Winter Returns to Valley With Snow, Slick Roads and Drifts

Snow began to fall in Fairfield and the Halley Friday evening. The snowfall, for example, it started to snow at 8 p.m. Friday and didn't stop until 11 p.m. Saturday. In the two hours seven inches of new snow fell. There was no wind, however, and road playing slowly was a matter of inches. Most of the snow out of the way. Most of the roads in Camas county are reported open but some are closed.

Highway 98 in the vicinity of the ice caves north of Shoshone was closed for about two hours Saturday morning. A rotary snowplow from Sun Valley opened the highway and assisted state highway crews in keeping the road open all day Saturday. The 10 inches of snow that fell at Halley and Ketchum on Friday night to eight inches by 7 p.m. and then by 11 p.m. Saturday. The snow and Carey experienced a blizzard.

Richfield, in the northern part of Lincoln county, had more than six inches of new snow up to 6 p.m. Further north around Merley about 10 inches of new snow fell. The wind blew at night and piled up some of the larger drifts on the roads. The snow Saturday night had calmed but snow still was falling. Many counties were blocked and snowplows were making no attempt to open them. Workers did not plan to go to work on the roads until after it had stopped snowing.

Accidents Lead to Suits for \$52,620

\$52,620.48 is asked in two suits filed Friday in court as the result of two auto accidents which occurred last Dec. 26 south of Hansen and 284,726 as a result of an accident in Twin Falls on Dec. 24, 1950, for injuries and hospital and medical expenses.

The \$284,726 suit is brought by John Stanger, 69, route 1, near Robert Minshew, Twin Falls, and the Douglas company. Basis of the suit is a collision between Stanger and a car driven by the Douglas company. The Douglas car was owned by the motor company.

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Probe Plan Is Declared Dangerous

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—The Truman plan to let government housekeeper Neybold Morris grant immunity for "the greatest danger," Senator O'Connor, Md., declared today.

O'Connor, former chairman of the senate crime committee, urged that congress reject President Truman's request for legislation clothing Morris with such powers.

"It is my definite belief," O'Connor said in a statement, "that this departure from regular practice is unnecessary and would be fraught with the greatest danger, regardless of the high character of the individual vested with such great powers."

The constitution, he said, cannot be forced to testify against himself in a criminal proceeding. Mr. Truman has proposed that in cases where witnesses invoked this constitutional provision, Morris be empowered to grant them immunity from prosecution. Then they could be compelled to testify.

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FBI Smashes At Terrorism In Carolinas

PAYETTEVILLE, N. C., Feb. 16 (AP)—The FBI today smashed into night-riding terrorism in the Carolinas by arresting 10 former kidnap victims on charges of kidnapping.

Federal agents said the night riders are the victims across the Carolinas border, making them liable to the death penalty under a new law which was passed in the government. Morris plans to start with an investigation of the justice department which McGrath heads.

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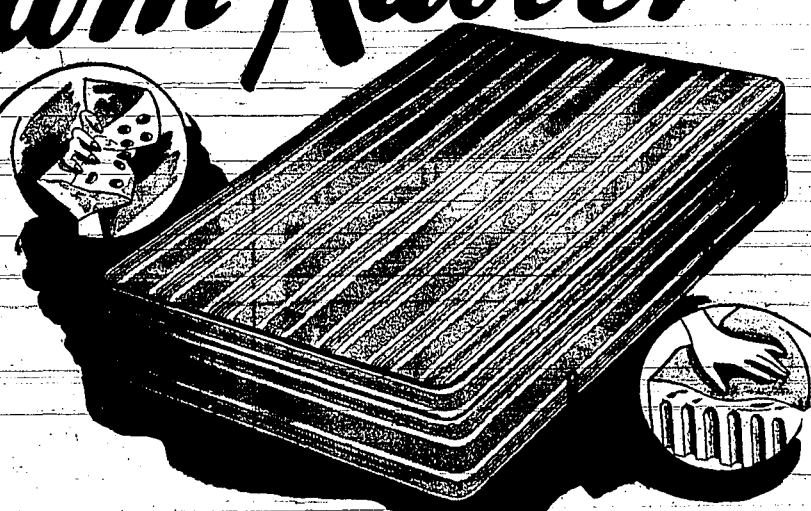

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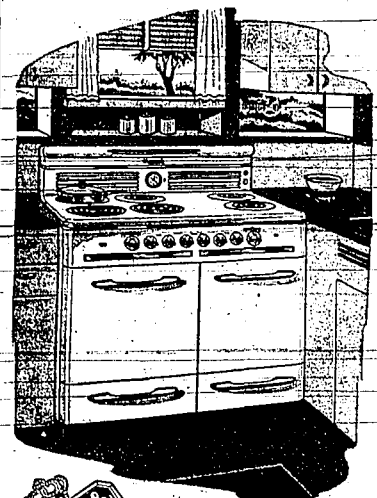
