OUR GREATEST SHAME

If you are inclined to be apathetic about the rapidly rising and increasing number of accidents in human lives, some comparative figures dug up by one of the nation's leading safety-specialists may shock you into realization and action.

During the 10 years 1941-1950, there were 13 spectacular and unusual disasters in which a total of 2,700 persons were killed. Most sensational of these were the Texas City (Texas) fire and explosion, which claimed 551 dead in 1947, and the Coconut Grove night club fire and panic in Boston, which killed 492.

The nation properly demanded that measures be taken to prevent recurrence of these disasters in other communities, and preventive machinery hummed into action promptly and thus far successfully.

During precisely those same 10 years there was another much greater disaster that almost completely unaccounted for the 308,932 persons who were killed in motor vehicle accidents throughout the country—in exactly the same length of time. That is about 111 times the number of persons who died in the 13 and a half disasters that were officially labeled major disasters.

The point is that the 308,932 were killed here and there, at the rate of about 100 per day, and thus lacked the spectacular touch. As a result, there was no unified public demand for protection against recurrence, and the killing on the streets and highways today is even worse.

Can it be that we, as a people, have become so inured to slaughter in traffic that we have lost the sensitivity that would have produced a public demand for action? It is a question that claims 50:1 if that is true, then it is time we made the daily traffic record spectacular by publishing it in 8-column headlines at the top of page one in every newspaper in the country. If that is done, a public demand for action becomes so overwhelming that measures to stop it are made effective.

By all means, let us continue to protest against conditions that make possible Texas City explosions and Boston panics, but in the name of individual and collective security, let us not become so calloused to any form of unnecessary killing, that we permit a Texas City or Boston disaster to occur on our streets and highways every two or four days, year after year, without standing up in righteous indignation and compelling it to halt. Traffic accidents have been our greatest shame far too long.

They should be brought under control when a city or state, or a nation, is so calloused that motorists will not dare violate the law, public officials will not dare fail to employ enough policemen to patrol our streets and highways adequately, police will not dare fail to make arrests, and judges will not dare ask for a "fixed" ticket, and judges will not dare hand down light punishment.

The people can have law enforcement whenever they want it, but they must ask for it in terms that cannot be misunderstood.

Those displaying the "Traffic Safety Volunteer" stickers on the rear windows of their cars are setting an example in Magic Valley.

Those who have pledged themselves to take this problem seriously.

HELP FOR CARDIACS

Such obvious facts certainly are enough to establish the enormity of the purely medical aspects of the disease. Less obvious and much less understood, however, are the social aspects.

What place is the cardiac to have in society? Can he hold a job? Can he earn a living? Doctors say that people with heart disease are generally better off working than worrying, providing the work is not beyond their physical capacity.

In fact, according to latest information, a suitable job may actually improve the cardiac condition, not make it worse. The cardiac has his limitations, of course. He can't do heavy work, he can't move fast for extended periods, he can't do so slowly and without carrying a heavy load.
