# House Vote Kills Plan for UMT in Current Session

WASHINGTON, March 5.—(AP)—Bitterly-debated universal military training appeared to be a dead issue today for the next few months at least.

The house shelved administration UMT bill late yesterday. It voted 236-162 to send the measure back to committee, climaxing a dramatic and unusual session.

Both Idaho congressmen, Eudge and Wood, voted for recommitment.

Representative Vinson, D-Mo., chairman of the armed services committee, then killed off any immediate chance for reconsideration.

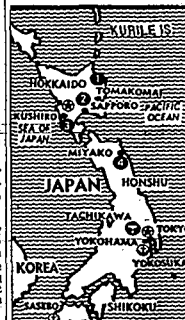

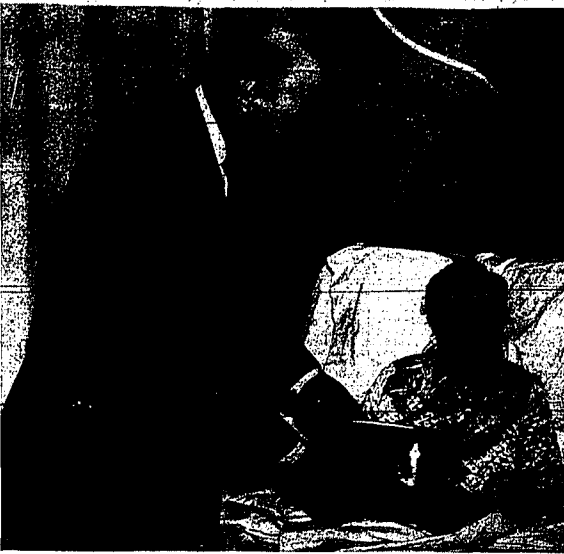

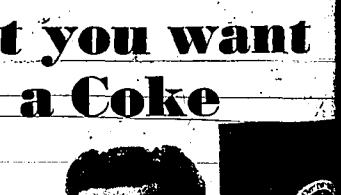

### AEC Moving To Cover up A-Test Mark

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., March 8 (AP)—The site of the world's first atomic bomb explosion would become just another part of the barren New Mexico landscape if the atomic energy commission carries out its plans to fill in the huge crater.

Protest lodged shortly after the AEC's Santa Fe operations office here announced award of a contract for the earthmoving job, Gov. Edwin I. McEachern lodged a formal protest with Gordon Dean, chairman of the federal agency.

He asked that the site in southern New Mexico be preserved for eventual use as a national monument. The spot now is within the boundaries of the White Sands proving grounds and visitors are forbidden.

Explanation made The AEC explained that filling the crater would complete decontamination of the site. However, it revealed that the work would be done by "bleaching" by occasional rains, dispersal by winds and normal radio-activity decay would reduce the activity that the area could be entered almost at will.

Under contract for filling in the crater went to D. D. Ekouan, Albuquerque, on a low bid of \$23,000. The AEC said the work would consist of scraping 100,000 cubic yards of a 50-acre area, scooping it into the crater and covering the entire thing with earth.

The trinitite is fused glass, highly resistant to the tremendous heat of the blast and gained its name from the name of the silicate.

BOISE, March 8 (AP)—Construction of a new west entrance to the city of Pocatello will be placed under contract by the state highway department this spring.

No date has been set for opening of bids, but Miller said it will be this spring.

### Views Mixed In Chance of U. S. Slump

NEW YORK, March 8 (AP)—The prophets of gloom are pointing to the reports of sudden ending of demand for metals as a sign a business slump is under way. More optimistic souls see no justification for fears of a coming depression.

They think first of other explanations of the reported ending of metal supplies than just a sudden lack of demand. And the optimists think, secondly, any easing in the tight supply situation is a step in the right direction toward order and stability, with the final goal the ending of controls.

Arguments noted like this: Much of the easing of demand for such things as some steel products is more apparent than real. When materials are controlled, as at present, the shortage of any one needed in making a product reduces the demand for other metals, whether they are available or not.

An example is the auto industry. Until it gets more of the copper essential to producing cars, it cannot need all the steel now being offered. Auto makers say they would buy the steel if they could get the copper.

Second argument A second argument is that as long as civilian goods producers are restricted as to how much metal they can use, it is impossible to determine the real demand for the metal.

A firm with defense priority may have all the metal it needs, while a toy manufacturer, say, may not be able to buy any, no matter how badly he wants it.

Pleads Guilty JEROME, March 5—George Gene Burgome appeared before Probate Judge Theron Ward Monday on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. The complaint was signed by Police Chief Fred Abrams on Feb. 28.

Burgome entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$100 and costs and sentenced to three months in jail. Sentencing was suspended.

### Rise Reported in Idaho Food Costs

BOISE, March 8 (AP)—Food costs in Idaho have increased 1.6 per cent since last August, a survey conducted by the state department of public assistance reveals.

Commissioner Bill Child said no adjustments would be made on food allowances now given old-age assistance recipients on basis of the survey. Child said the average allowance would be only 35 cents a month.

Child explained that when the food allowance adjustment was made in October, the department took into account some anticipated food-price increases.

District Officer Is Speaker at Meet JEROME, March 5—E. P. Blauer, Burley, district lieutenant governor of Kiwanis, was speaker at the Monday meeting of Kiwanis at the Kiwanis club.

### Levy Bureau Presses Fight For Evaders

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—Slings by scandals within its own ranks, the internal revenue bureau launched a silent but sweeping drive during the last six months of 1951 against tax dodgers.

This became known with the issuance of a report showing: 1. Some 744 tax fraud cases were sent to the justice department for prosecution in the last half of 1951—almost three times as many as in the same period the previous year.

Only 13 Dropped 2. In 1950 for each 100 such new cases, 89 were dropped without full court prosecution. But last year only 13 out of 100 were dropped.

3. Within the bureau itself, cases 10 to the penal division for prosecution increased 28 per cent. The number dropped by the division without prosecution declined 65 per cent.

Warrants Increase 4. Outstanding warrants for collection of all types of delinquent taxes increased from 90,000 cases involving \$24,000,000 at the end of 1950 to 925,841 cases involving \$641,000,000 by the end of 1951.

This crackdown on tax evaders came during the height of last year's revenue scandals, when charges of laxity, corruption and inefficiency were making headlines.

### Utahns Seek Potato Boost Given Idaho

WASHINGTON, March 6.—(Special)—Utah, which failed to receive the potato price "adjustment" granted to Gen. state growers, is now demanding that the OPS extend the same concessions Idaho won in the price battle.

"Utah potatoes are just as good as those grown in Idaho. I guess we just didn't complain loud enough," Ben Arthur V. Watkins, R., Utah, commented.

The base price for No. 1s under the original ceiling order was fixed at \$3.65-20 cents under the \$3.85 for Idaho. Utah also was left out of the subsequent 40 cents per hundred boost given to northern producers because of Idaho's "disaster" crop conditions.

"We had a 'disaster' if they did," Watkins declared. "Growing conditions were the same in both states."

Rep. Walter Granger, D., Utah, demanded a recheck of PMA data which showed the Beehive loss in quantity was offset by a higher quality of last year's crop.

If the new figures show quality is per cent below normal, the OPS must give the same treatment to Idaho, Colorado, Wyoming and Nebraska," the congressman said.

Watkins, GOP colleague, Sen. Wallace F. Bennett, wrote the newly appointed price administrator, Ellis Arnall, "the obvious inequities imposed on Utah potato growers could be corrected if Utah were placed in a common area with Idaho for the purpose of potato ceiling prices. This practice would be in accord with the actual facts surrounding the commercial and agricultural practices of the two states which produce for almost identical market areas."

The OPS has indicated it is unwilling to change its ruling unless the PMA reports new figures justifying "disaster" adjustments for Utah.
