City Council Leader Blasts Retail Letter

TWIN FALLS, Feb. 12 (UP)—The city council today criticized the executive secretary of the National Potato Council, for a letter to the public in which he urged the council to sign an order to raise prices on white potatoes.

The council has been in a running fight over the price of white potatoes, which the growers say are too low and are causing normal marketing.

The council made public a letter last week in which it accused Tharin, executive secretary of the potato council, of "trying to bring you into a price war."

Tharin's letter, which he said was "for the benefit of the potato grower," said that the council should "take the price out of the hands of the grower" and "put it in the hands of the consumer."

The council, which is made up of Mayor J. J. Dillie and seven council members, said that it "cannot" sign an order to raise prices on white potatoes.

SEC Acts to Hold Jurisdiction Over Utility Sale Plans

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 12 (UP)—The securities and exchange commission yesterday sought to remove a court order which blocks it from jurisdiction in the proposed sale of Washington Water Power stock to a trio of Washington-state public utility districts.

American Power and Light company, as a holding company owning the WWP, proposes to sell, Pend Oreille and Stevens PUDs for \$55,115,000.

Washington and Idaho interests, and American stockholders protested the planned sale, and asked the SEC to hold a hearing. After consideration, the commission decided to comply, but the PUDs then obtained a stay of the hearing, issued by the ninth U. S. circuit court of appeals in San Francisco.

The commission yesterday asked the court to vacate the stay, and to dismiss a petition by the PUDs for review of the SEC order taking jurisdiction.

Utahn Given 2 Years-for U. S. Fraud

BOISE, Feb. 12 (AP)—Abe Greenband, Salt Lake City businessman, was sentenced to two years in prison and fined \$10,000 yesterday for conspiracy to defraud the government in the disposition of war surplus property.

The attorney general says—Greenband was released on bond after being in custody of the U. S. marshal about two hours.

Federal Judge Chase A. Clark first announced that Greenband paid the fine by \$ 2 p. m. today he would hear arguments for reduction of sentence or probation.

Charges Decision
Two hours later Greenband was in the court again and Judge Clark said the sentence was the "final determination" and would stand pending the outcome of the appeal.

Greenband was convicted on two counts of a 17-count indictment for conspiracy in disposing of a steam boiler—a known defect. The charges with Greenband's lawyer, former state purchasing agent.

William Langstaff, a defense attorney, said the property disposed "perhaps was handled carelessly," but his lawyer said Greenband was no more than a dutiful boy by the state of Idaho for his work.

Clark said he would consider evidence of his kind where the government has no opportunity to return it. The judge denied motion for acquittal, saying Greenband and Langstaff had not shown any regard for the law controlling surplus property."

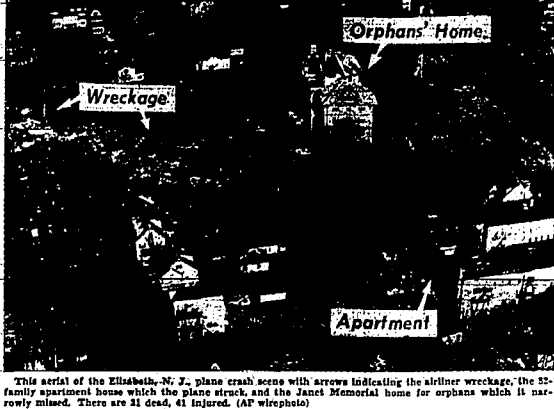
