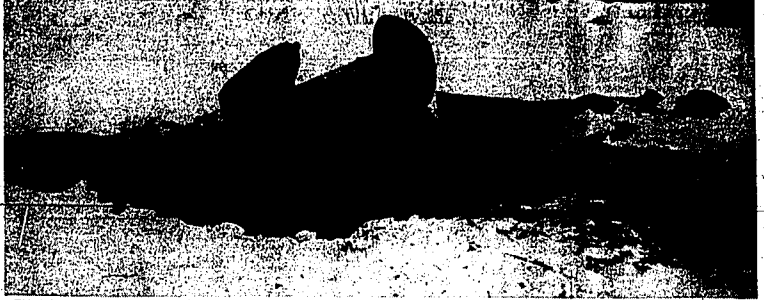

# For One Month, Burley Native Served As "One of World's Biggest Bankers"

BURLEY, Idaho, March 3—During February, a native of Burley held down the job of being "one of the world's biggest bankers."

He is Leo Nielson, 44-year-old descendant of pioneer Mormon stockmen who was temporary vice of the reconstruction finance corporation. He's been RFO secretary, which pays \$11,000 annually, since 1949 but was made acting administrator while the senate was debating approval of Harry A. McDonald, a Republican, to the top post. The senate acted favorably on McDonald's nomination but only after a bitter exchange with President Truman, during which he said he'd run the RFO himself, with the aid of Nielson and others of the regular staff.

After McDonald's confirmation, the Idahoan went back with a sigh of relief to his old, active job of keeping track of 2,800 employees and billions of assets. For however often the top brass changes at the RFO, Nielson is there all the time to provide continuity of operations.

Several of the top men of the directors last year was Walter C. Griffin, a Salt Lake City banker. Congress had put the agency under a single administrator.

One of the most difficult problems Nielson had to deal with last month grew out of Prime Minister Winston Churchill's recent visit to this country. The Idahoan had to negotiate with the British for a supply of tin from the far east to insure continuous operation of the RFO-owned tin smelter in Corpus Christi, Tex.

The solidly-built and blond Nielson, a Democrat, feels very strongly that many past wrongs in RFO have been righted. He says the RFO findings were justified but contends that "RFO now is one of the finest of government agencies. It also needed one, in my opinion, to assist in defense loans and to help small business—which is doing better, tougher and tougher to get financing."

Nielson's tenure at RFO is just about as old as the depression-born agency. He's been there throughout the handling of \$50,000,000-plus of assets and was secretary of its major defense plants production operations during World War II, when the agency's payroll hit 19,000, or five times the present number.

Nielson's grandfather, Horron Haight, came up from Utah to southern Idaho in the 1840s. RFO executive's deceased father was a doctor in Burley and his mother, Mrs. Louis Nielson, lives there, as do his brothers, Adonis and Norman Nielson, who are attorneys.

Nielson was graduated from Albion State Normal school where he played football. Then he attended Stanford university, the University of Utah and George Washington university here, from which he holds a law degree earned by going to night school. He's a member of the District of Columbia Bar.

While he's former Alma Mater "nearly as much as I'd like to," he goes when he can. One of his prime jobs is his ability to slip into spots through western national parks, several acres from which decorate his office.

When a student at the University of Utah, he met a girl who was a member of the class of 1931, he met a young woman who was teaching at the time when he was in Pennsylvania, and now Mrs. Nielson. Their children are Lenore, 13; Craig, 10; and Lorna, 3.

# Many Bonneville Power Highs Set During '51, Report Shows

PORTLAND, March 3 (AP)—The Bonneville power administration sold more than 16,000,000 kilowatt-hours of electric power in fiscal 1951 for a record sum, faked a record power demand, and expanded its transmission lines to 4,370 miles.

Some of the records it set were broken before the 1951 calendar year ended. Administrator Paul J. Raver said that showed more generating capacity is urgently needed.

BPA's annual report shows power sale receipts of \$36,189,923, a 10 per cent gain over fiscal 1950. Aluminum and other industries, stimulated by the Korean war, accounted for 46 per cent of the revenue. The rest of the money came from publicly owned utilities, 27.5 per cent; privately owned utilities, 23.2 per cent; other sales, 12 per cent.

Net income after paying interest, depreciation and expenses was \$14,425,832, a 22 per cent gain over 1950.

Raver confirmed what he said in a public statement in Washington recently: The 1949 decision to continue to sell power at \$12.50 per kilowatt year was sound; higher construction costs may force an upward revision in 1954 when present contracts end, but the increase should not be great.

Raver pointed out that low rates stimulate increased power use. In 1950, he said, the average U.S. price per kilowatt hour was 4.02 cents and the Oregon-Washington price averaged 2.81 U.S. consumption per customer was 902 kilowatts and the Oregon-Washington consumption, 1,410 in 1950, the U.S. price was down to 2.81 cents and Oregon-Washington 1.22 cents while U.S. consumption averaged 1,031 kilowatts and Oregon-Washington 4,567.

Bonneville dam is 28 per cent paid for in seven years, the report says, including interest payments figured at 2 1/2 per cent. Grand Coulee's costs allocated to power right now are 35 per cent paid, but the dam's power revenues will have to absorb some of the basin irrigation costs under the law.

During 1951, a 330-mile extension was made in the transmission lines, making the Columbia river system one of the largest high voltage grids in the world.

Raver's letter of transmittal to Oscar Chapman, secretary of the Interior, defended the policy of sale of interruptible power to aluminum plants and the plan to make future commitments to stream plants on the basis of median stream flow rather than critical stream flow. The letter said this was a calculated risk, warranted by the fact that the policy would account for 11 per cent of national aluminum production during the critical defense period.

Raver said, though more generation should be added, he had repeated earlier recommendations for encouraging non-federal and federal projects including fast-track plants and inter-ties with Idaho and California.

# Deer Count Shows Little Change in Numbers of Herd

The deer census covering areas of the Cassia division of Minidoka national forest completed late last week reveals little change in numbers of deer and the figures are comparable to previous years, Hawley Hill, district game supervisor, announced Monday.

The three major areas in the Rock Creek area of the Cassia division are covered by the census are McMillon, Biter Brush flat and Dry creek. Samples also were taken in the Trapper creek and Goose creek sections, Hill said.

A total of 22 men from the state game department, forest bureau of land management, law enforcement agencies and sportsmen groups participated in the three-day annual count.

The tested areas have the heaviest concentration of deer and most of the animals or winter ranges appeared to be in good condition. Hill said the present high winds and snow storms have driven the deer to lower levels and limited the territory in which they can range, he added.

Of the 22 men participating in the annual count 16 were taken back and seven shot. They saw a number of coyotes but not more than a mammal will kill.

For the past three years the census has been worked on most of the Cassia division but only the areas with the heaviest concentrations of deer were tested.

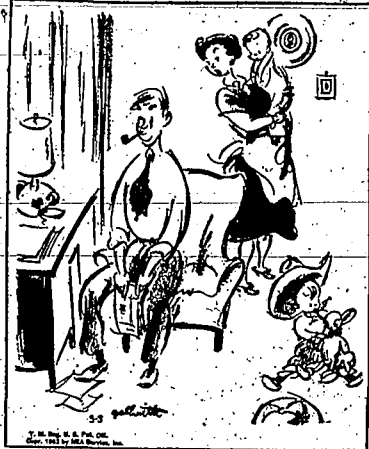

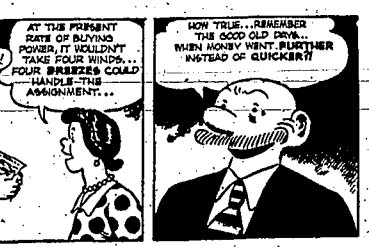

### Taxes Revolt Is Shown in State Survey

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—There is something in the air. A rebellion stirring in this country.

Public unhappiness under the exact burden of federal income tax laws imposed in 1950 and 1951 is beginning to make an impression in Congress.

But the federal government is relatively remote from the people who supply it. On the matter of taxes, the great federal bureaucracy is slow to get the word. State governments are more simple and a lot closer to the voters.

State governments are getting the word with considerable promptness. A United Press check over the week-end showed that at least 13 states recently have passed or are expected to pass legislation on other tax levies that have plans to do. Maryland and Virginia, the states between which lies the mission capital, lead the parade.

Maryland has just clipped state income taxes by 15 per cent. It also has a treatment of the pay-advance right law which provided a 20 per cent cut on 1950 income tax and another 10 per cent decrease this year and thereafter.

The other states easing taxes or planning to do so are Alabama, Kansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, and Wisconsin. Not all the reductions were in income. But they all kept dollars in the taxpayers' pockets which otherwise would have been spent by government.

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—The CIO Steel workers union told a Senate subcommittee today that its members in the aluminum industry "desperately" need a pay increase and a new job security law.

Both unions are demanding wage increases roughly parallel to those made by the CIO union on the basic steel industry.
