Captured Photographer Sends Photos From Red Prison Camp

TOKYO, Jan. 28—Frank (Pappy) Noel is taking pictures for the world's newspapers again. The 52-year-old Associated Press photographer who disappeared behind the Yalu river in the communist capture by the Chinese reds on Nov. 20, 1950, has sent out a few photos taken in a communist prison. "Pappy" took the pictures with a regular news camera, sent to him by another communist prisoner, AP photographer, Bob Schultz, New Jersey. Schultz gave his own camera to a Chinese news correspondent on Jan. 2, 1952. That began a fanciful chain of camera-passing which finally got the equipment all the way to Peking. The reds developed the pictures and made prints for their own con-

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Radio Assists in Power Line Job

FAIRFIELD, Jan. 28—The recently-installed two-way short-wave radio of the Pacific Power cooperative facilitated the switch-over to power from Anderson Ranch dam last week. Pacific Power had been strived with electricity from Idaho Power company because of the recent heavy snow.

Workers were able to communicate with the office in Fairfield, where the main transmitter is located, from trouble spots on the line.

At a later date a transmitter will be installed on the top of the mountain above Anderson Ranch dam for use by the power house personnel in communicating with the Fairfield office.

Analysis of Seven Sources of Revenue Included in Survey of City's Finances

An analysis of seven revenue sources other than property taxes was given city commissioners by City Manager William R. Smith last week in his review of this city's finances.

He pointed out state limitations on mill levies, such as the 20-mill limit for the general fund, restricted to the amount of revenue which can be raised from taxes on real and personal property.

"Thus the adequate and reasonable assessment of property is mandatory," his report stated. "Property assessment is another problem unique to the property tax."

On this phase of revenue the report stated most cities consider the property tax overvalued and are looking to other revenue sources where increasing expenses make additional revenue necessary.

On other phases of revenue, the report described state grants-in-aid and locally shared taxes as sources used rather widely in other states but pointed out they are limited in Idaho. Twin Falls shares in two such sources, state liquor sales and gasoline-taxes which together are expected to bring this city \$775,000 for the current fiscal year.

On seven other sources of revenue the city manager's report stated:

1. Admission taxes refer to collection on such amusements as theaters, sporting events, community plays and others. Federal government licenses has levied this tax since 1917 and the first state to levy the tax was Connecticut in 1921.

"Such taxes are used by 15 per cent of the cities throughout the country with a population of over 10,000. Certain cities charge a flat sum per ticket while others use a unit that is a proportion of the admission charge."

2. Business and occupational licenses are becoming increasingly more popular, and most of the legislation of this nature have adopted this means for increased revenue.

"It has been felt for some time that the city of Twin Falls should have a central register of all businesses within its limits for information and investigative purposes. The approach could be one of three—a flat registration fee for every business, a license fee based on the type and scope of business involved or a tax on gross receipts."

3. Cigarette and tobacco tax is not quite so popular among cities as number one and two. At least 20 municipalities levied this type of tax in 1950. Here again care must be taken to make certain that the authority for such taxation is granted by the state of Idaho.

4. Garbage and refuse service charges. Service charges using the direct recipient of the service pay the cost are gaining favor more rapidly than any other means of raising revenue.

"A charge for rubbish and garbage collection is the most popular of all throughout the country and also in the state of Idaho where several of the larger and smaller municipalities make use of this service charge."

"Twin Falls tends to charge somewhere in the neighborhood of \$1 per residence, some \$50,000 in revenue would be received each year."

5. Income and earnings tax: At least 24 municipalities over 10,000 population taxed incomes of individuals and earnings of business in 1950. Because both the federal and state governments use this source of revenue, some employing one-half of one per cent and others one per cent locally.

6. Sewer rentals: This service charge would be particularly useful if the city were to bear the cost of installing lateral sewer lines as well as maintain them. At that the maintenance cost amounts to some three and one-half times the amount of the rental fee for this purpose."

7. Dredging of a ship channel in the Orinoco river in Venezuela will be finished this year. Its purpose is to top one of the world's richest iron ore reserves.

Income of Forests Shows Big Boost

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (AP)—National forest receipts in the second half of 1951 reached a new high of \$41,700,145—nearly 80 per cent more than in the same period of 1950, the agriculture department reported today.

Sale of timber and other forest products accounted for \$41,680,573 of the total. The remainder came from the rental of land and fees for grazing of livestock on national forest lands.

Twenty-five per cent of all national forest receipts are turned over to the various states for public schools and roads in counties including national forests.

Drive Against Crime Moving To High Gear

The federal government's coordinated nationwide drive against organized crime moved into high gear today.

U. S. district attorneys, working under direct orders from Atty. Gen. J. Howard McGrath, will be collaborating with local prosecutors and police to gather evidence for prosecution and juries throughout the country.

The attack could develop into the best coordinated and most active ever launched in an attempt to wipe out organized gangsterism.

Scattered protests
There were, however, scattered rumblings against the big-scale drive. Some newspapers and political groups charged that the general administration merely was trying to divert attention from the scandals in the government.

At Chicago, U. S. Dist. Atty. Otto Kerner Jr., called a meeting for tomorrow of prosecutors from 18 northern Illinois counties to gather information for a "grand jury investigation of organized crime."

Jurors Recalled
At Kansas City, where the Kefauver committee found evidence of widespread racketeering in President Truman's home country, Dist. Atty. Sam West recalled a grand jury that has been organized since November, 1950, because "the members are familiar with many phases of crime in this area."

Similar actions were reported from San Francisco, Houston, Tex., Los Angeles, Des Moines, Ia., Columbus, O., and Hartford, Conn.

Cotton Aid Law OK, Solon Says
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 28 (AP)—Sen. Allen J. Ellender today said the price support law for cotton should not be changed except as a "last resort."

The Louisiana Democrat, who heads the senate agriculture committee, said that farmers, by working together, "can take care of themselves fairly well under present laws and programs."

In a speech before the National Cotton Council, Ellender said Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan has authorized under present law to raise price supports for cotton to the necessary 1951 level of 16.25 cents per pound.

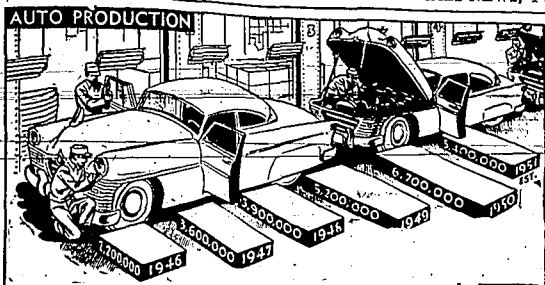

Price Posting Trial Started For 3 Towns

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Dollars-and-cents ceiling prices posted up in grocery stores in three cities today as the effect of price stabilization launched an experiment in "community food pricing."

The posters, which fix a community-wide price ceiling on 350 to 400 "dry" grocery items plus butter and packaged cereals, were placed in stores in Fargo, N. D., Fresno, Calif., and Jacksonville, Fla.

The pricing system—similar to that employed in World War II—is designed to give the housewife an easily identifiable ceiling price on food items, as well as to relieve the grocer of some of his bookkeeping burdens. If the experiment is successful, the system will be extended to other parts of the nation.

The posters, which are revised periodically by OPS, list dollars-and-cents ceilings, computed by adding a standard markup for each category of store to representative wholesale prices in the area.

Present OPS rulings, the individual grocer must figure his own ceilings by adding his customary markup to the wholesale price of the goods. He does not, however, have to post a dollars-and-cents ceiling price on the items.

3,800-Foot Drop in Downdraft Injures Five on Airline Plane

CLEVELAND, Jan. 23.—Eighteen passengers on a Capital Airlines coach plane were tossed about and five injured today when a sudden downdraft caused the ship to drop 3,800 feet before leveling off.

The five were taken to nearby Berea community hospital after Pilot William Mason, Washington, radioed for a doctor and an ambulance to meet the plane on its arrival at Cleveland.

One person was released after treatment and none of the others was believed injured seriously.

The plane, flight 885 from Washington to Chicago via Pittsburgh and Cleveland, was flying near East Liverpool, O., at 6,000 feet when the accident happened.

Arthur J. Gerard, 40, Newark, N.J., who sustained a possibly fractured rib, said, "It was a miracle no one was killed."

"We were all sleeping," said Gerard. "I woke up with a feeling I was going forward. Then I hit the ceiling. The next thing I knew I was in the aisle, partly blinded out."

Budge Says His Water Grab Bill Given Panel OK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Rep. Homer Budge, R., Ida., says a bill he introduced to compel federal officials to conform with state laws regarding water resources has been reported out of the House irrigation and reclamation committee.

Budge said the bill is designed to prevent a recurrence of a situation similar to that on the Santa Margarita river in California where the government brought suit against private farmers alleging it had paramount right to the waters of the river.

He co-authored the bill with Representative Ehgle, R., Calif. It would require federal agencies to conform with the laws of the states and territories in water resource development, including the furnishing of water to the national defense installations.

The California case concerned a defense installation for which the government was seeking water.

Meteor Sizes Vary Greatly, Pruitt Avows

By J. HUGH PRUITT
Astronomer, Estabrook Division of the U. S. Air Corps.
The question is asked often as to the size of meteorites which reach the surface of the earth. Are they always small bits of matter, or do occasional falls of considerable size occur?

Small meteorites are burned entirely at great heights—likely 50 miles or higher in the air. Larger ones are regarded as no larger than a pea. They produce the "shooting stars" which are seen during their fiery flight through the atmosphere and the remainder reach the earth's surface. Approximately 1,500 authenticated "falls" are on record throughout the world.

Also Known as: record meteorites—they range from mere dust particles to huge Hoba West, likely considerably over 50 tons) which still lies in its place in the southwest African desert.

The largest find in the United States and Canada—15th in size in the world—is the 25-ton Willamette, recognized as meteorite in 1912 as it lay partly embedded on a hillside across the Nemah river from Oregon city.

Second, third and fourth in known size are the Cape York (5 tons), the Chicoutimi (30 tons) and the Chicoutimi (30 tons) and Chupaderos (25 tons) in Mexico. The Cape York and Willamette are now in the American museum of natural history, New York City. The Chicoutimi meteorites are at the school of mines, Mexico City.

Metallic Types
Those mentioned are all metallic meteorites, composed principally of iron with a smaller content of nickel. There are many more of this type which weigh more than a ton.

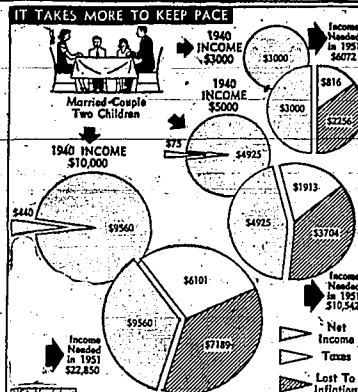
Stony meteorites fracture much more easily during their aerial flight. The largest known in this class was seen to fall in Furness county, Neb., Feb. 18, 1846.

Subjects of Fall
The Willamette meteorite has an interesting human connection. Lawyers regarding its ownership finally settled the matter in supreme court in July, 1905, with the verdict that the meteorite, although embedded in the earth, and the land and coal subsequently belong to the owner of the land on which they are found.

While the Willamette was on display at the Lewis and Clark exposition in Portland in 1905, a life-size plaster model was made. This is at present on the porch of McClure hall at the University of Oregon.

Third of U. S. People Listed In Vet Count

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The veterans administration figures one-third of the nation's population consists of veterans and their families. It estimates the figure will increase to 40 per cent by 1955.

This new statistical compilation is based on data up to 1944.

It showed there are now 18,823,000 living veterans of all U. S. wars, not including the Korean campaign. This means two out of every five men are war veterans.

Books Closed for '45
There are now about 248,000 veterans of World War I and 1,510,000 of World War II. Other veterans' records stretch back to the Civil War. The books were closed on the War of 1818 in 1948 when the last dependent died. The last veteran of the Mexican war died in 1929 at the age of 98.

The VA figures one out of every 10 persons in the country is a veteran of World War II. This includes roughly 20 out of every three men between the ages of 20 and 35.

Other figures show that four of every five veterans are married and that two out of three live in the home. A total of 20,000,000 persons has served in the armed forces in wars since the American Revolution.

There are 685,000 patients hospitalized by the VA, with 84,000 of them neuropsychiatric patients and 18,600 of them blind patients.

VA in November was paying monthly compensation and pensions to 2,250,000 living veterans of all wars since and including the Civil War, and also was paying claims to 412,000 widows, 397,000 children and 346,000 dependent parents of deceased veterans.

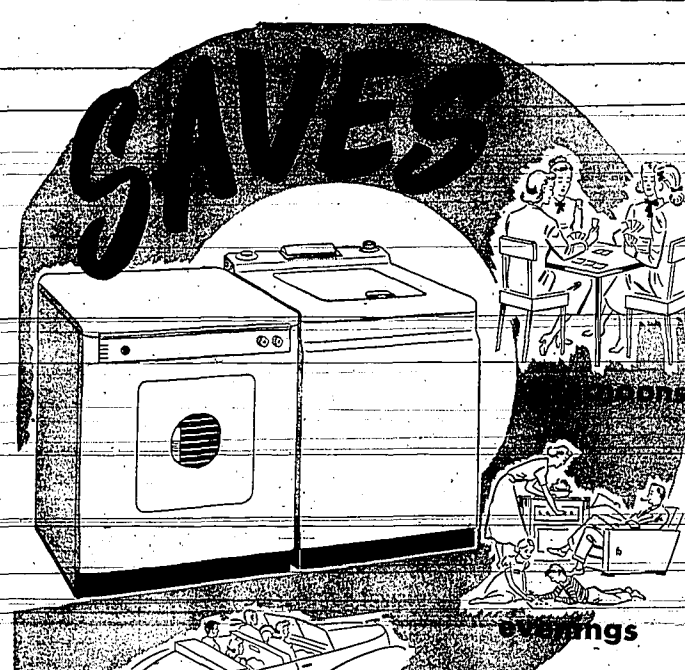

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Power Hikes Are News in 1952 Models

DETROIT, Jan. 28—New model automobiles already introduced or in early prospect show a continuing increase in horsepower and torque.

In some instances the engineers have achieved the higher engine power without radical design changes. In others entirely new engines have been designed.

Rotating basic design, Buick has topped its Roadmaster model engine from 150 to 170-horsepower. Cadillac at 193 has added 20 horses and Olds at 160 is up 23 horsepower. At the same time compression ratios also have been increased.

Ford Ups Power

With new engines Ford is increasing the power output in all its 1952 models including Mercury and Lincoln. The Ford changes include a six-cylinder overhead valve engine and a new V-8 developing 110 horsepower against last year's 100.

General Chrysler division increased the engine efficiency in last year's models. However, DeSoto plans the introduction of a new V-8 in production for several months. Indications are the new models will be introduced next month or early in March.

Meanwhile several other large V-8 engines still are in prospect for 1953 model cars.

Carburetors Redesigned

Engine carburetors account for much of the power increase in the Cadillac, Buick and Oldsmobile engines. Although they are redesigned somewhat differently by each of the three manufacturers they are basically the same—unitary carburetors in one. They step up power output by a more uniform distribution of the fuel mixture.

In each instance the carburetor has four barrels instead of the customary two. Two start functioning only when a certain speed or more than half throttle operation is reached.

Of course some refinements have been necessary to handle the increased power. In some cases they are not of major proportions.
