WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (AP)—The House Judiciary committee voted today to investigate Attorney-General J. Howard McGrath's management of the justice department.

The committee in secret session adopted a resolution by Rep. Kenneth B. Keating, R. N. Y. The investigation will be conducted by four Democratic and three Republican committee members.

Keating has been calling for McGrath's resignation or ouster ever since President Truman fired T. Lamar Caudle as assistant attorney general in charge of tax fraud prosecutions.

In another phase of the tax scandal, House investigators voted to cite Henry W. Grunwald for contempt of Congress. Grunwald, mentioned in testimony about an alleged \$200,000 tax shakedown plot, had just refused for a second time to answer questions at a public hearing.

Russ Charge West Girding For War III

LONDON, Jan. 29 (AP)—Russia has taken "new steps" toward a third world war by planning a mid-east offensive, British officials said today.

The radio said a note handed the envoys of the three western powers in Turkey last night charged Moscow with planning to split the mid-east area into "zones of influence" and use this as a "weapon of their war plans."

The Soviet note broadcast by Moscow said the proposed mid-east command plans were "new steps of the United States, Britain and France in preparation for the third world war."

BRITAIN'S RECOVERY

Prime Minister Churchill for the most part is left Britain's real problems out of his disorientation. He is a man and other American officials. Those difficulties are economic, and they are very serious.

The British premier did exact a promise from us of more steel, which will have a definite bearing on one phase of the economic crisis, the materials shortage. But that is only part of the story.

The fundamental fact is that Britain's economic picture has shrunk alarmingly and is still contracting.

This has made Britain itself a top-heavy nation, overburdened with population, administrative and financial structure to fit a level of activity that no longer exists.

As parts of the empire have broken away, too often they have carried with them both markets and raw materials sources relied on by the British.

And, in a world of rising prices Britain has not been able to compete successfully with the United States and some other nations for markets in the world.

Unable to get the raw materials of manufactured products in sufficient volume, the British have not been able to sell enough goods to pay for the foodstuffs they need to feed their substantial population.

It is the country that is a great factory which is trying to maintain a full payroll of several thousand workers with too few orders.

The original postwar British loan and subsequent Marshall plan aid were like hypodermic shots that temporarily restored a luster to Britain's cheeks. They apparently solved nothing but simply postponed the day of reckoning.

That day may now be close. Churchill knows it will not be easy to ask an American congress for more money, especially since there is little profit such aid brings any lasting results.

What Britain must do is broaden its economic base until once more it approximates the well-established super-structure of financial resources that so long kept the nation pre-eminent among the world's economic powers.

Only then will it be able to keep its people well fed and healthy without the artificial straits of outside aid. It is a tall order. If Churchill can fill it he may make a peace-time mark greater than his wartime heroics. Evidently he understands the problem well; but there is no sign he sees how to solve it.

Without a solid program which will stand steadily downhill from its former greatness. Before it is the brutal example of Austria, where once-powerful Vienna serves so small an economic hinterland that it almost seems a city without a country.

London might not be another Vienna unless present trends are arrested.

And all free men must realize: A Britain reduced to secondary power would mean an immeasurable loss of strength to the forces fighting Russia. The task of safeguarding liberty would be immensely complicated. That is the stake in Britain's search-for-permanent-recovery.

Proposals to End Long Rail Dispute Rejected by Union

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—The Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen has rejected an emergency board's recommendations for settling a two-year dispute with the nation's railroads.

A union statement said it had expected the board to "try to ram down the employer's proposals and the unwarranted policies of the administration—and that is exactly what it did."

The brotherhood had refused to participate in the board's hearings, charging that board members were biased in favor of the carriers.

The union, with 50,000 members, is prohibited by law from conducting a strike for at least 30 days. A strike, which the carriers are under government seizure and any lawsuit could be halted by court injunction.

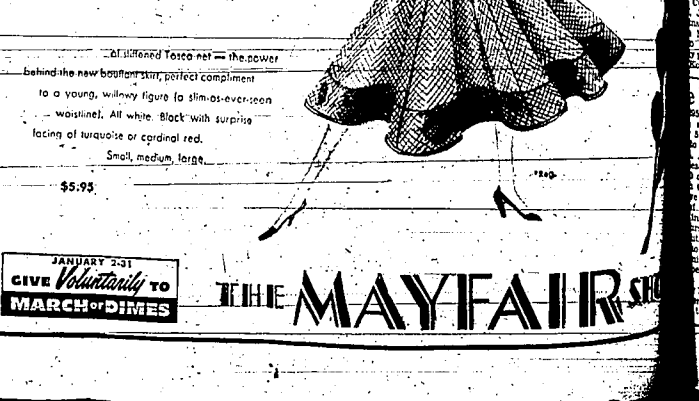
