave danger that the vital and economic middle east may become another "hot" China.

**PRIZE**—That outcome would give Stalin a rich prize neither the Kaiser nor Hitler ever were able to achieve. It would give Russia a vast oil empire, manpower and the raw materials of India, possibly Africa.

The oil trust is also active in the Middle East. It is the United States which will make up in one way or another for the \$600,000,000 British loans annually because of the disappearance of Iranian oil from her markets. We also are draining our own tight supplies of petroleum by sharing them with the British so they can continue to serve their customers.

**SHORFALL**—In a recent statement, a spokesman for the oil trust admitted a "shortfall" of oil for our present habitat. He said: "We have consumed practically all of our oil reserve capacity in the United States and in Europe. We are unable to advance large sums to carry Iran through the difficulties we have helped to create. We already have appropriated \$200,000,000 under the Lend-Lease program, and there is talk of another \$75,000,000 grant or loan."

**ROUNDABOUT**—Secretary Acheson leaped into the controversy on the side of the British as soon as it began. He summoned representatives of the major oil companies to his office. He wanted to know what they thought they were not to try to take advantage of Britain's plight by buying Iranian oil or serving her needs with other oil. He wanted to know what they thought to gobble the British market, for they sell in the same area.

The oil trust's attitude went further. He forced them to share a portion of their production with the British so as to ease the drain on London's dollar supply. He wanted to know what they thought of the "oil" which we give foreign help. This system means extra costs, of course, for the British bankers have to finance the oil trust's operations in the Middle East.

In view of their frequent dependence on diplomatic commitments from Washington, the American oil firms had to comply.

**VIOLATION**—This pooling arrangement is administered by a special supply committee that has been set up in the Middle East. It is a clear case of deliberate and official violation of our laws against price fixing and cartels.

**CHAPMAN**—The oil trust's chairman and Secretary Acheson whose experts conceived and perfected the scheme, have promised the participants immunity from prosecution after consultation with Attorney General McGrath.

The Anglo-American "operation Iran" has several phases. The first is to make sure that the United States and department of state to formulate and execute a major foreign policy without asking the consent of the United States. It is a "back door" bill of implications. Mr. Truman and Acheson describe it as a "mere business adjustment."

### Evangelist Blasts Washington As Nation's Most Sinful City

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23—Baptist minister Graham, after one week's crusading among businessmen and government workers, today labeled Washington "the most sinful city he ever visited."

The Billy Graham revival team moved into town Jan. 13 for a four-week campaign intended to

waken the spiritual conscience of national leaders and dignitaries.

The energetic 37-year-old revivalist already has drawn a cumulative total of 20,000 persons for his nightly rallies and broadcast lectures at the national guard armory, Washington's biggest auditorium.

But Graham said in an interview his work here has barely begun.

"Washington needs a spiritual awakening more than any city I've ever been to," the minister said. "I've only begun to see what a place here—drinking parties... the way influence is bought... a disregard for morals in the realm of sex."

Graham said he is "disgusted and nauseated" by what he has seen and what he has heard.

"It is unbelievable," he said. "I'm certain the true story of Washington's corruption is not known."

They really increase your hearing so fine that you can pick out every note and then the right theme sort of jazz in your joints and blood. You cannot keep still; but, believe me, when it wears off you droop. You're tired. I even saw shadows and things looked double. It gets my legs. They get slow. "Then you grab and grab for another stick (cigarette). I will tell you what my first stick did to me. Water ran out of my eyes. I choked and coughed. I had a rash of funny spots all over me which made me very happy and oh, what music!" "Just when I was high, my girl friend told me to come on up to the bathroom with her. I went. She got a mirror and applied and spread one cap (capsule) of heroin on it. She took a razor blade and divided it into five even parts. This was a five-grain cap of heroin. She gave me a stare and she had one. She snorted the other two. And I snorted the other two. And I snorted my first heroin. It tasted something like quinine to me. It took a few minutes to act. "I began vomiting. My stomach contracted and I had an awful pain. A week later I went back to my girl friend's house and I told her what had happened and she laughed. I told her I didn't like it. But I tell you, something within me made me go back. "Her brother was there and he laughed, and then she said, 'You have not really had a kick. I will give you a real one much better than that.' "He got a hypo and a needle, and he told me to come into the kitchen. He light heroin in a cooker, filled the hypo and took my arm. That was my first shot. "I vomited again but soon I felt a change. My face got slack. I looked in the mirror and saw my mouth was drooping. I began scratching my face and rubbing my nose. This feeling passed right into a feeling of relief. It was swell. I got gay. Just everything was all right with me. "And an addict was born into the world of physical and moral wrecks from which so few return. One teeny age felt like a cold sensation: 'I try to the point where I couldn't stop. I kept having sickness, headache, vomiting, swelling of the legs, cardiums beating, sweating, until there was nothing else's ocean do except continually keep using it.' "Another girl said: 'It has made me lose interest in the life. You know, when you are on that stuff you don't care what comes or goes or who you hurt or whatever you do. You just think about yourself.' "And from the files of the U. S. Narcotics Bureau is the story of a Chicago boy named Al who became an addict at 15. Al attended high school where his friends smoked marijuana cigarettes. Al began smoking them too, just for the sensation it gave him and to be of the gang. "But after six months the pot (marijuana) wasn't enough. He wasn't getting the same hit and feeling of excitement he had experienced before. He complained about it to his friends. " 'Why don't you try snorting?' one of them said. Others agreed it was the thing to do if he wanted a real kick. "So Al began snorting cocaine. It was expensive stuff, cocaine, smuggled into this country from abroad through the underworld that takes an estimated \$125,000,000 a year from narcotics addicts. Al needed at least \$10 a day for his habit. He began stealing from his parents and then from others, swiping stolen goods for money with which to buy cocaine. "Then one day a dope peddler sold Al some heroin. He took it to the home of a friend who showed him how to 'maintain the dope' to clean the veins of his arm. He had a tingling feeling all over his body. For a few hours he felt happy. All his frustrations faded away. "Al quit school. His friends taught him how to 'hook up' to shoplift in department stores to get the \$10 to \$20 a day he needed for dope. The police caught him, of course, and sent him to jail. But he was out in a few months, back to the same old neighborhood—the same friends, the same environment—and the same slave world of narcotics trapped 'im Yeller.' "He has no trouble for Al to find the narcotics. In almost every city of any size in the country street peddlers wait to keep Al and his kind supplied with narcotics for a price.
