Possible Hike On Supply of Metals Hinted

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The supply of metals for civilian goods may be increased in April after being cut back steadily for the past year.

A national production authority official expressed the "cautious hope" today that manufacturers of consumer goods will get a "larger allotment" of scarce metals during the second quarter of the year than in the first.

Supply Eases
The noted as "easing" of the tight supply situation in aluminum and steel in recent weeks.

No firm decisions have been made yet about relief for civilian industry. Officials first want to make sure they can meet all essential demands without drawing any more metals from the nation's emergency stockpiles.

Factors Noted
But several factors, the informant said, point to the "possibility" that the first quarter of 1953—and not the second, as previously thought—will stand out as the period of the deepest cuts in civilian use of metals.

Allotments already announced will give civilian industry as much as 50 per cent more in April through June, as during the current three-month period.

Copper and aluminum for refrigerators, washers and other major home appliances are due to be cut from 35 to 30 per cent of pre-war use in the second quarter.

Scientists Thinking 10 to 20 Years in Future to Keep Atomic Jump on Soviet

By PAT MUNROE (Washington Staff Correspondent)

OAK RIDGE, Tenn., Feb. 20 (Special)—With the Russians improving all the time in this atomic game, our scientists are thinking ahead 10 to 20 years about how to keep the jump on them.



For the last few weeks we've known our scientists are secure and happy behind our atomic barrier. Winston Churchill has said our A-bomb stockpile alone has kept Russia from helping herself to all of a weakened Europe.

We'll be staying ahead for some years yet. While Russia may get several hundred A-bombs of a type suitable to destroy cities, it is unlikely she can rapidly develop the "baby" types for use in the field against troops.

Thus, while we dare not use our big ones for fear of getting the same medicine right back on top of ourselves from them, we could limit the use of the atomic weapons to the "baby" type, which it is apparent we dare not use.

In time, Russia will match us in this field, too.

The H-bomb, hundreds of times more powerful than the standard A-bomb, doesn't appear to make much difference in the overall picture. We are attempting to build one at the new Alton, E. C., plant at a cost of a billion dollars plus.

We are trying to build the H-bomb only because we fear Russia may do so first and thus cancel out in a brief time with a few of them our years of patient stockpiling of A-bombs.

But the time will come, perhaps in a decade when it will be as likely as not that the atomic weapons list "arrange as germ bombs and poisonous gas."

What happens then? Do Russia, China, and their companion hordes sweep over the rest of us? That's the problem that keeps atomic scientists awake nights.

Well, the answer seems to be to create reactors—or engines—that will have both peacetime and war applications. The prospects of cheap electricity for undeveloped areas of the world would be a great prize to dangle before the world's depressed masses.

Just as important is the completion of atomic engines for ships, vehicles and aircraft. They not only could furnish cheap civilian transportation but super power plants for propelling weapons. This would be our way of staying that vital jump ahead of Russia.

That the problem is causing some concern at the White House is shown by these passages from the President's budget message to congress last month:

"Increases (in the budget) are also provided for an expanded effort to develop improved nuclear reactors for the production of fissionable material, as well as reactors for the propulsion of submarines and aircraft. The development of propelling reactors complements other studies under way in contributing to the ultimate goal of economic production of electricity for civilian use.

"The development of submarine propulsion is under way. A reactor to test materials will be in operation during 1953. The development of aircraft reactors will be intensified in 1953."

It has been estimated the sub engine being built by Westinghouse

in Arco, Ida., will be completed next year and put into a hull for a test run. What is not generally known, however, is that General Electric has not been waiting its time in building a sub engine along somewhat different lines.

After running alone quietly in the background with the Westinghouse engine getting all the publicity, G.E.'s project was brought to the front last month at an AEC press conference. Chairman Gordon Dean told reporters:

"I think it is a little early to say which is more promising. They are going two routes and it is a highly competitive situation between two companies, each of which expects to put out a successful reactor."

gine depends somewhat on the results obtained in the materials testing reactor in Idaho, as well as an adequate supply of strong metal. At any rate, the first one should be ready in a couple of years for testing. A contract already has been let for the airplane itself.

Scientists are, of course, betting heavily on the homogeneous reactor at Oak Ridge to provide the answers to production of cheap electricity from the atom.

By 1955, we should know a lot more of the answers.

Some notable scientists say by the year 2000 we'll be getting our energy from the sun, although we won't need coal, oil or uranium. Until this time of universal leisure arrives, however, we've got to be pals with the atom family.
