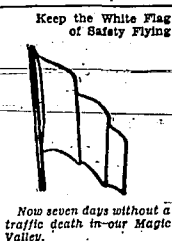

"Bugs" Block Newest Tank Use in Korea

DETROIT, Feb. 27 (AP)—An army ordnance plant was making tanks today that troops in Korea won't accept for combat because of "bugs" in the turret and fire control system. Detroit arsenal spokesmen said, however, medium M-47's were being ordered in assembly lines in sizable quantity, even though they have not been approved for duty by army field forces. Tanks Stored Col. William Call, chief of development and engineering at the arsenal, said the problem tanks were stored in ordnance depot. Call said defects had turned up in the M-47, which he described as "very much a fighting tank" because ordnance researchers had "starved" for funds until the Korean emergency. "If we had had enough money after World War II, these problems could have been licked before the tanks ever went into production," Call said. Similar Troubles The army also has had similar turret control trouble with its new T-4 light tank, now being produced by the Cadillac division of General Motors at Cleveland. Even with its "bugs," Call said, the M-47 attacks up favorably against anything we know the Russians are making. The M-47 is a revised edition of the M-46, now in Korea but no longer in production. Finland Remains As Free Nation

BOISE, Feb. 27 (AP)—David G. Wilson, public affairs officer at the U. S. legation in Helsinki, says Finland's proximity to Soviet Russia has failed to cause "any particular feeling of panic among the Finns." On leave from his foreign post, Wilson stopped in Boise en route from his home at Portland, Ore., to visit with old schoolmate, Robert T. Miller, local attorney. Wilson, a former press officer attached to the U. S. delegation to the United Nations, said even though Finland is next to the "iron curtain" it is an independent country with a free and outspoken press. He said that Finland "reciprocates" the high regard Americans have for that country.

Treble Damages Ordered in Case

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 27 (AP)—Three national film distributors were ordered to pay treble damages of \$100,000 today to Denver theater and refused a new trial in an anti-trust suit heard in district court here. The judgment was against RKO Radio pictures, Inc., 20th Century-Fox film corporation, and Loew's, Inc. The Cinema Amusements, Inc., operators of the Broadway theater here, charged the distributing firms with conspiracy to deprive the theater of first-run pictures. It claimed it had a \$1,000,000 loss by the actions.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The growing prospect of a Truman-Taft fight next November has led the anti-Whirligig forces to a new strategy in order to prevent reelection of the man from Missouri.

It was the result in the nomination of Sen. Richard Brevard Russell, Georgia, on a separate ticket in an effort to throw the contest into the house of representatives.

Since they will take no chance on President Truman or his hand-picked heir maintaining control of the party and the government, they believe they must decide on more definite strategy to prevent that result.

OBJECTIVE—Senator Russell has been advanced as the logical nominee by Gov. James F. Byrnes, South Carolina, again and again. The Georgia legislature, in a special session called by Gov. Byrnes, has elected Taft friends privately the "force of circumstances" may land him in the race.

GENERALISM—Although tall, handsome "Dick" Russell is usually presented him from a leading party, he recognizes him as a national figure rather than a "provincial" or "sectional" figure. He is a man of letters, a writer of books written by composers who never left Broadway, and in "honey child" novels of plantation days.

Mr. Parry said he has watched southern Idaho develop and has fought many a legal battle to protect the water rights of the state and the Columbia valley.

He pointed out, for instance, that there is not enough water in Snake river to fill or irrigate the entire valley.

Those who are glib enough to think they can always "trust" the government not to do anything to injure the Columbia valley are reminded of the controversy in California as a result of the government seeking to gain paramount rights.

Mr. Parry also set forth his reasons for opposing the proposed Columbia valley authority and Hells canyon dam as being among the cleverest schemes yet devised to control state's rights.

Hells canyon dam isn't needed for flood control, he said, as the flood problem arises elsewhere on the Columbia river system.

Without well-established legal safeguards, not yet apparent in the government's plan for taking over the Pacific Northwest water resources, Mr. Parry warned that the Hells-canyon project would stop all future irrigation development on Snake river and attack existing water rights.

At the outset, we suggested that the reader forget for a moment that Mr. Parry expressed this warning in a talk before the Women's Republican club.

Among them are N. V. Sharp of Piler and Charles W. Williams of Jerome, both of whom are gaining national as well as local state distinction, in the reclamation activities.

Right now we see an indication of a vicious attempt to discredit the Idaho Power company—an attempt which logically would stem from all one source, those who seek government control over all our water and power resources.

From readers whose minds obviously have been prepared against the reclamation company, the Times-News has been receiving a number of letters recently, setting forth charges and arguments which are entirely unfounded and absurd.

To open these people's eyes, we would like to make a suggestion, to either the state reclamation association, Mr. Williams, president of the American Farm, the federation, or as a last resort, the Idaho Power company itself in its own defense, that qualified speakers from the reclamation side should be invited to discuss the squeeze of government pressure and intimidation in light of their water rights in California, be brought to Idaho to tell us first-hand why they think about all this government intervention, and how they have fared after falling prey to similar schemes the master planner is now trying to stuff down our throats in this vicinity.

POT SHOTS

New Atomic Furnace May Bring Cheap Atom Electricity for U.S. in Few Years

WASHINGTON (Special Correspondent) (Special of four articles)—An atomic furnace is nearing completion here that may put cheap electricity from atomic energy into a few years away.

Officials of the Atomic Energy Commission, which operates through project AEC-2, want to tell the world all about it. However, AEC has drawn a veil of secrecy about the oven on the grounds that premature knowledge of its true effectiveness will cause rumblings throughout the business and congress, perhaps endangering AEC's hopes for a \$4,000,000,000 expansion.

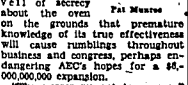
Especially significant of the hopes for this reactor—which, it may be said, will itself produce only a few thousand kilowatts—is the fact AEC has called off construction of a power pile being built by General Electric in New York state. This pile would have operated along the lines of the old type but at much higher temperatures.

Currently eight private concerns—five of them private electric utilities—are completing their reports to AEC on the prospects of producing electricity with atomic energy. They've had the run of AEC's information on the subject for the past few months. AEC Chairman Gordon Dean estimates that he will make the first of them public in a couple of months.

Meanwhile, congress is anxious to know the real answers to the future of atomic electricity. Rep. Henry C. Jackson, D. Wash., a member of the joint atomic energy commission, has asked AEC if construction should be delayed on huge hydroelectric projects until the secrets of the new power source are revealed. So far, AEC only answers uneasily and talks about the weather.

A recent "electric power study" by the joint committee on defense production bluntly states the case. "Your committee advocates that in the course of studies of nuclear fission, the atomic energy commission give attention to the possibility of adding controlled atomic fission to the sources of energy available for industrial purposes."

"While primary efforts in this field, judging by results publicly known to date, have been devoted to harnessing the forces of fission to direct military uses, potential use of these forces in defense-supporting activities such as electric power production should be carefully explored and fostered."

Pat Mearns on the grounds that premature knowledge of its true effectiveness will cause rumblings throughout the business and congress, perhaps endangering AEC's hopes for a \$4,000,000,000 expansion.

"The nearer we get to success," one top AEC official says, "the less we want to say about this reactor."

Some AEC engineers profess doubt about whether the oven will work. Not so timid is Dr. Alvin M. Weinberg, research director of the Oak Ridge national laboratory, AEC's largest, which will operate it. He opines that "we in the business say it will. It will, of course, is a company employee."

This new reactor is affectionately called the "ice pot." It's a big brother of a highly successful one built at Los Alamos, N. M., by AEC and of a small one being constructed in North Carolina state college.

Don't be too dismayed by the oven's name—it's called a homogeneous type. Weinberg explains that its basic idea is simple: "You just put some water in a tank and sprinkle in uranium until the water starts to boil."

The "hot soup" banges away in the tank and is pumped through coils into a water boiler, generating steam to turn turbines. This system is far cheaper to construct and operate than the standard oven, which is fired with dry lumps of uranium.

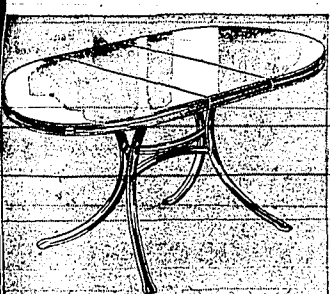

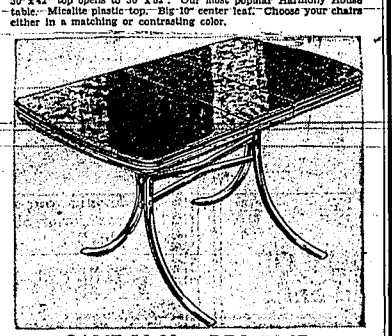

**Need of More
Sheep Seen to
Boost Wool**

By The Associated Press
The United States—a country which needs more wool—needs more sheep and wool dressings—needs to raise more sheep to grow more wool.

That's what a committee of congressmen said after looking into the situation of the sheep, they said, we're in for a terrific wool shortage in case of all-out war. It's a serious situation, they said, and the sheepmen must get their heads straight.

Sheepmen of the west, whose animals roam over tens of millions of acres of rangeland, say that's easier talked about than done. There is no easy road to bigger sheep numbers and large stockpiles of grown-in-U.S.A. wool.

Need Help
They say they need help, such as:

1. Wiping out price restrictions on wool and fat lambs.
2. More sheepherders (it's a lonely life).
3. More grazing lands in national forests.
4. Greater larfiff protection against foreign wool.
5. Interfering with controls on predatory animals including wild dogs.
6. As one sheepman phrased it, "this is a dogged hardworking game."

The Associated Press polled representatives of wool growing associations in eight Rocky mountain states to get their views on what is happening in the sheep business. The national production of stock sheep for these states on Jan. 1 was 2,821,000 as against 1,841,000 as recently as 1914.

Views Expressed
The views included:
Idaho—The Gem state's wool production has dropped to 3,000,000 pounds from 11,000,000 annually 10 years ago. President David Little of the Idaho Wool Growers said the main reason for the drop is government restrictions "is mainly responsibility."

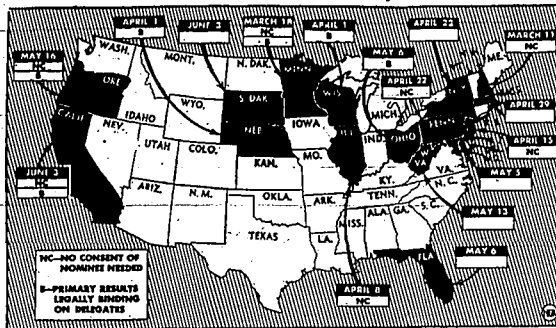
Little said 10 years ago the United States produced more than half of the wool needed in this country. It depends upon imports for more than two-thirds.

Wool Cens Drop
He also said the government's plans to subsidize synthetic fiber will be a factor in causing wool prices to drop more than 80 per cent in the last year.

During the war a number of Idaho sheep growers changed to cattle, Little said, "because there were fewer government restrictions and less labor is required."

But on the war, Idaho had 1,233,000 sheep, but this total was down to 1,070,000 on Jan. 1.

Complex Presidential Primary System Proves Big Puzzle, Even to Politicians

NEW YORK, Feb. 27 (NEA)—A man who works here for one of this year's presidential hopefuls wishes he could give up computing. It isn't the service that's bad. But the sheer amount of the rules keep piling him to explain how the presidential primaries work, and most of the time he can't get them straight.

In Washington the other day a man who works for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and who has made some routine campaign announcements. Before he knew it, he and the reporter were talking up in the perplexities of these same primaries.

The experts and the amateurs agree that the presidential primary laws are monuments to variety and intricacy of the human mind. They even make our crazy-crazy divorce laws look like models of clarity.

Candidates have to hire lawyers to determine whether it's wise to enter "presidential" contests.

The idea is to get this imperfect system as many, President Truman called it, straight. Some of the most populous states like New York, California and Massachusetts, don't have effective primaries.

Michigan has none at all.

Often the heralded results are merely advisory, not binding on national convention delegates. Small states sometimes carry undue weight in the national picture, especially in their voting hours.

FPC Survey Sees No Aid For Utilities

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (NEA)—The federal power commission has ended an investigation into the question of whether four Pacific northwest private hydro-electric projects were benefited by federal trade-in improvements.

The FPC said it found that none of the projects studied during the period fitted by federal projects during the period between 1931 and the end of 1934.

Private companies that own the firms will not have to pay fees to help finance certain federal improvements in the area.

The hydro-electric projects involved in the study were Pudege-Bound Power and Light company's Rock Island development on the Columbia river, Washington; Water Power company's Chelan development on the Chelan river, Fend Oreille Mines and Metals company's Metalline falls project on the Pend Oreille, and Montana Power company's Flathead project on the Flathead river.

The FPC conducts such investigations to determine how much, if any, private companies should pay for federal trade-in improvements that benefit private projects.

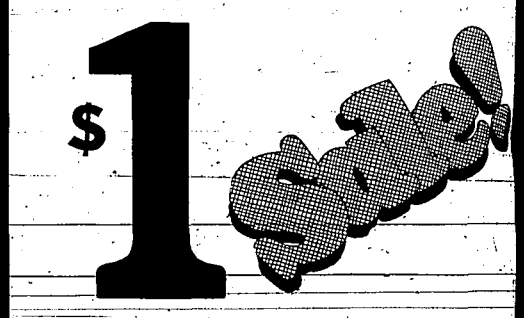

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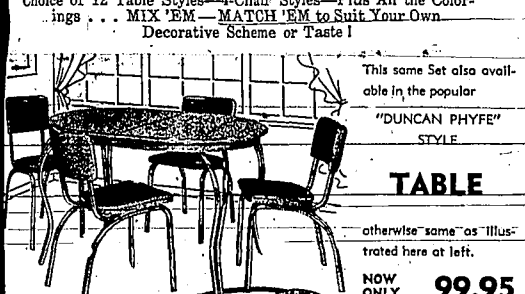

Tait said he had learned that 1,000 pounds of TNT would be used in each of the underwater explosions.

Idaho Health Commissioner Kenneth Lawson said he had written the secretary of the navy and public health service. A difference of opinion in how much water the city of Spokane received from Lake Pend Oreille showed up in navy and independent geological reports and the navy placed the amount much lower, Lawson said.

The city of Spokane has objected to the tests because it was feared the explosions might damage the city's underground water supply.

2 States Okay Blast Testing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27—Secretary of the Navy Dan Kimball says Idaho and Washington state officials have been convinced it is necessary to use Pend Oreille lake in Idaho for explosive tests.

Senator Dwyer, R., Idaho, made public today a letter in which Kimball said "all local authorities are thoroughly familiar with the plans and have agreed that the holding of the tests is in the national interest."

Buhl Girl's Norwegian "Pen Pal" Now Looking Forward to U.S. Citizenship

BUHL, Feb. 27—Little girl Wilma Reed, Buhl high school senior, realizing in 1949 when she started corresponding with a Norwegian youth as a high school English project that the boy, 20-year-old Tore Kristofferson, would be making his home on her parents' farm near Buhl.

Perhaps Kristofferson had no such expectation that year when he agreed to have his name placed on a list of students who wished to become "pen pals" with American students. Today, he is looking forward to entering the army intelligence service or instructing air troops, with the eventual hope of gaining American citizenship.

In one of her first letters to the Norwegian youth, Mrs. Reed asked if he might like to come to America some day. He replied that was the dream of every Norwegian boy. After finishing junior college in Norway in 1950, Kristofferson worked the best paying shifts as a mechanic at an airfield near Oslo and in a paper mill in order to earn money for passage to America.

About a year ago, he wrote to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Reed, asking if they would be his sponsors in bringing him to America. A sponsor was necessary since Kristofferson was permitted to bring only \$20 into the United States and that was just about enough for one taxi ride, he learned later.

Kristofferson's taxi ride came when he arrived in New York earlier this month. A taxi driver there drove him around in circles and told him the charge would be \$12. "Too big for me, I left in a hurry. It was too expensive," was the youth's comment on New York City.

Since arriving in Buhl Feb. 15, Kristofferson has had ample opportunity to sample American food, especially chicken fried, something unavailable in Norway except at Christmas time. He also feels Americans have a better variety of dishes, and eat considerably less fish. For breakfast he used to eat eight slices of bread, butter and jam, with no additional meal until supper time. He adds all Norwegians don't follow that sort of diet.

Almost everything is rationed in Norway. The average person must work all day for the price of 50 eggs. He says meat is so expensive most families buy it only twice a week.

The husky blond youth learned English in school and college by taking three or four hours of English each week for five years. He speaks the language well, but is confused by slang words. He says "stunt" can mean most anything, and he has difficulty in determining whether his American friends are serious or just joking.

Kristofferson also speaks some French and German. His new friends claim he is more interested in improving his knowledge of German than girls. He feels his language ability may gain him an assignment in military intelligence service in the army, or he may become an army ski instructor. A ski champion in school, he brought his own skis from Norway.

Unlike many American youths facing military service, Kristofferson has seen the American army has many good opportunities, much better than European armies, and he can't too sure he wouldn't like to make it his career. Reed's son, William, now serving a four-year enlistment in the air force, cautions Kristofferson not to be in any hurry. Kristofferson tightened the need

feet from a car. He has been skating since he was 4 years old.

The Norwegian says he has no desire to become a ski instructor at any resort. Comparing skiing conditions in Norway with those here, he believes the mountains in Norway are not so rocky. However, the highest peaks in Norway are only about 8000 feet. He believes Norwegian skis are a little longer than those used here.

Farming is something entirely new to Kristofferson, reared in the suburbs of a city, but he expects to work on the Reed farm until he enters the service, probably in the late summer. Reed says the youth is doing well for a person who has never been on a farm. He says Kristofferson is probably no more advanced than the Reeds would be in his place. He has already taken a lesson or two at milking.

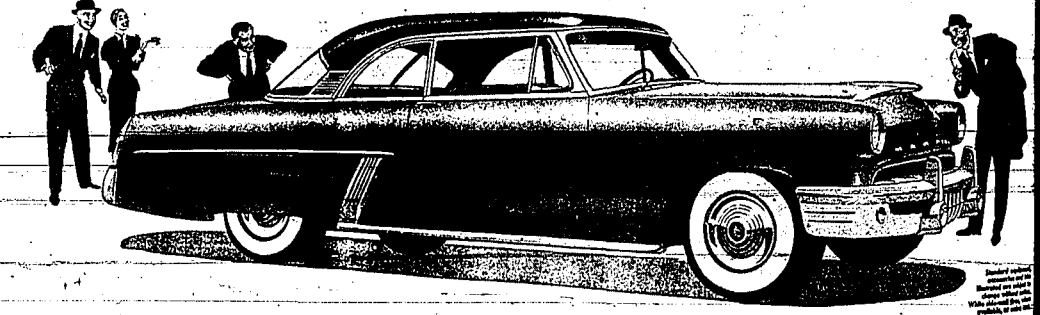

Are the children learning pieces of good poetry, prose and music? These, if they become permanent memories for the young people, will enrich their personalities enormously. It is not possible to memorize a beautiful thought—in lovely words without touching the character with beauty, strengthening the spirit and inclining the whole being toward goodness.

This is something that thoughtful parents and teachers should keep in mind in these days of exposure to bad taste, cheap behavior and lowered morality in forms of entertainment. Children love excitement, action, drama and all of these are presented to them at every turn but without much appeal to their higher instincts. We need to counteract this by keeping the best pictures, the finest poetry, the noblest music before them so that by the contrast they learn the better way.

Speech, the expression of the inner person, is easily influenced by the talk the children hear and much of it now days is less than classic English. 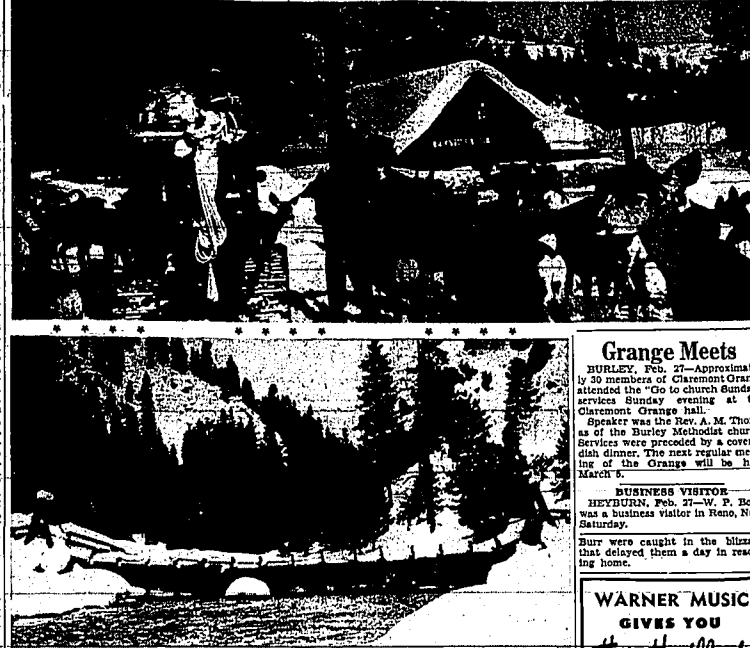

Two Forest Service Men Repair Sheep Bridge Over Boise River in Blizzard

HAILEY, Feb. 27—Two tired members of the Sawtooth national forest personnel arrived back at headquarters last week from a trip that took them to the Drew Hughes ranch on the south fork of the Boise river, a distance of some 100 miles.

The mission of Hunter Nelson, forestry aide, and Ralph Burr, equipment foreman, was to rehang a suspension bridge several miles above the Snake creek ranger station. Weight from four feet of snow on the structure, which is used to trail sheep across the river, together with cold weather, caused the cable clamps to come loose on one side. As the 100-foot long structure tipped, face side upstream, the cable on the other side also loosened, leaving the bridge tall 14 feet into the water below.

Hughes, whose ranch is a few miles above the bridge, noticed the damage on Jan. 28 and wrote the Sawtooth forest service office at Halley. However, the message was neglected to get only a few miles on his journey. For fifteen days it lay in the postoffice at Pine. Due to the heavy snow, drifting, and snow slides mail from Dixie could not get through.

As it became more evident to Hughes that the first rise in water would take the bridge on down the stream, he decided to stop on the trip to Dixie on skis. Gathering up outgoing mail accumulated at Pine, he started on the long, dangerous trip. Four days later he called supervisor Charles I. Daugh-
