Road Patches Follow Local 'False' Spring

Dentists sometimes have occasion to put a temporary filling in a tooth until the cavity can be filled permanently or other work undertaken. Similarly, city street crews have been filling chicanes brought about by "false" spring weather.

When the real spring comes, moisture coming out of the ground is expected to take the patches out of the street.

Some of the patchwork may stay in it all depends upon how much moisture there is, according to H. H. Ballenger, city streets and water superintendent.

Ballenger says as soon as spring is here without question, city streets will be patched permanently. Where streets, like teeth, have crumbled beyond mere cavity filling, "inlay" projects are planned which will seal whole intersections or portions of blocks will be scarified and a new blacktop surface and seal coat will be laid.

Ballenger says the repair work is planned as far as funds allow. Resurfacing of Blue-Lake boulevard will be delayed until completion of water line projects which will tear the street up.

About one month ago before he left here, William H. Smith, former city manager, pointed out maintenance work on city streets during the next five years probably would offset normal expenditures for maintenance.

At the same time, Vincent T. Young, city engineer and public works director, stated many of the paved arterial streets are becoming worn out beyond routine maintenance to the point of requiring reconstruction, through a combination of war-time neglect, heavier traffic and other factors.

Deadline for Vet Earnings Report Nears

A reminder to veterans taking GI bill institutional on-farm training that reports of their 1934 earnings must be submitted to the veterans administration regional office not later than March 1 was made Friday by Arnold Helwege, VA contact representative in charge here.

He warned failure to submit the reports by the deadline may result in discontinuance of GI subsistence payments until such time as the records may reach the VA.

Another report
This year, in addition, farm trustees must send in a second report—a certification as to the period of time they have been engaged in employment outside the farming activity. This, too, must go to the VA before March 15, 1935.

Helwege said the earnings reports covering only income from agricultural labor for the calendar year 1934—serve a double purpose. First they are used by the VA to adjust each veteran's subsistence for this year. Second, they're a part of the veteran's record of instruction in farm accounting, thus giving him the opportunity to put into practice what he has learned in the classroom.

Forms Received
Farm trustees received the necessary VA forms yesterday. This year they will receive assistance from their instructors in closing their books for the past year and in transferring data to the VA forms.

More than 2,000 veteran-farmers, all currently in GI training in Idaho, will be required to submit the reports, according to Helwege.
