A TRIP TO THE MOON

Secretary Acheson's trip to Europe has far more significance than the average American perhaps realizes. The future of the administration's foreign policy, economic and military aid to our allies—may depend on just what Acheson accomplishes, if anything.

There are a number of important angles in connection with Acheson's return, for instance, President Truman's advisers are urging that he withhold any amount of anything like it, unless Secretary Acheson is successful in pulling some rabbit out of the hat.

In fact, they're beginning to realize that it will be impossible to wrangle large appropriations out of congress unless our allies, as former President Hoover puts it, "show a will to help themselves."

Thus, in the diplomatic and political fields, Acheson's journey abroad is one of the most fateful that an American statesman has made in these grievous postwar years.

Few people, perhaps, realize that more than 10 billion dollars for foreign aid is set up in the new budget—more than twice what we gave away last year. It's nearly twice what we spend each year educating all the public school children in the nation.

Even since the official budget message proposed \$85.4 billion of estimated spending, there has been a great to-do in and out of congress, over what to do about the gap between estimated revenues of \$71 billion and the \$114.4 billion.

Should we raise taxes? Should the government borrow more? What should be done?

These are questions being raised more and more emphatically. The answer is that we go on abroad on a mission sacred to justify the administration's plans for vastly increased expenditures on economic and military aid to our allies.

The United States Chamber of Commerce in its monthly bulletin, Taxpayer's Dollar, has suggested the answers to these various questions set forth above.

"The answer, not apparent to many in the government, is painfully simple," the bulletin's friends, "Let's not spend that much money!"

"This simple solution doesn't involve cutting federal spending. This year (fiscal 1952) we will spend \$71 billions. By coincidence, that is exactly the amount of income estimated for next year (fiscal 1953). By not spending any more next year than we are spending this year, the budget will be balanced."

"The U. S. Chamber's position was explained as follows:

"The American people are paying just about all the taxes they ought to pay, unless there is some clearest proof not yet in sight that all-out war is starting us in the face. No one knows how long we are in our present state of near-war, but it may be a long, long time. Like a long-distance runner, we must conserve our economic breath for the long pull.

For the same reason, the government shouldn't try to raise more money. Nothing more inflationary than deficit financing by a central government, particularly when it is done through the banks as it would have to be done if any large amounts are to be raised.

"If taxes aren't raised, and deficit financing is out, what about that \$14.5 billion gap? It can be closed by keeping total spending down to present levels—which are already the highest in history, next to the three peak war years of 1943, 1944 and 1945."

Not only does the U. S. Chamber deplore much of the administration's proposed spending, but it suggests the following ways to save:

"The first big item to be cut is the \$10.5 billion of the federal deficit program for 1952. The armed forces themselves could make a significant contribution by cutting their expenditures by \$1.5 billion without losing a single man or machine from our defenses. The next big item to be cut is the \$1.5 billion of the federal deficit program for 1952. There are in the budget many pieces of proposed spending that are not necessary. Many have been approved by congress. Most of these programs, advocated in the 1948 election campaign, had no budgetary effect. They were \$200 million simply by not approving them. The rest of the government will spend about \$22.5 billion more than it can pay for. The only way to balance the budget is to cut \$14.5 billion from the budget. The average tax bill for an 85.4 billion budget is \$1.30 per family. It is preposterous not to cut that!

REVEALS—It seems to me that, unlike radio, television is a more revealing medium. It is the invisible speaker to conceal himself in soft and catching words.

VIEW OF OTHERS

In the view of the facts, this hoas-of-children spend more time in watching television each week than they do in reading.

What is more important is whether such excessive passivity in entertainment—and, for the most part, mediocre entertainment—is dulling the edge of the child's natural appetite to do things for himself. For it relieves him even of the imaginative effort required to read.

Such a loss would not necessarily show up in the sort of survey conducted in Cincinnati, though it would contribute to a lessening of the child's initiative later.

The proper sort of television program can act as a stimulant to the child's public school, evidently interest in the world around him, enriching his life, reading, his school work. But there is precious little of that sort of program coming over the channels at present.

Adult Americans who have been waking up in recent years to the dire need of the public school evidently need to awake to the full seriousness of the challenge from the school's greatest competitor today—Christian Science Monitor.

HOW WE COULD GROW FAST

Dying Doe Moved to Farmer's Living Room in Futile Attempt to Save Her

GOODING, Feb. 23.—A good Samaritan effort to save the life of a yearling doe caught in a tangle of barbed wire ended in failure here today.

The deer was found Friday morning on the Harry Canyon ranch about six miles southwest of here near the Gooding airport here. The finders were Roy Olmsted and his son, Leroy.

They improvised a stretcher of lumber and their post was carried the nearly-frozen animal to their home. Placed before the living-room all heater, the deer seemed to be recovering Friday night and was moved to a shed on the Olmsted place, but died during the night.

Both rear legs of the deer seemed to be frozen. However a definite recovery was noted during the time it was in the Olmsted living room.

Conservation Officer A. F. Brown, Wendell, was called Friday afternoon and joined the Olmsted in attempting to save the deer's life.

While before the stove on the stretcher, the deer opened its eyes, blinked and wiggled its ears before it was moved from the room to the shed.

When the shed it was wrapped in blankets to keep it warm.

Wounds from the barbed wire were not excessive and effects of the cold appeared to be the most dangerous factor facing the rescuers.

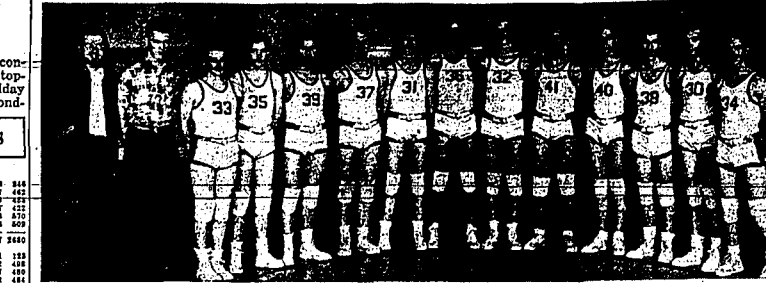

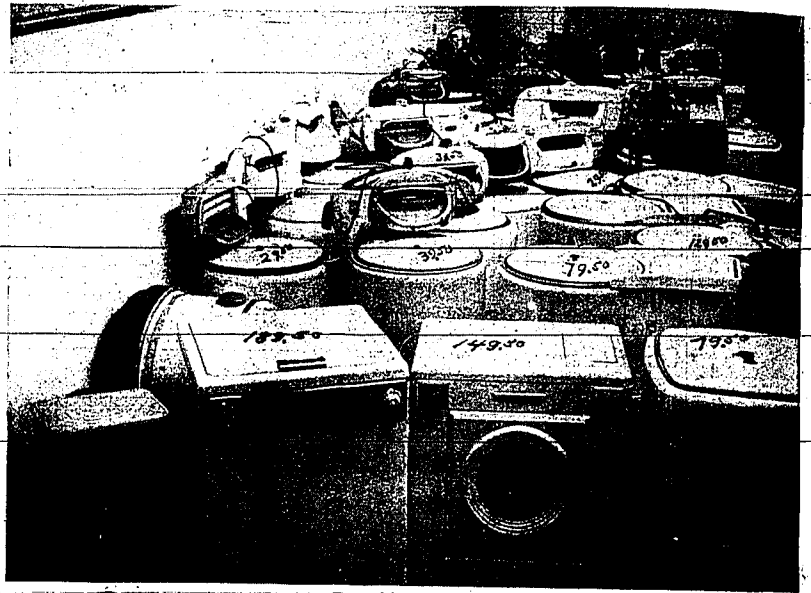

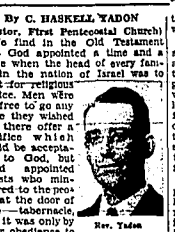
Ruling Issued On Shoshone Ballot Signup

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

A CASTLEFORD farmer, like many other persons in Magic Valley, assisted in the recent polo drive but he had a special interest in the campaign. And he did his campaigning the hard way. He walked.

Perhaps walking is not hard for some people but Seiber is a victim of polo. For his share in the campaign he walked over miles of bad roads and 12 farms and turned in \$75 to George Blisk, Castleford March-of-Dimes chairman, as his part of the collection.

Seiber contacted polo in 1914 when he was 4 years old. He was taken to Bull where the case was diagnosed as infantile paralysis. Polo was rare in those days but treatment was started, using hot packs and massage. The disease afflicted his legs, especially his right leg. He did not walk for a year and one-half and he was on crutches for more than another year.

In these days of modern convalescence walking may be a chore to a lot of people but as for Seiber he is glad he was able to walk miles to make collections to fight the disease that laid him low.

This is the first year Castleford has an independent polo team. The team and Blisk is proud of the result. The community collected \$1110 for the March of Dimes and collections coming in from all parts of the area.

Collections were difficult in the rural community, not because the people didn't want to contribute but because the severe winter made visits to some farms almost impossible. That is one reason Seiber decided to walk rather than try to cover the rutted roads in an automobile.

Members of the Castleford Y.M.C.A. made collections north of Castleford and the Orange covered the territory to the south. Mrs. Dan Sample and Mrs. John Burkhardt handled collections in town. The Castleford firemen held their annual ball and donated 25 per cent of the proceeds to the campaign.

Timmy Hill, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Hill, HANSEN, is home again, home from the polo ward in a Boise hospital. Timmy, who moved to Hansen recently from the ranch home of Herman Seiber, bar polo last December. His neck and speech still are affected but his recovery is assured. Sandra Beam, his cousin and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Art Beam, former Hansen resident, also is recovering from the same type of polo at her home in Spokane.

Anything looks easy when an expert is doing it and that includes snowshoeing. One of the fashions on and starts walking, that's all there is to it. But after the first dozen steps one finds a completely new set of muscles, previously unused. And the energy it takes just to walk.

Ask George Hildobothom who spent seven and one-half hours on them Jan. 22 when he left the Princess Blue Ribbon mine and walked seven miles in soft, new snow to the ranch home of Herman Seiber. From there Angus Brooks brought him to FAIRFIELD.

It was the first time Hildobothom ever had worn snowshoes in his 67 years and he learned the hard way—alone. However, the walking force was the strongest in the world. Cold and starvation faced him at the mine.

Fuel at the mine had dwindled to a few old boards which he dug from beneath the snow. The food consisted of little more than the lunch he brought with him, four boiled eggs and some crackers.

The mine owners, J. R. Davies and Ben, Bole, had agreed to bring food and fuel to the mine but had not done so by this time.

"I had no intention of leaving my bones up there, I'm pulling you man." And the snap in his intense blue eyes and the conviction in his voice made his statement might and convincing.

Having made up his mind that Davies was not going to bring supplies soon enough, he figured out from a mail order catalogue how to make the foot rigging on his snowshoes he had bought, "on a hunch," from one of the men who left the mine last fall. The rigging wasn't exactly right but it served the purpose. He practiced walking on them a few days while waiting for mid-January's heavy storm to subside. Then he started out. A step of foot poisoning had left him much weaker than his usual self but he knew it was now or never, the way the snow was piling up.

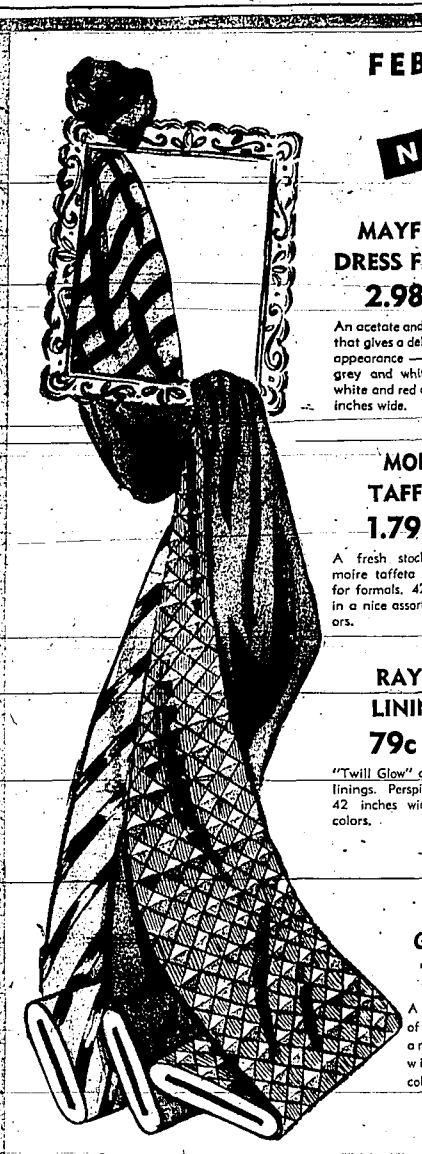
