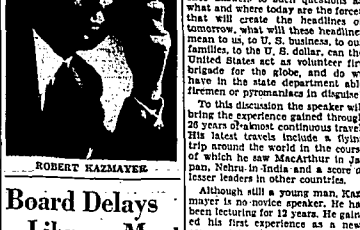
Publisher to Address Burley, Rupert Knife and Fork Group

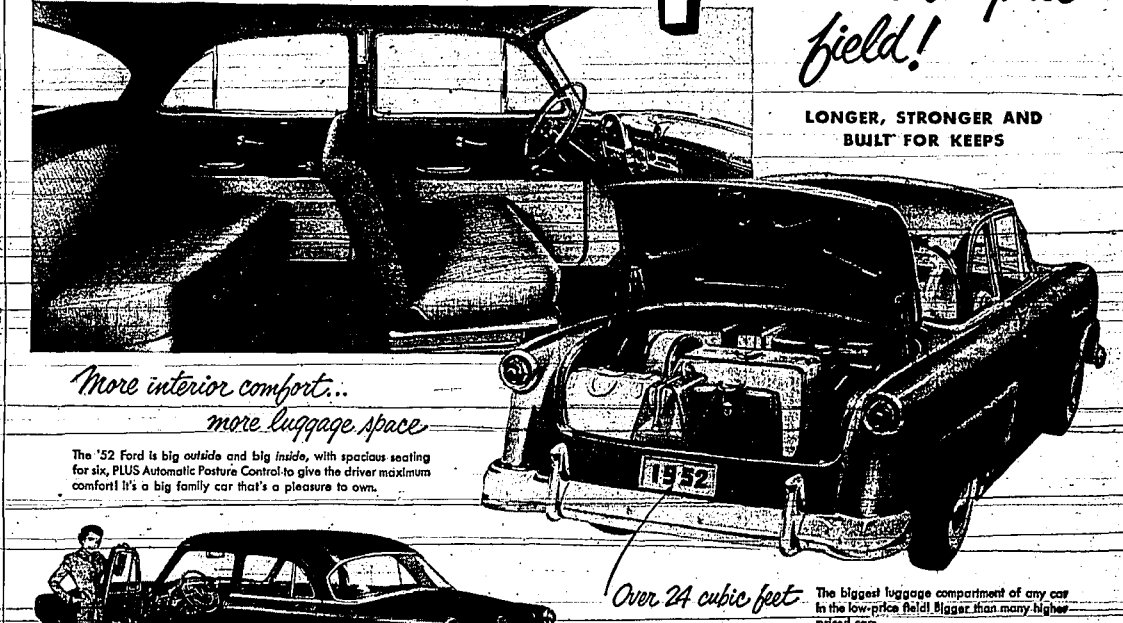

Board Okays/ \$3,500 Fee on Project Tract

BOISE, Feb. 5 (AP)—The \$346 land tract in Blaine county, Idaho, and 15,000 from the federal government for 27.9 acres of condemned land at the Frank reservoir site.

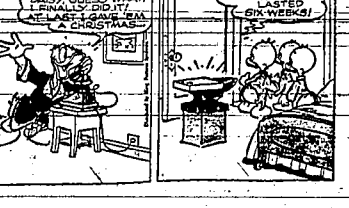
