Personal Grievances Blamed For County Health Unit Move

Editor, Times-News: A meeting of more than 300 interested citizens Thursday evening in Washington school listened for 45 minutes to a prepared statement made by the chairman of the board of county commissioners, who said that the health unit was moved for the other two members of the board and for himself. After listening to that report and the answers to questions asked of him throughout the evening, we feel that the action of the board in moving out the local health unit from the state and federal department of health was taken because of personal grievances and personal prejudices rather than for the good of the county health program or the interests of the citizens of Twin Falls county.

The chairman of the board spent a substantial part of the time given to his report in a scolding reading of a case history made by one of the county health nurses in their line of duty. The report by evidence submitted was concerned in by Jack Post, their acting director of the south central health unit. The case report was based on services rendered more than a year ago and could have no bearing on whether we, the taxpayers of the county, should or should not have a good fully equipped and staffed county health unit working with the state and federal departments of health at the present time.

Mr. Hawkins, chairman of the board of county commissioners, has made much political thunder out of this case during three previous meetings, one of which was the hearing held in Boise before a committee appointed by Governor Jordan to investigate the state department of health. This case does not reflect adversely upon the ability, the duty or the medical ethics of the county health unit. The case reported attended the case nor does it in any way bring out any inefficiency in the county health unit or the manner in which it was operated in the past.

According to a statement of the chairman of the board of county commissioners, made during the mass meeting, they, the commissioners, propose to operate this county health department in the same manner as the state and federal departments of health. This is not the way in which they are operated, though, through his own admission, they do not know how these two other units are operated, nor how efficiently they are run.

Local health board disease control and health education.

They make a similar charge concerning explanation or interpretation of new programs to the public and not using vital statistics reports to plan preventive program.

Post's lack of understanding laboratory and nursing division functions results in his not integrating these departments' work so the community could receive maximum service for the money spent, the letter states.

Charge Blamed Opinion

The public health workers state a biased opinion was given in taking his disagreements with the state department of public health to this city's county commissioners.

They charge non-adherence to the merit system, citing entrance into public health by means of county commissioners in the district health unit—no maintenance department.

Blaming they depend on state help for professional work, the public health workers say they charged the counties can function without any state supervision. They point out they always have had the privilege of rejecting unwanted programs.

Method Criticized

Another paragraph of their letter deals with Post's administrative method. They charge no demonstration of leadership, inadequate working relationship and every day policy matters and case control questions.

Two suggestions are made in the letter from the public health workers. One is for full, impartial and public investigation and hearings so the county may first hand information concerning the whole situation. The other suggestion is for a committee of citizens, including Dr. Fred O. Graber, director of crippled children's services for the state department, and a hearing of all of the pictures the commissioners have not had.

Available in Emergency

The letter states: "Be assured that as public health workers, we will remain at the community to suffer for need of our services in case of an epidemic. We will give of our time and skill if needed without compensation in any emergency."

"However, these services will only be given under the direction of local doctors."

Their letter also cites Post's right of appeal to the merit system council, if he feels he was released unjustly, and points out the state department of public health has no choice but to reinstate him if he can convince this council he has been unjustly discharged.

The public health workers state that, in their knowledge, Post has not appealed to the council for hearing.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(Special)—A states versus federal rights battle is under way now in the house interior committee to determine who will control western water resources. Spreading the states-rights line are three Republicans—Homer Hodge of Idaho, Wesley D'Ewart of Montana and William H. Harrison of Wyoming—all of whom are members of the subcommittee on irrigation and reclamation.

The group's major victory thus far was tacking on a fine print clause to the "Santa Margarita" bill approved last month by the full committee. The bill arose from the much-publicized southern California case in which water users near the city of Fallbrook claim the federal government had arbitrarily cut them off from the Santa Margarita river.

California Democrat Clair Engle, chief of the irrigation subcommittee, was on the hot seat to provide relief for the Fallbrook farmers. As their price for quick cooperation, the Republicans—supported by Deputy Sheriff LePage Layton and State Patrolman Marvin Snyder.

They were arrested in the probable case Wednesday where they reserved their pleas "timber" to post the \$1,000 bond set by Judge Henry W. Tucker. They were turned over to the custody of the sheriff.

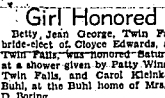

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

How about a pleasant afternoon drive over the hill from FAIRFIELD to the Smoky and South Boise drainage? A picnic lunch there in the cool pines, mayno, or a refreshing stroll through some of the cedar groves and along the meadows of the meandering creek? Some fun, huh?

Well, could be, but right now there are those who would argue against it. One is D. G.
