TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Despite President Truman's off-again-on-again attitude toward his re-nomination, the nation's political mites are betting he is not promising to train a heir. On the contrary, he is knocking down most of his principal rivals.

HOOPER REPORT SHOWDOWN Between now and next summer there will be a showdown on just how many of the Hoover commission's recommendations for reorganization of our federal government will be adopted.

At the second reorganization conference, held in Washington this week under the sponsorship of the nation-wide Citizens Committee for the Hoover Report, this organization launched upon its final drive to enact as soon as possible the remaining approximately 45 percent of the Hoover commission's recommendations still pending.

This final drive, coming three years after the commission's report was first handed to congress, will definitely come to an end this summer when the citizens committee will go out of existence.

The six remaining major targets of the organization call for an improved postal service, a reorganized department of agriculture, an integrated department of interior, federal personnel management, revitalized veterans administration and proper organization of our natural resources.

As one of the principal speakers at this congress, former President Hoover himself called on congress for civil service reforms to remove what he called the "humiliation" of "sticking conduct" by federal officials.

Has the commission's recommendations for a stronger career service system been enacted promptly in 1948, Hoover declared, "they would have saved great grief to our country."

Dr. Robert L. Johnson, president of Temple University, who has served continuously as chairman of the Citizens Committee for the Hoover report since its creation, made this appeal to the American people:

"At no time in our history has the American public been face to face so dramatically with the need for reforming government and government. Within the past few years the nation has received shock after shock at disclosures concerning the bureau of internal revenue. The Senate for more than two years has sat on Hoover commission bills for taking internal revenue collectors and collectors of customs out of politics.

"Take the postoffice department as another source of scandals. In Mississippi persons have been convicted for selling postal appointments. Investigations are in progress in Michigan to determine whether or not political contributions are prerequisite for postal appointments, and in Massachusetts postal employees are under indictment for selling on the sly to thousands of persons who have no right to perform.

"We (are) surprised with an atmosphere of widespread public recognition of the dangers of enormous government waste, duplication, over-lapping, non-essential spending and even corruptive collectors and collectors of customs out of politics.

"Let us unite in urging our members in congress to adopt the full report to insure the maximum benefits to the American people. Half the program is not enough."

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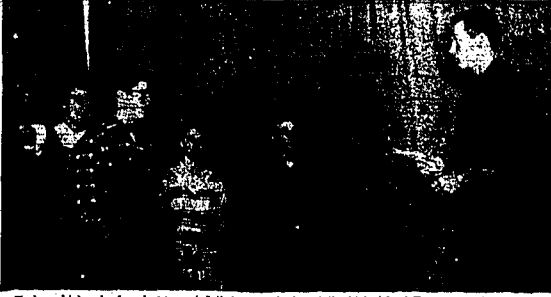

USDA Shifts Wool Aid to Loan System

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (U. P.)—The agricultural department announced today that it will shift its wool program designed to give producers of shorn wool a chance to benefit from any price rise.

Hereafter, shorn wool will be supported by means of loans to producers, rather than by outright government purchase.

By placing the wool under loan, the farmer will have the right to pay off the loan and sell the wool at any time price rises above the loan level.

On the other hand, should market prices drop below the support level, the farmer could deliver the wool to the government at full payment for his loan, interest and carrying charges.

Under the purchase method, which has been in effect for wool since 1924, any price advance went to the producer rather than to the producer.

The support rate for this year's wool crop will be 60 cents per pound, the current parity price is 60 1/2 cents.

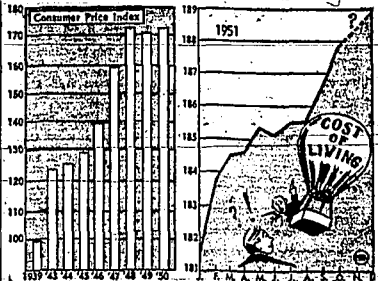

Notwithstanding that, the following seven classes of personnel enlisted after Jan. 3 will not be ordered to active duty involuntarily for more than 18 days except in time of war or national emergency:

1. Persons who served on active duty in the armed forces 90 days or more between Dec. 7, 1941, and Sept. 2, 1945.
2. Persons who served one year or more between Sept. 16, 1940, and June 24, 1941.
3. Persons who served 10 months or more since June 25, 1939.
4. Persons who have served four years or more.
5. Persons under 18½ years of age.
6. Persons under 30 years of age who are satisfactorily pursuing a full-time high school or similar course.
7. Persons who are satisfactorily pursuing a full-time college course, until the end of the academic year current at the time of mobilization, or until the reserves cease satisfactorily to pursue such training, whichever is earlier.

Basin Region Fabricators of Aluminum Hit

SPOKANE, Feb. 21 (AP)—More than a dozen Spokane-area aluminum fabricators, whose plants are almost within sight of a huge aluminum mill, are on the verge of bankruptcy because they can't get the quality of the metal, the Chronicle said.

The defense effort is taking great quantities of metal that used to go into civilian goods.

A survey shows a few windows and other goods being made by plants already have given up after they were allocated only enough aluminum to outfit one or two houses a month, the paper said.

Go to the defense.

The Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical corporation operates a huge reduction plant and a rolling mill here but most of the metal goes to the defense effort.

Roger O. O'Connell, district manager for the defense production authority, agreed the pinch is on the aluminum fabricators.

"I don't see how many of them can make the adjustments necessary and still stay in business," he said. He added the situation is about the same for other fabricators around the country.

Four Conditions

The Chronicle said its survey found these conditions:

Nine companies here used to make aluminum windows and doors. Now there are only three and "they're all in trouble."

The NPA allocated one fabricator only enough aluminum for 20 windows a month. It wasn't worth his time to stay in business so he quit.

One operator didn't get any aluminum from Nov. 16 to Feb. 10.

Idaho PUC Says Development for Power Hindered

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (Special)—The Idaho public utilities commission has said a congressional action limiting study of electric power that federal interference is hindering development in the Northwest.

The joint committee on defense production has released a report on U. S. power needs with the following comments from the Idaho group:

"Removal by congress of road blocks to needed developments in this area, with the federal government concentrating its own power program in areas where power shortages exist and where federal expenditures for such a program are needed and can be justified, is constructive suggestion for maximum use of our existing power systems in the mobilization effort, and the best means to remedy power deficiencies, using to as great an extent as possible the existing enterprises in the field" and we respectfully suggest that where private systems have demonstrated their ability to serve area requirements they should be aided rather than hindered in carrying out their programs, which require no government expenditure or subsidy and also will provide an substantial tax base for added local and federal revenues through property and income taxes.
