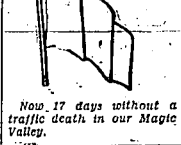

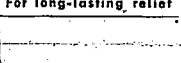

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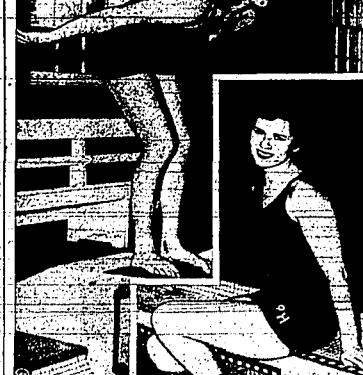

Association Chief Says Armory Issue Not Dead, Officials Enthused Over Plan

The Twin Falls armory is far from a dead issue, as four Washington officials enthused over it, said Don Duvall, president of the Twin Falls Armory association in comments upon Chamber of Commerce action Thursday.

Chamber directors voted Thursday to inform national guard armory site fund lenders of conditions different from those under which the loan was sought and to grant lenders the privilege of withdrawing their funds if they so desire.

Although admitting the chamber action came as a surprise and feeling its directors and fund subscribers are neither fully informed nor fully aware of the importance of the project, Duvall emphasized his organization has no argument or quarrel with the chamber.

Reporting the consensus of thought at the meeting of national guardsmen Friday afternoon, Duvall stressed the group was not soliciting tax funds in its recent trip to Washington, D. C. "We agreed 100 per cent with the chamber in not wishing to increase the tax burden," he declared.

He pointed out armory funds already have been appropriated and that no new appropriation was needed or sought. The funds already are available, with percentage allocations to various states.

"Twin Falls has first priority for Idaho armory construction. The money is already there," Duvall stressed, and federal officials could write "a check today."

The state armory board, an organization of national guardsmen, mortgaging existing armories in Idaho.

A Public Subscription. Duvall stated the national guard bureau imposes no restriction on the amount raised locally through any or all of these methods.

He raised the question of how many public buildings of similar type to go here with most of the money coming from outside sources. He said the national guard bureau estimated a construction cost of \$10 per square foot and stated similar buildings have been built here for \$4.75 per square foot, indicating a larger building might be possible.

He also pointed out the national guard bureau imposes no restrictions upon enlargement of the building or local redesigning to meet local needs, other than requiring the building to meet its structural requirements.

He pointed out the consensus of a Tuesday meeting of chamber directors, with a delegation which went to Washington, D. C., was to poll lenders and first tell them what had been learned, giving a further opportunity for explanation and then talk about withdrawal after exploring all possibilities.

Duvall said the armory association urges lenders to wait until every chance has been exhausted before withdrawing their funds. He wanted several other cities will be happy to grab the funds earmarked for Twin Falls when state and fed-

eral officials are advised of the chamber's action.

Turning the primary needed military building, Duvall explained it "hasn't been a chance of this city landing the headquarters of the 11th armored cavalry regiment along with its payroll, federal instructors and equipment."

He also said if universal military training becomes a reality with its seven years of service in civilian components, young men returning here from their active duty might be forced to move elsewhere to get their necessary training.

Turning to the proposed structure's estimated seating capacity of 750, Duvall declared, this doesn't mean money could not be raised for repaying the funds loaned to purchase the site. He pointed out the armory would be locally owned and locally controlled and would be a part of the community.

He said every possible source would be explored for repayment of the site loans. Even though future enlargement would be made through 100 per cent federal funds, the building still would revert to local ownership, he explained.

Duvall said he feels the armory association did not give misleading information at the time the loans to "buy a site" were being sought. He said all available information was given at that time.
