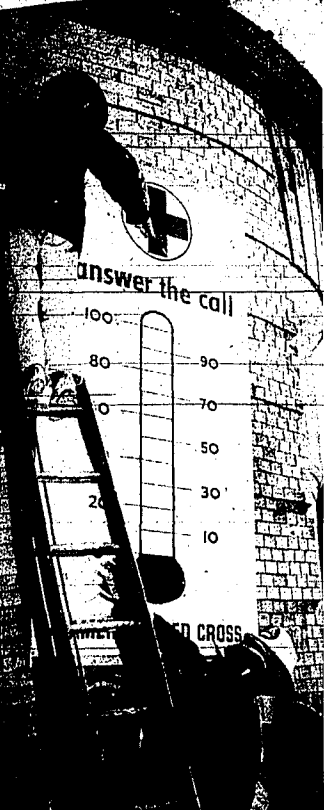


Red Cross Thermometer

Ice on Roads Given Blame In Accidents

Jerome, March 8—Icey roads and weather conditions were the major cause of a number of traffic accidents in Jerome county Thursday, according to reports from the sheriff's office.

A 1951 Ford sedan, driven by Newt Crawford, Richfield, crashed into the rear of a black Pontiac truck driven by Thomas Orr, Orawford, when his foot slipped from brake pedal onto the gas at 11:10 a.m. Thursday one and three-fourths miles north of Jerome. Approximate damage to the sedan was \$700. The 1951 Chevrolet truck received \$10,000 damage.

A Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph pickup truck and a 1951 Ford sedan driven by Leo Johnson, developed each other one and one-half miles north of Jerome. Damage to the Ford was estimated at \$20.

Robert Hansen, Twin Falls, driving a 1948 Plymouth sedan, collided with the rear of a 1950 Ford driven by Alvin Putnam, Pocatello, four miles north of Jerome at 1:30 p.m. Thursday.

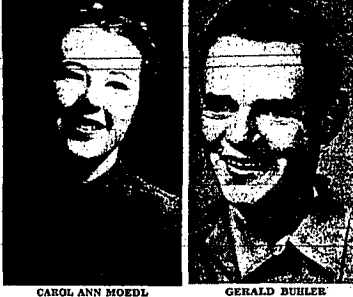

Registered Applications for Post Are Studied

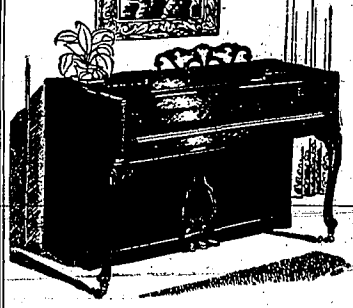

Mrs. Hawkins' attorney was J. W. Taylor.

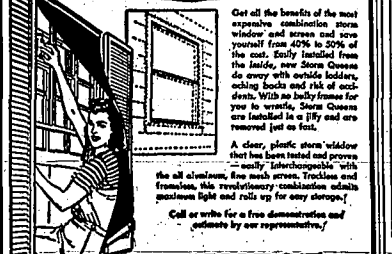

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Taxpayers Are Reminded About Protest on Taxes

Magic Valley taxpayers on the verge of exploding while working on income tax returns have a chance to ease their thoughts on to officials in Washington, D. C., without going to the trouble of composing their own letters.

The plan, originated by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, has been endorsed all over the United States.

And even if you've already submitted your income tax return this year, you can still register your protest.

Printed letters, requiring only your signature, are available at the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce office for two cents each. The letters are printed in three colors, each addressed to a different member of Idaho's congressional delegation.

Howard Moffat, secretary-manager of the Chamber of Commerce, said the remaining stock of letters and envelopes appears to be sufficient to accommodate taxpayers. However, he urged taxpayers to obtain their letters early this week to avoid any congestion Friday and Saturday. It has been suggested that taxpayers use the letters to register their protests with each member of Idaho's congressional delegation.

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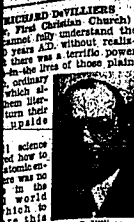

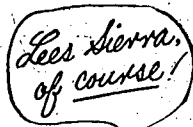

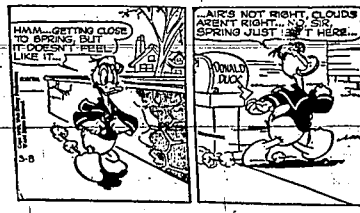
