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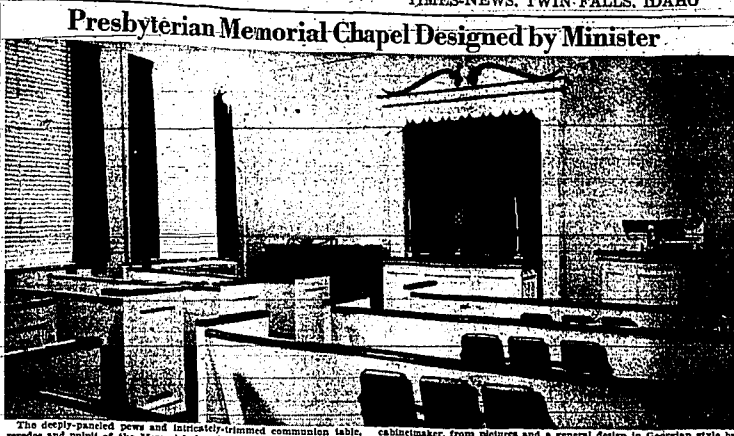

Craftsmanship, Minister's Hobby Are Evident in T. F. Presbyterian Church

A contrast to this age's assembly-line products, "untouched by human hand," is found in the hand-guided, "by-heart" craftsmanship in wood and metal appointments for the Memorial chapel in the Presbyterian church's new addition.

Detailed woodwork in construction of pews, pulpit, communion table and reredos was done by Gus Stolz, Russian-born cabinetmaker here six years, from pictures and designs provided by the Rev. Donald R. Blackstone.

The minister designed and built a wrought iron kneeling bench for weddings in the chapel, designed a wrought iron stair railing enclosing the building and designed and is building wrought iron lamp fixtures for the addition's entrances.

While praising their woodworking skill and minimizing his own metalwork hobby, the Rev. Mr. Blackstone emphasized it took the work of many other persons to complete the two-story brick, steeple addition which houses 10 classrooms and the Memorial chapel.

He cited the design by Paul Ertter, church architect at Duluth; the working drawings by Holmes G. Leach, local architect; the work of Earl H. Peck, general contractor who built the structure, and Frank W. Smith, who supervised construction.

"While much of their work is hidden in the brick and steel and mortar of the building, the handcraftsmanship in the chapel is more readily apparent," Stolz explains his skill as "just natural. I've been doing it all my life." His father was a

cabinetmaker in Odessa, Russia. Stolz left Russia in 1904 and began carpenter work in 1910. He has spent much of his life as a cabinetmaker in the west. He was in charge of cabinetwork during construction of ELIX and handbuilt the wood appointments in the new Baptist church.

"We had expected to have the furnishings made elsewhere to get the deep paneling and the hand-shaped trim," said the Rev. Mr. Blackstone, "when we found in our community a man capable of doing this kind of fine painstaking work."

He praised the "fitting of joints, nearly invisible, and the deeply beveled panels as contributing greatly to the chapel's beauty."

Using photographs and sketches to get the general idea, Stolz worked out the dimensions and proportions necessary to make the fixtures turn out right. "That's where the skill comes in," he said.

He cited the way in which the scallops are set out a little from the foot of the reredos in saying, "This is the kind of thing you have to know. You can't see it in a picture."

The reredos is authentic colonial style in design and finish, white mahogany and deep-rose-stained pine. The pulpit, pews and communion table. The chapel is appointed and "trimmed in Georgian style."

Windup Nears On Civil War Pension Rolls

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The veterans administration figures will be on its pension rolls in the year ending June 30, 1951.

In contrast, it estimates an average of 1,677,307 World War II veterans will be receiving pensions of compensation. And VA spokesmen estimated benefits will be going to about 2,221,004 veterans and dependents of deceased veterans.

President Truman's budget requests to congress for the VA list an average of three union army veterans on the pension rolls for the fiscal year ending this June 30. Actually four are still alive, according to VA records. They are Douglas T. Story, 107, West Los Angeles, Calif.; Israel A. Broadbent, 104, Banuete, Tex.; Albert Woodson, 104, Duluth, Minn.; and James A. Tark, 107, Rochester, N.Y.

The four veterans are receiving pensions this year at an annual rate of \$1,440. Next year's budget includes \$1,440 for one. In 1951 there were 10 union veterans on the pension list getting \$1,418 a year each.

The federal government does not pay pensions or compensation to Confederate veterans of the Civil War and does not keep a list of those surviving.

In the budget requests, VA lists \$221,004 veterans' cases in which compensation or pensions are expected to be paid in 1952-53.

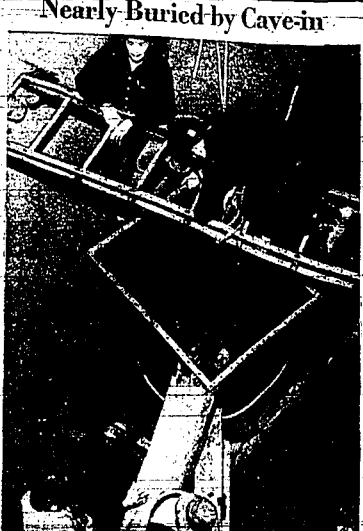
