Metal Supply Gain Seen in New Orders

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Civilians' industry hard hit by reduced material allocations, looked forward today to a slightly larger supply of metals during the first six months of the new fiscal year.

The defense production administration announced it is allotting an additional \$300,000,000 in aluminum, \$300,000,000 of copper and \$300,000,000 of steel for civilian goods in the second quarter.

The extra metals will come from a special DPA reserve and out of the 11,000,000 pounds of aluminum and 9,600,000 pounds of copper turned back by the military because of the slowdown in the aircraft program.

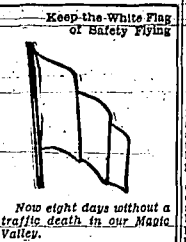

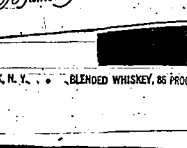

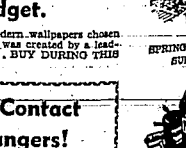

Policy Stand Explained in Stassen Talk

NEW YORK, Feb. 13 (AP)—Harold G. Stassen denied that he is either "Asia-first" or "Europe-first" in his political beliefs.

Stassen replied: "One of the two is right," Gurnea said in asking Stassen to clarify his position.

"They're both right," Stassen replied. "I say that deliberately. Both have emphasized that we have a world threat from communism and must oppose it consistently throughout the world."

Stassen said he would make what he described as "a very major speech" on foreign policy in Washington on Feb. 23.

Deep Cut for Budget Urged

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (AP)—Senator Byrd, D. Va., demanded a cut of nearly \$2,000,000 in President Truman's \$4,444,000 budget.

"I am not a 'destructive' of our currency and chaos," Byrd declared the reductions he proposed for the fiscal year starting July 1 could be even greater "if we had sympathy for the chief executive."

In a detailed study he entitled "The Byrd Budget," the senator called on congress to make cuts in "the budget of the President."

Byrd recommended elimination of \$2,000,000,000 he said was earmarked for economic aid abroad, and he urged military aid "to friendly foreign nations should total no more than \$700,000,000 as compared with \$2,000,000,000 requested by Mr. Truman."

Byrd also proposed a spending budget of \$1,000,000,000 for this nation's direct/military program, \$500,000,000 less than he said the President's budget asked.

In the case of military-related spending, Byrd proposed \$2,000,000,000 as compared with the administration's request for \$2,900,000,000.

2 Idaho Stations Ask Permits for Television Setup

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (Special)—The Federal Communications Commission will lift the ban on new television stations about March 1, it was learned today.

FCC officials said at present only Boise and Idaho Falls have applications pending in the state. The Boise application was made in the name of Lealand Kiefer for channel 10 and Idaho Falls request in the name of the Eastern Idaho Broadcasting and Television company for channel 10.

Legal representatives of two radio stations in Twin Falls, KTRX and KLLX, said neither has signed its intention to ask for television permits. The commission is expected to allow 50 to 90 days for applications to be filed.

After the close of this period, channels for the entire country will be allocated on a tentative basis. This has been done already in much of the East, but probably will take until midsummer to complete for all areas.

In addition to a permit, the prospective TV broadcaster will have to line up essential materials for the construction of a station. It probably would be about a year before, until any Idaho station gets into operation.



Blaine County Board Okays 1952 Budget

HAILEY, Feb. 15—No one appeared before Blaine county commissioners at the public hearing Monday on proposed budgets of the 21 taxing units in the county. All budgets were approved as proposed. While the majority of the budgets were higher than a year ago, a few were lower. Those remaining constant included the prothonotary, attorney at law, \$15,000; the county physician at \$1,480; district court at \$3,138; justice of the peace at \$625; coronor at \$630; department of public assistance at \$1,200; and public health department at \$2,940.

The county commissioners' budget fell from \$6,000 to \$5,800; direct relief, old age, blind, children's pensions and charities fell to \$1,350 from \$1,850; and probate fell to \$4,137 from \$4,482.52 in 1951.

Elections budget for this year is \$4,500 as against \$500 last year. Road and bridge budget went up from \$64,000 to \$65,000 due to benefits received by the appropriations figured on road mileage. Last year Blaine county gained \$44,000 under this provision.

County officials' budgets are up to take care of salary increases approved last year. Clerk of the district court, auditor and recorder's 1952 budget is \$12,500 as against \$11,500 for 1951; the office is \$18,147 as against \$14,700 for last year; assessor, \$37,000 as against \$7,950 for 1951; treasurer, \$7,000 as against \$6,070.24 for last year; county coroner, \$9,050 as against \$2,000 a year ago, and county agriculture, \$3,350 as against \$3,850.

The miscellaneous budget for 1952 is \$5,750.50 as against \$4,120.50 a year ago.

The total budget, as shown by the 1952 budget, is \$184,226.74 as against \$147,446.16 for 1951.

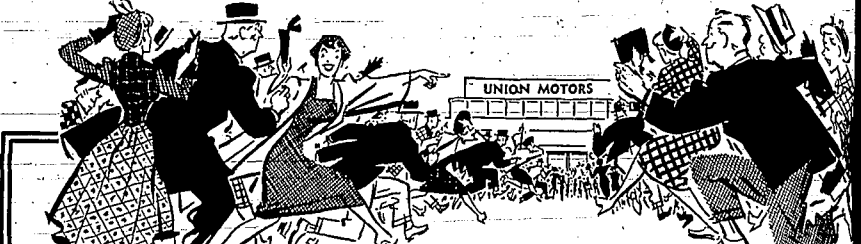
