Average U.S. Consumer Living 36 Per Cent Better Than 1939

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 13.—The average American consumer is living 36 per cent better than in 1939. This is his per capita share of the rise in production of consumer goods and services over prewar output, if you haven't gotten your share, inflation has probably "high-tailed" it and delivered it to somebody else, says the family economist bureau of Northwestern National Life insurance company.

Actually the total production of all consumer goods and services is up 60 per cent more than it was in 1939, because our population is 24,000,000 greater than it was in 1939. Food production is 23 per cent larger, or 14 per cent more per capita; this amounts to about 11 per cent more per capita after allowing for increased U. S. exports of food. In spite of defense activities, our factory civilian goods production is up an estimated 80 per cent than the prewar volume, yielding nearly 38 per cent more manufactured goods for each consumer. Volume of services—medical attention, hotel lodgings, dry cleaning, etc.—is nearly 65 per cent greater, or about 40 per cent more service available per capita.

These are increases in actual goods and services for better living, the report emphasizes, adding that this is what has really raised the American standard of living, and not the increase in the number of dollars in circulation, which has merely produced the inflation that, it charged millions out of their shares of the improvement.

Because the total number of dollars in circulation had tripled since 1929 while total production of consumer goods and services is only a little over half again as great, there are now nearly twice as many dollars outstanding per unit of goods as in 1929. So each dollar "claims

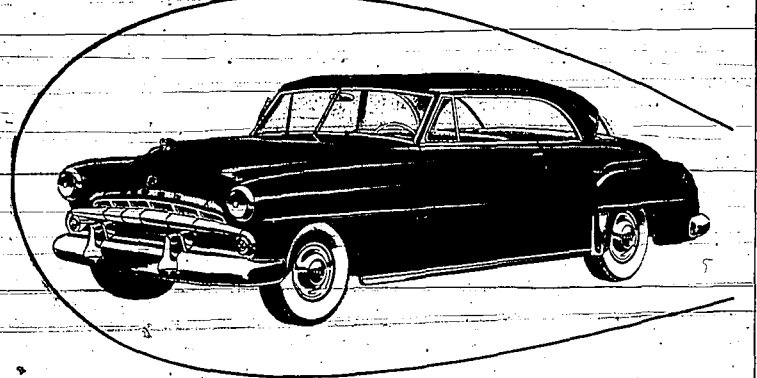
