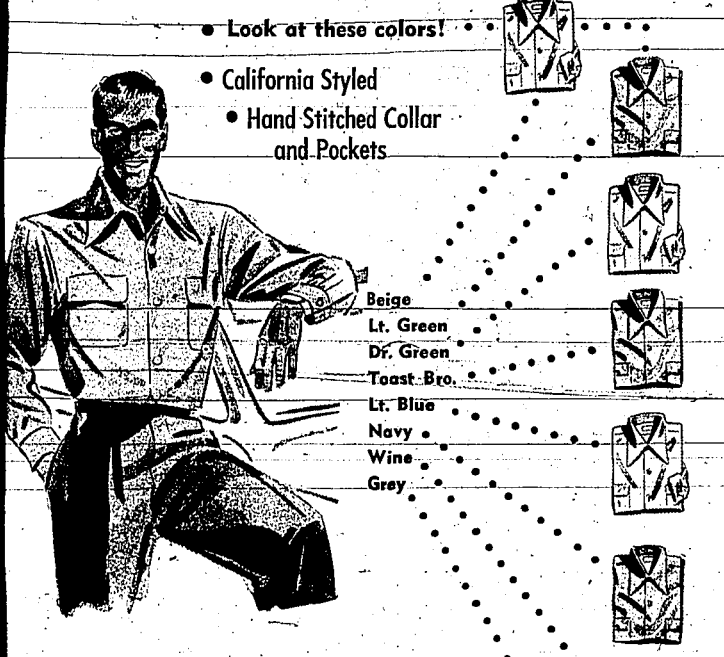

### State School Panel Slates New Session

BOISE, March 4 (AP)—The governor's advisory education committee will meet again April 11 to continue a survey of Idaho school administration to determine whether money for schools is spent wisely.

Leonard Wood, moderator of the committee, said it would survey the school transportation, teacher salaries and general organization of the school system "from the district level on up."

The committee will make recommendations to Gov. Leg. Jordan, who will use the findings for presentation of a unified education program to the 1953 legislature.

### H-Bomb May Aid Peaceful Atomic Gains

DETROIT, March 4 (AP)—Chalmers Gordon, chairman of the atomic energy commission, believes perfection of the hydrogen bomb will help release fissionable materials for peaceful uses.

"If explosive energy can be derived from the fusion of hydrogen atoms, it is a tremendous quantity" of plutonium and uranium—principal ingredients of the atomic bomb—may be freed for such peaceful uses as the production of power.

He listed three principal objectives of present atomic planning:

1. To make the stockpile of fissionable materials bigger, mostly for peacetime uses.
2. To develop the hydrogen bomb.
3. To develop the means by which we can translate the latent power that exists in our stockpile of fissionable materials into terms of maximum military usefulness.

### Timber Route Bid Pondered

BOISE, March 4 (AP)—A proposed amendment to the Forest Conservation Act, which would allow the construction of a road to the vast timber resources in the Teton district is being considered by the state land board.

K. O. Rettig and George Beardmore, attorneys for the Forest Conservation Act, met with the board Monday to discuss possible purchase of state-owned timber in the developed area of Clearwater county.

Sale of three large tracts of Clearwater county timber—containing 1,240,000 board feet—was approved by the board.

Lease of 8,700 acres for oil and gas development in Teton county was approved for Dunn and other representatives of a Bartlesville, Okla., oil firm. Other mineral leases approved included 400 acres in Idaho county for calcium oxide placer operations to W. C. Scott, Harpater, 10 acres in Blaine county for gravel to the highway department, 120 acres in Canyon county to C. O. Clinton, chairman of placer mining, and 60 acres in Boise county to L. L. Packer, Boise, for gravel.

Sale of 1,240,000 board feet of timber in Benewah county and 80 acres of grazing land in Gem county were also approved.
