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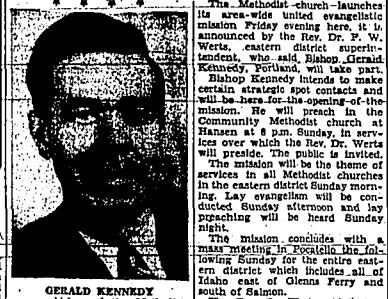

TOKYO, March 6 (AP)—Quick-thinking pilot Maj. John D. Davis probably saved 58 out of 57 of them later cases—from death today when his C-54 military evacuation transportation plane crashed during a take-off from Haneda air base.

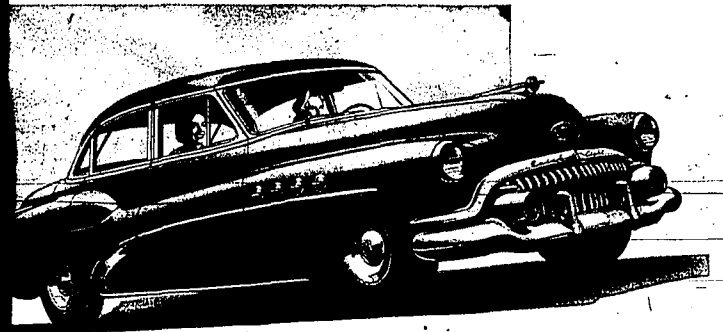

Pinay Pleads For Support; Notes Threat

PARIS, March 8 (AP)—Antoine Pinay, bidding for national assembly support in his attempt to form a new French government, warned today that France is on the brink of chaos.

"There was the margin between security and chaos so narrow," the 60-year-old right-wing independent told the assembly. "We are near the edge, but also near safety and only a slight effort and a healthy policy will be necessary to steer France along the path to safety."

Recess Called

The assembly recessed until this afternoon after Pinay presented his program. Deputies of other political parties are expected to speak later in what probably will be a prolonged session.

Pinay said the country faced a triple financial problem—lack of funds, an almost bankrupt treasury and no budget. France spent more than \$100,000,000 in February and in March 15 would have to pay the European payments union \$75,000,000, he said.

Gold Reserve Low

"France will pay, but if she does not have dollars she will be forced to pay in gold," he said. The French gold reserves are at low ebb.

The little-known political veteran said the main factor in France's precarious financial position is the French people's lack of confidence in the state, principally due to the instability of its governments.

Pinay was seeking support from assembly political factions to try to form the 17th French government since the war. He promised to fight tax dodgers in an effort to raise money to meet a record 1952 budget.

In a letter to OPS Director Mills Arnall, Chairman Beckwith, D. Tex., suggested that Arnall "renew" previous understandings with Canadian officials to the effect that the price of newspaper is "a proper question for discussion" between the two governments.

Treasurer Resigns

HEYBURN, March 8—W. P. Boyd, Heyburn village treasurer, tendered his resignation to the village board Wednesday night. Board members discussed the hiring of a replacement and it was suggested that a woman be hired to take Boyd's place. No action was taken at the meeting, however.

The board discussed electrical rates for the village and decided to revise commercial rates. They also discussed irrigation for the village but took no action. The job of watermaster and road grader operator will be combined in the future, they decided.

Witness Cites Oil Shipment To Red China

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—Houston W. Wasson testified yesterday that he and Newbold Morris, Federal customs inspector, were witnesses for a Chinese national shipping firm which hauled oil and other cargoes to red China shortly before the outbreak of the Korean war.

Testimony brought out that oil shipments were discontinued after the war began, but other shipments continued.

Some of the ships, it developed, were war-built U. S. surplus vessels sold through a complicated deal involving prominent Americans and a dazzling, green-eyed woman shipping broker, Czech-born Mrs. Olga Konow, New York, and Palm Beach, Fla.

Mrs. Konow, who said she has been nicknamed "Oilboat Olga," testified she netted more than \$500,000 in the sale of U. S. surplus tankers to a company wholly financed by wealthy Chinese.

Mrs. Konow was identified as the third wife of Magnus Konow, 64, millionaire Norwegian shipping man and international yachtsman. Her lawyer said she came to this country about 1938-40 and has been in the shipping business in New York since 1944.

Both Mrs. Konow and Wasson appeared before a jam-packed hearing of a senate investigating committee which is looking for any evidence of influence peddling or tax avoidance on huge profits involving the sale of U. S. surplus ships.

2 Nervous Men, Bulletin on Radio Lead to Seizure

OROPINO, March 8 (AP)—Two men who heard a police radio bulletin and left an office in such a hurry they attracted attention, led officers Wednesday to a woman wanted in Kalamazoo, Mich., on a grand larceny charge.

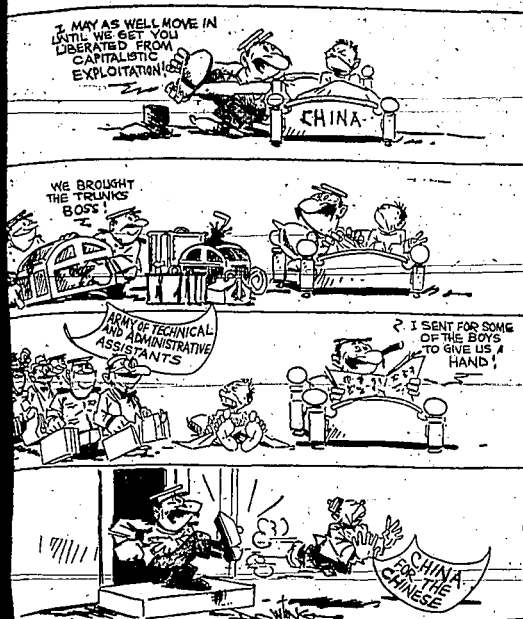

Second Three-Way GOP Race Seen for New Jersey Primary

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—That Eisenhower and Blumenthal are already fighting an all-out battle for Republican votes in New Hampshire, headed for a second three-way collision in New Jersey's preferential primary.

Today was the deadline for filing in the April 15 New Jersey contest. Backers of the three GOP presidential candidates indicated they all would bid for New Jersey's fat bloc of 28 congressional votes. Only 14 of the state's 20 House seats are at stake in New Hampshire, which stages the nation's first primary next Tuesday. On the Democratic side, backers of Sen. Estes Kefauver, Tennessee, were expected to post his entry in the New Jersey race. Kefauver already is stumping New Hampshire in an uphill fight to win the preferential contest from President Truman.

Meanwhile Ben. Robert A. Tatt took personal command of his New Hampshire political campaign in a last-ditch attempt to upset Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower in the country's first primary contest.

Tatt scheduled an extensive three-day "grass roots" tour of the state in an effort to bring out a heavy Republican rural vote next Tuesday.

He planned to address at 100 appearances before winding up the trip with a major address at Gettysburg, the state capital, Saturday night.

Other developments in the presidential race: Truman—President Truman's Oregon supporters said "after conversations with Washington his name would not be entered in the primary in that state."

Kerr—Sen. Robert S. Kerr, Oklahoma, launched an all-out campaign in Nebraska. His supporters say he is Mr. Truman's choice if the president doesn't run again.

Tatt—Senator Tatt said the GOP can win the White House with a "door-to-door" bell-ringing campaign. "We've had popular candidates for the past 16 years, but we haven't presented the letter," Eisenhower — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower told newsmen "I'm no politician." New Jersey state Sen. Malcolm B. Forbes, an Eisenhower supporter, said a one-hour talk with the general convinced him Eisenhower should not come home soon to campaign.

Warren — Gov. Earl Warren of California announced he will enter the Oregon primary, in which Eisenhower also is expected to file.

Group Backs Present Plan On Markings

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—The American battle monuments commission, headed by Gen. George O. Marshall, does not share the army's belief that flat stones are suitable markers for the graves of war dead.

The issue was raised when the army spent more than \$200,000 last fall to install stone slabs in place of the traditional white crosses and stars of David on the graves of 19,000 war dead in Honolulu's national cemetery. The army considers the flat markers make the cemetery look better.

Bill Pending

Bills are now pending in congress to force the army to restore the upright religious symbols on the graves. A house military subcommittee will resume hearings on the legislation next Thursday.

Brig-Gen. Thomas North, secretary of the battle monuments commission, indicated no such issue is likely to arise over the 22 cemeteries for American war dead the commission supervises in various foreign lands.

All Use Crosses, Stars

He said all graves in those cemeteries—20 in Europe, one in North Africa and one in the Philippines—are marked with Italian marble crosses or stars of David about three feet high.

The commission decided "unanimously" that such markers are best to "perpetuate the sentiment of and recall as closely as possible" the temporary white wooden crosses first erected on American graves in Flanders field after World War I, he said.

North said the decision was made soon after the commission was organized in 1923, and was "reaffirmed" after World War II.

MOSCOW, March 6 (AP)—More than 2,000 Idaho high school musicians are expected to leave Moscow May 1-3 for the annual state high school music festival.

Chronic Ills Termed Due To Boredom

LOS ANGELES, March 6 (AP)—Housewives suffer more from chronic fatigue than do their husbands. Dr. Dwight L. Wilbur, professor of medicine at Stanford University medical school, believes the cause may be pure boredom from pushing buttons to get their work done. Many affected. He told doctors attending the College of Medical Evangelists convention that from one-third to two-thirds of all medical patients have fatigue and nervousness. It's a type of fatigue which arises from mental conflicts. "The normal person resolves, avoids or adjusts himself to these conflicts," he said. Treatment Possible. "Those who cannot become victims of the anxiety state or psychoneurosis. But we must first treat the symptoms of fatigue better than organic diseases. "A case of the conflicts in this country is our worship of ambition and desire. We are impatient and want answers to everything right now. Housewives may suffer more from fatigue than men because they are bored pushing buttons to get their work done."

Auto Industry Working Out Air Condition

DETROIT, March 6 (AP)—Full air conditioning for automobiles with proper summer cooling and winter heating is in prospect.

Directly before a meeting of the Society of Automotive Engineers' national passenger car body and mechanical engineers, J. C. Gleason, Chrysler corporation, said car heating has made substantial progress and cooling is about where heating was 20 years ago.

Customers sometimes complain that the fresh air introduced by air-conditioning systems is something less than fresh, Gleason said.

Gleason recommended that air intake be moved to a location more remote from direct exhaust gases.

The Chrysler engineer pictured the ultimate automobile refrigeration system as employing mechanical vapor compression, with its essential parts located in the trunk compartment close to the rear seat.

Snow Is Deep On Watershed

Deep snow in the drainage area of the Snake river and tributaries has a water content ranging from 119 to 165 per cent of normal, according to a survey by forest service and reclamation bureau surveys at 23 major stations last month.

Snow depth at the Lewis lake divide station in Yellowstone national park was 123 inches, deepest in the drainage area, followed by 103 inches at the Grassy lake station in the Fall river drainage.

On the Henry's fork drainage water content ranges for 23.8 to 31 inches with the water content at Valley View being 165 per cent of normal. In the Hoback river drainage, water content ranges from 119 to 146 per cent of normal, at 12 and 12.3 inches.

Water content in the Salt river drainage ranges from 7.3 to 16 inches, 134 to 162 per cent of normal. Water content in the Grays river drainage, slightly less than last year, is 121 per cent of normal.

On the main Snake river drainage area, snow depths range from 45 inches at Moran to 122 inches at Lewis lake divide. Water content ranges from 12.8 to 48.8 inches at the same stations and percentages range from 117 per cent of normal at Moran canyon to 128 per cent of normal at Aster creek.

Two Ordinances Gain Council OK

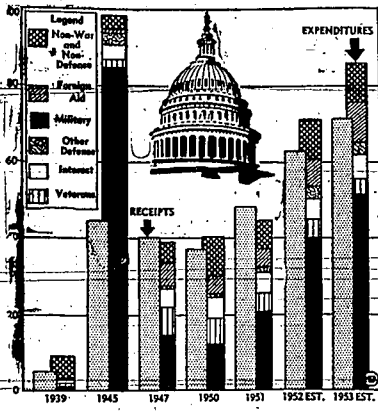
SHOSHONE, March 6—The Shoshone city council passed two re-codified ordinances for the Tuesday night.

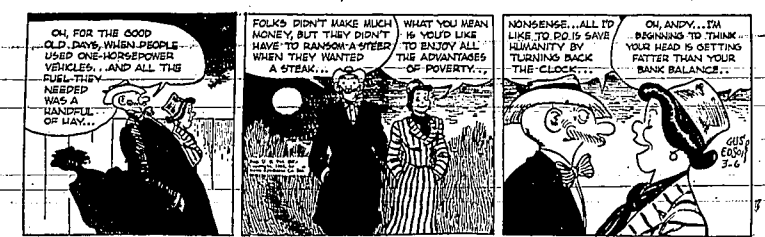

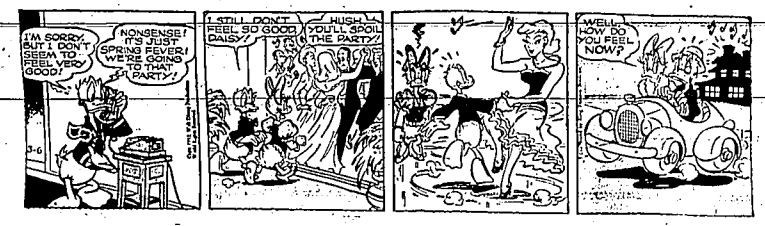

Bitter News of Two Federal Income Tax Raises Driven Home This Month

Editor's note: Federal income tax returns are due in nine days. In making them out, taxpayers are discovering that in the last 18 months Congress enacted not one, but two, increases in individual income tax rates. This dispatch explains how it happened.

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—Complaints are rolling in from stunned income taxpayers struggling with what they regard as hidden gouges in the 1951 tax law. Returns must be filed by March 15.

Looking at the big increase in their taxes, they figure a mistake has been made somewhere or Congress and the administration slipped something over on them when they weren't looking.

What may be just now finding out is that in the last 18 months

Congress enacted not one, but two individual income tax increases. These were:
1. Tax increase of Oct. 1, 1950—This ranged, on an annual basis, from 20.5 per cent in the lowest tax bracket to 11.2 per cent in the highest.
2. Tax increase of Nov. 1, 1951—This ranged, on an annual basis, from 11 per cent to 12 per cent for most taxpayers—on top of the first increase.

Taken together, the two increases result in the following cumulative total percentage hikes in taxes as compared with pre-Korean taxes for some sample incomes (married couples with two dependents):

Net Income	Increases Since Korea
\$ 3,000	33 1/2 per cent
5,000	37 per cent
10,000	30 1/2 per cent
25,000	27 1/2 per cent
100,000	24 1/2 per cent
500,000	14 1/2 per cent

Due to the delayed-action fuses on tax laws, some classes of taxpayers only now are feeling the full effect of the first increase voted back in the fall of 1950—plus a small bite of the second increase too!

By the same token, some taxpayers won't realize the full impact of last July's second increase until March, 1951.

To get the complete picture of what has been happening to your

taxes, you have to go back to 1945. Congress that year gave all taxpayers a five per cent cut from the wartime peak. In 1946, the Republican-controlled 80th Congress made another sliding-scale cut.

As a result, a man with annual tax liability less than \$400 got a 17 per cent reduction in 1946. The man with liability between \$400 and \$100,000 got a 17 per cent reduction on the first \$400, plus 12 per cent on the amount between \$400 and \$100,000. And the man with liability more than \$100,000 got a reduction of 9 1/2 per cent on that part of his taxable income in excess of \$100,000.

In making these cuts Congress left the wartime tax rates in effect but reduced the amount of tax actually payable. You first figured what the tax forms called your "tentative" tax. Then you took off a certain per cent.

Then came June, 1950, the Korean war and rearmament. President

Truman asked for higher taxes. In September, 1950, Congress knocked out the two reductions it had made in 1945 and 1946. It hadn't changed the basic tax rates then—just removed the previous reductions.

This had exactly the same effect as a tax increase. This was the tax bill effective Oct. 1, 1950. Officials explained this increase would apply to only one-fourth of 1950 income and would become fully effective in 1951.

The withholding rates boosted on Oct. 1, 1950, to reflect the higher taxes, making them 18 in place of 15 per cent.

As the 1950 law did not become effective until Oct. 1, only 25 per cent of the total increase was ap-

plied against total 1950 income. So the annual return—filed in March, 1951—covering the whole year of 1950—still showed a tentative tax and then a place to subtract part of that tax.

But the amount you could subtract on returns for 1950 was only three-quarters as much as it had been for 1949.

The 1950 increase now has been in effect throughout the whole year of 1950. Returns now being prepared on 1951 income reflect that fact. The old "tentative tax" and the subtraction from that, have disappeared entirely from the forms.

Now comes the second tax increase passed by Congress, effective last Nov. 1.

But on annual returns, the bill called for an increase of 11 to 12 per cent for most taxpayers over and above the full previous increase.

The two increases together amount to 12 1/2 per cent in the highest income brackets to 23 1/2 per cent in the

lowest, compared to pre-Korean taxes. Withholding rates are increased again on Nov. 1, 1951, to give immediate effect to the second tax increase for those subject to withholding. This jumped the withholding rate to 25 per cent, from the previous 18.

But on annual returns, the delayed-action occurs again. One-sixth of the second increase was effective for 1951. Therefore the 1951 returns—those now being prepared—show for filing by March 15, only tax increases only about two per cent higher than those required under the 1950 act (one-sixth of the second increase of 11 to 12 per cent).

Then will have been in effect full year.

The returns due in March will show taxes up as much as other 10 per cent over the amounts due on 1950 income. Taxpayers who find the full increase on those estimates.
