Chances Not so Bad for Good Roads, Speaker Tells Meeting

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 13—Chances for adequate roads in our time are not so bad as they may seem, according to Roy Jorgensen, engineering consultant for the National Highway Users Conference, speaking at the annual meeting of the California Street and Highway conference at the University of California here today.

Jorgensen, who expressed optimism, sketched some of the problems confronting modern highway administration, but expressed confidence that solutions would be found.

Among the problems, he said, is inflation which "skipped the road program that seemed to be getting geared up after World War II." Limitation on the use of steel resulting from the Korean crisis has posed yet another serious obstacle to highway improvement. This has been aggravated by failure on the part of some defense officials to recognize the need for all-weather roads.

Jorgensen told the California meeting that "the most serious problem is a third and serious problem in the highway program to mobility on which all are so dependent."

Businessmen Still Fret on '52 Outlook

NEW YORK, Feb. 13 (AP)—Optimism continues to pour out of Washington, but businessmen eye the uneasy business outlook with caution and fret with increasing nervousness.

The days when inflation seemed profitable are over, rising costs are the prime problem now. And deflation is a threat to many.

Secretary of Commerce Sawyer says business this year and for the next two or three years should be good.

Textile slump—The textile industry, after its 11-month slump—the longest it has known since the end of the war.

Wani Copper—Automakers say they're glad to get the aluminum, but what they need even more is copper.

Food processors also wonder about business being called good. They are selling near record quantities of food.

New Phase of Inquiry Opens

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Feb. 13 (AP)—A new phase of the investigation into the last year's Communist activities began today on the heels of a suspended tax official John A. Malone's refusal to answer committee questions on constitutional grounds.

Two members of the King committee, queried last night after concluding secret questioning of Malone and key witness Edwin M. Furusko, said today's public hearing would involve subjects hitherto undiscussed.

It was assumed the hearing would be based on yesterday's executive sessions, but "both men" refused to confirm this.

King said the first witnesses would be Anthony Sherman, a special agent of the treasury intelligence unit, and George Hecker, an agent of the immigration and naturalization bureau.

HEARING BEGINS—SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Feb. 13 (AP)—Federal Judge James Alger Poo began hearing arguments today on motions to dismiss indictments against former San Francisco chief tax collector James O. Hare and two other tax officials.

Paul Boyd Named To Federal Office

BOISE, Feb. 13 (AP)—Paul Boyd, who is resigning as chief assistant U. S. district attorney here, has been appointed referee in bankruptcy effective March 1.

Federal Judge Chas. A. Clark signed an order yesterday appointing Boyd to the post for a six-year term, replacing Thornton Wymann, whose term expires at the end of this month.

Boyd has notified U. S. Dist. Atty. John A. Carver that he was resigning effective March 1. Carver said Herman J. Ross, who has been an assistant U. S. attorney for a year, will be moved up to the chief assistant's post. Ross is from Wallace.

Accused Red Faces Witness

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Feb. 13 (AP)—The man said to be the top Communist in the United States moved in today to cross examine a witness who called him a "professional racketeer."

William Schneiderman, acting as his own attorney in the conspiracy trial of 15 "Communists" convicted, will have the opportunity to question David Saunders when the latter testifies at the Communist party in the witness stand.

Saunders will be subject to cross examination about his career in the Communist party from 1935 to 1945.

Under direct examination, Saunders testified that he associated with Schneiderman, allegedly the acting head of the Communist party in the United States, in conducting party affairs.

He also said Schneiderman was instrumental in advancing him in the party from a waterfront striker to a "functionary."

Schneiderman is on trial with 14 other Reds for conspiring to teach and advocate the forcible overthrow of the government.

Trial Begins on Slaying Charge

OROPPIO, Feb. 13 (AP)—A juror chosen and one state witness took the stand as the second degree murder trial of James Spence, 36, was under way today.

Spence, a farmer from the Whitaker creek section northeast of Orofino, is accused of shooting Robert Kinzer, 29, a Lewiston hunter, last Oct. 14.

In an opening statement to the jury Tuesday afternoon, Earl W. Morgan, Lewiston attorney assisting Warren F. Gardner, Clearwater prosecutor, in the case, said "the state will prove Kinzer was shot without warning."

Spence has admitted shooting the hunter, but told a jury at the time of his arrest that it was in self defense after an argument.

Freight Loss Seen If Rate Is Increased

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—A Washington congressman has warned the interstate commerce commission that additional increases in railroad freight rates may result in a net loss of revenues to the carriers.

"It is entirely possible," contended Representative Horan, R., Wash., in a letter to commission Chairman John L. Rogers, "that less tonnage would move long distances because of the shorter hauls being featured by competing modes of transport."

Recesses Today—In his letter he made public yesterday, Horan flatly opposed the increase recently asked by the railroads.

Western lines are seeking a nine per cent increase and eastern carriers want a six per cent boost. Hearings will open here Monday with oral arguments scheduled the following Monday, Feb. 23.

Horan said the railroads have been granted 11 horizontal freight rate increases since June 30, 1946, for a total of \$220 jump.

It now costs \$202 to ship a carload of apples from Wenatchee, Wash., to New York, he said, as compared with but \$472.50 in 1945.

The congressman said that the dependence of western growers upon eastern outlets means that each increase in the freight rates "places them at a great disadvantage in effect, further removes them from their principal markets."

Inquest Planned In Death of Five

LEWISTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—A coroner's inquest will be held Monday into the deaths of five persons drowned when their car was knocked into the Clearwater river Sunday night.

Dr. Joseph Heeman, Boise pathologist, performed an autopsy on Mrs. Homer Marks, one of the victims, and declared death was due to drowning.

Mr. and Mrs. Homer Marks, Langwal, in age from 1 to 4, were sitting in their car when it was struck by another vehicle driven by Willard Bounds, 37, Lewiston.

Mer. Pence County Prosecutor Wynne M. Blaska said the outcome of the inquest and continued investigation will show whether Bounds is to be charged. He was hospitalized after the accident.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 13 (AP)—A week-long presidential preference poll conducted by the Philadelphia Inquirer among its readers showed Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., preferred over Gen. Dwight Eisenhower by nearly two to one.

The poll also finished with Sen. Estes Kefauver, D., Tenn., leading President Truman on the Democratic side.

The poll was conducted by means of ballots published in the Inquirer and mailed in by readers. The "votes" were asked to pick their favored candidate whether Republican or Democrat.

The newspaper said a final tabulation showed these figures: Republican—Taft, 4,547; Eisenhower, 2,441; Gen. Douglas MacArthur, 383; Gov. Earl Warren, California, 311; Harold E. Stassen, 342.

Democrat—Kefauver, 708; President Truman, 674.
