Phone Company Supporting Volunteers As Part of Long-Time Safety Program

More support for the Times-News Traffic Safety Volunteer campaign has come from the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company which has requested Traffic Safety Volunteer stickers for company vehicles and for the private cars of its employees. The company's long-time traffic safety program has produced an enviable record. Recent nationwide and local publicity on the number of traffic fatalities leaves the impression everyone in America who drives a car is out to get some kind of record for killing his fellow man. "That, obviously, is untrue," says Mel Delling, local manager of the company. In fact, the owners of large fleets of cars and trucks determined long ago that traffic fatalities were not the inevitable price of progress. They refused to accept the theory that the number of traffic deaths must increase with the number of vehicles. Experience has proved that such accidents are preventable, and can be decreased by intelligent planning—just as in any other endeavor. The telephone company has just completed its second straight year without one of the drivers of its more than 2,000 vehicles being involved in a disabling injury. During this period, its vehicles have traveled over 33,000,000 miles, more than the average driver would cover in 100 years. Among its vehicles are seven station here in serving Twin Falls, Kimberly, Murkough, Hazelton and Eden. They roll up some 61,000 miles a year. And four of the local drivers have a combined total of 58 years of accident-free driving. They are Alfred Stevens with 24 years, William Purdy with 14 years and Elmer Ogren and Robert Knight with 11 years each. This is quite a record, but as Delling points out, the company has not always been so fortunate. Its vehicles have been involved in accidents. Some of them were major, but fortunately most have been relatively minor. Some of the accidents were the employees' fault and some were not. Over a period of 51 years, and of the million deaths to date involving automobiles, only six have involved Mountain States employees. But, the company takes the attitude that all the accidents are avoidable and that six deaths are six too many. On the basis of miles driven per accident and in its records an accident can be a "scratched fender" if the company has one of the finest driving records in the country. In fact, the communications industry rates high on the national safe driving list. But that did not just happen. It was planned. As the saying goes, "Safety is no accident." Every telephone employee who drives a company vehicle as a part of his job goes through an intensive course of instruction even if he has been driving his own car for years. He is subject to "severe physical

examinations testing reaction time, vision, depth perception and judgment. This ordinarily is considered adequate, but company officials have long recognized that one of the big factors in accidents is a poor mental condition. Supervisory people are alert in watching for such attitudes and when they are noted, everything possible is done to change them. Sometimes this requires a temporary change of assignment to one where driving a motor vehicle is not involved. These tests are repeated every three years and when an employee fails, every effort is made to correct his fault or defect. Supervisory physical defects to avoid having his driving privileges withdrawn. Physical deficiencies resulting in slower reaction time or inadequate vision range are detected by periodic examinations. The employee, who usually is unaware of such deficiencies, is told about it and perhaps saves his life or the lives of others by changing his driving habits when in his family car. The telephone company vehicles are given such constant attention that one rarely is involved in an accident, regardless of how minor, where mechanical failure was to blame. Brakes, windshield-wipers, lights and tires are checked by every driver upon entering his vehicle every morning. Minor noises are reported as they can mean a hot tire, if permitted to shear off, it might cause a serious accident. Major repairs are avoided by attention to minor maintenance and periodic checks. By careful selection of drivers, good training, and preventive maintenance, the telephone company has compiled its excellent record. The drivers profit by the program too, and their driving department either in a company car or their private car is usually a standard of courtes-


"Clean" Was Said



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

"You know, if I weren't personally acquainted with my mother and had to get a birth certificate to get a passport, I'd almost be willing to swear I was born of a rocking chair on the shady side of the porch, with a hound dog, too lazy to scratch his flims, as a foot-rest."

I love to get up in the morning, just as I can go back to bed. I don't fuss at early breakfast, because it means there's nothing to do till lunchtime. In my art, which is known as the Co-Signers Chowder and Meringue club, I am affectionately referred to as "Shuffeloot Labyrinth Henry."

That's why Florence, which comes mighty close to being my favorite city in the world, disturbs me mightily. There are too many lovely things to see here, all done by men who thought a 24-hour day was too short a time in which to work. I am

During my stay here, I intend to add something to make this city more beautiful. I have chosen as my subject the importance of professional basketball. It will show startled, excited fans watching games which could not conceivably mean anything.

If this turns out to be a failure—and it almost certainly is sure to, since all I know about applying chisel to stone was learned in the third grade—in the Rochelle-Gay grammar school—I'll knock off a bit of frozen music depicting the love life of Rita and Aly, undoubtedly one of the great love sagas of this era.

When finished I will place it next to one or two of the Cellini's fairly good works as a community hobby. I have never been to Florence without getting mad at the way immortal works of art are treated. Florentines take them for granted. I find this impossible.

As little as I know about art, I have enough appreciation of it to feel a bit in my heart when I see what those dear, old workmen did from their hearts and their minds.

I doubt if their take-home pay was as much as that of a mouse show judge, but my guess is that they will live a little bit longer in the hearts of men, than even John L. Lewis or General Vaughan.
