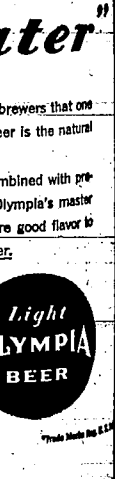

Telephone Installed for Salmon Tract Couple After 39 Years on Berger Farm

When service came to Mr. Harry Crookham this 39 years after they wanted a telephone on the farm. Mrs. Crookham had had some time before moved to the continuous land on the tract. At 81 and 77, respectively, Mr. and Mrs. Crookham are the oldest settlers.

Phone service also was made available to the families on the farm during the past week in Twin Falls Telephone and

Although telephone service has been available to the families on the farm since 1913, Harry Crookham on the farm has had electric power since 1927.

Crookham bought his farm under the Carey act and moved on it in 1913. Water became available the previous year and he took 31 crops off his farm before deciding to retire and rent the farm. He says his last crop was his best.

His principal crops were hay, grain and beans. Crookham was born in Ohio and came to Idaho from Iowa.

Others on the Salmon tract are glad to have their new telephone service. Mrs. B. N. Bailey, at the Berger store, finds it a great improvement over the former service at the store.

As soon as all distribution adjustments are completed, the new system will provide party-line service with not more than eight parties on one line.

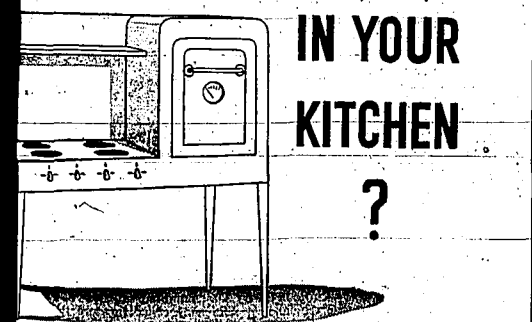

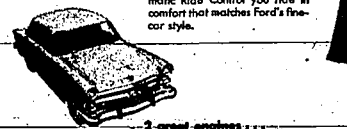

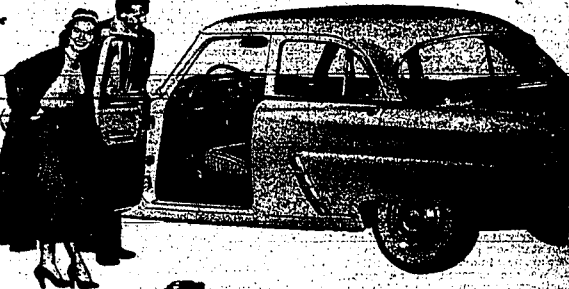

The Methodist church is making the first church use of a special telephone-loudspeaker system in linking three states in a united evangelistic mission which started last week and which is continuing this week.
After hearing progress reports from six zone centers, including one here, Bishop Gerald Kennedy, Portland, spoke briefly Monday to about 400 ministers at the zone centers in three states.
Bishop Kennedy, youngest in the Methodist church, told how he was the first bishop to speak at the Hanten church, as part of the mission, and gave his telephone audience a striking example of how there may be no outward signs of a person's desperate need for the comfort and help religion gives.
Saturday, the bishop spoke from Portland by telephone to launch the mission. His Tuesday speech is scheduled to be given from Gooding, other zone centers for the mission are Blackfoot, Seattle, Spokane and Portland.
Visiting ministers attended an evangelism school Monday in Twin Falls, with emphasis upon preaching and the training of lay evangelistic workers. By telephone, they heard reports of progress at each zone center.
The reports included figures on attendance at morning and evening services, offerings, the number of prospects for church membership, how many ordained and lay workers interviewed the prospects and how many prospects joined the church for the first time or transferred from other churches.

Constant Fight on Rising Costs Shown In Budgets Okayed by Idaho Counties

By The Associated Press
Budgets adopted by Idaho counties this year reflect a conflict between the upward surge of governmental costs and the unwillingness of taxpayers to pay more.

Only a few Gen. Stat. counties were able to whip the upward trend and adopt a lower budget. Associated-Press survey showed today that most of the county budgets hit new record highs.

But nearly all counties used a sharp knife to pare the proposed budget before its adoption.

Reducing budgets this year were Ada, Twin Falls and Jerome counties.

Twin Falls showed the largest drop—from \$2,818,011 in 1931 to \$1,694,412. The 1931 budget, however, contained \$709,499 for money borrowed to build the new Magic Valley Memorial hospital and was an abnormal expense.

Ada county cut its budget \$17,255 to a total of \$1,139,985 primarily through a reduction in highway construction. The county commission, J. M. Dadds explained that under the newly adopted system for allocation of gasoline tax money to counties, Ada loses about \$100,000 a year and consequently has less to spend.

Jerome reduced its budget \$4,250 from the 1931 figure of \$297,600, principally through a slash in the noxious weed control program.

Elections are an expensive item for all counties. Twin Falls county commissioners cut this year. The 1932 primary and general elections will cost Idaho counties several hundred thousand dollars for printing and vote tabulation. Election costs last year were practically nothing.

Several counties gave cost-of-living increases to employees. Bannock county raised its 200,000-100 cent pay boost but joined Ada in awarding employees a \$10 monthly pay boost. Madison county commissioners allied a proposed 20 percent wage increase to live-per-cent cost-of-living increases.

A proposed pay hike was turned down in Power and Minidoka counties, but Minidoka commissioners rounded off some salaries to give some employees a few dollars annual boost.

Latah county budgeted \$900 for salaries.

Several counties, caught with a manpower shortage for lasing driver licenses, boosted the budget for operating sheriff's offices.

Latah county increased its sheriff's budget from \$17,850 to \$44,457 to hire six extra deputies for the Lewiston Orchards area and pay another deputy for driving exams.

Bannock county boosted its sheriff's budget from \$25,200 to \$44,372. Cassia county also provided more funds. Kootenai county provided an additional \$5,500 for the sheriff's office.

Several counties boosted their highway budgets. Little Camas county set aside \$10,000 earmarked for the time-honored construction campaign on the Camas-oyden section of the Sun Valley-Yellowstone highway.

Nex Perce county upped its road budget \$50,200 mainly because of absorption of the dissolved Lewiston Orchards highway district into the county. Fremont county's road budget was upped \$39,425 to a total of \$174,425—nearly two-thirds of the entire budget.

In addition to Jerome, several other counties sliced their noxious weed appropriations. They include Nex Perce, Latah, Bannock and Butte. Butte merged the weed control program with the county agent's office, saving \$4,025.

Minidoka county commissioners hopped off governmental services, including a home demonstration agent vacancy and retaining office salary of a county production officer.

Latah county set aside \$10,000 for the construction of a new fairground.

Kootenai county earmarked \$10,000 for fairground construction and budgeted \$8,000 for establishment of a waterways commission, necessitated by action of the 1931 legislature.

Nex Perce put up an extra \$7,000 to complete reevaluation of real property in the county.

Several budget figures were well attended by protesting taxpayers, mostly from farmers or business-men groups. But none touched off as much fireworks as the Bannock county budget.

Recall petitions have been started against Commissioners George Allen and Mrs. Laura Gough as a result of their stands on the budget. The controversial Bannock budget finally was adopted after \$120,000 was slashed from the proposed budget of \$292,000. It still is considerably higher than the 1931 budget of \$170,031.

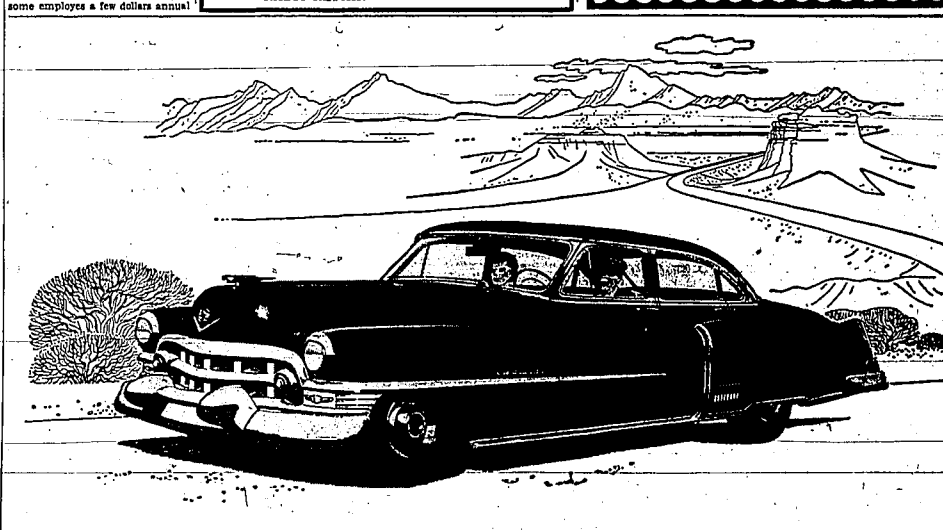

Contract Listed To Buy Uranium From Phosphate

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—The atomic energy commission has disclosed it has contracted with the firm of Texas City Chemicals, Inc., to buy uranium recovered as a by-product in the treatment of phosphate rock.

The primary purpose of treating the rock is to obtain phosphates for fertilizers and other uses.

The new contract is part of a general effort on AEC's part to step up domestic production of uranium for bombs and other uses by taking advantage of the occurrence of the precious stuff in certain phosphate rocks in Florida and some western states.

The commission pointed out that while the amount of uranium present in phosphate rocks is quite small, the "large tonnage" of phosphate rock mined annually makes the uranium by-product quite a worthwhile prospect.

Meter Shot

PHILADELPHIA, March 11 (AP)—Many a motorist had a secret wish fulfilled — someone shot a parking meter in the head.

Motor Inspector Joseph Staunton made the discovery.

Imbedded in the miserable little mechanical brain that ticks off the minutes to a parking violation, Staunton found a 38 caliber bullet.

"We found parking meters stuffed with mud, chewing gum, wires and twigs," Staunton said. "This little is the first one that has been shot."

West's Shipyards Not Adequate for Work, Navy Says

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—The navy says some of the major ship reconstruction jobs are being done at eastern yards because of the inadequate capacity on the west coast.

The navy bureau of ships issued a statement in response to published reports that it was "wastefully diverting" business from west coast builders.

"In so far as naval ship building and conversion are concerned, only a few private shipyards have the capacity and experience to design and produce large combatant naval vessels," the bureau said.

"Most of these yards happen to be on the east coast."

\$1.85 Bounty Paid Reds for Every Marine

WITH U. S. MARINES, Eastern Front, March 11 (AP)—A United States marine's worth \$1,850 in bounty to any communist who captures or pleases to learn they are worth anything to front line reports, marine prisoners entitle their captors to 10,000 North Korean won—about \$1.85 a medal—and two weeks leave in the east coast port of duty which is being shelled by the United Nations navy at the rate of about 1,000 rounds per day.

The "reward" information came from a North Korean prisoner who said his superiors were especially anxious to call U. S. marines for questioning.

Word of the bounty was greeted by the East with mixed emotions.

"I got a big kick out of it," said M. J. Francis, C. Crawford, San Diego, Calif. "It gives me an important feeling."

"With the hell says I'm only worth a buck eighty-five," said another.

Francis Jure, San Pedro, Calif., said he'd be surprised if the report is true. He said he found one of the medals on a communist soldier's body out in no man's land.

"It looks like a piece of tin," he said.

U. S. Emergency Decreed in New Disease Threats

HELENA, Mont., March 11 (AP)—The federal government has declared a state of emergency in connection with the hoo- and mumps virus which has been found on the person of a German immigrant who came to Canada last October.

James E. Murray D. Mont., informed the United States.

"The secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan," Murray said, "has declared a state of emergency," "makes available emergency funds which will permit Brannan to send 45 additional men to maintain a mobile patrol along the Montana-Canadian and North Dakota-Canadian borders."

"I will continue to stay in close contact with departments in Washington," Murray said in a telegram received here, "and I will urge full cooperation with Montana officials."

On March 4, Montana's livestock sanitary board ordered aerial patrol of 150 miles of Canadian border, to keep the disease in Canada, and voted to ask congress for funds for a game fence along 150 miles of the border.

Jet Pilot Starts for San Francisco, Spends Day Visiting Relatives Here

When James Gasser left Nellis air force base, Las Vegas, Nev., Sunday, he was on a routine training flight in a P-80 fighter plane with San Francisco as his destination.

"But when he arrived at San Francisco, the airports were weathered in so he backtracked to Ogdén, Utah, to refuel; then came to Twin Falls to visit his brother, Jerry Gasser, and his sister, Mrs. Carl L. Nelson.

The flight from Ogdén took a matter of minutes, and Gasser flew low over town before attempting the tricky landing on Joelin field. He said his runway event's any too long for the fast craft.

The whooshing rumble of the jet over town attracted a large crowd to the airport to see the "Shooting Star," believed to be the first jet to land here. Within one hour after the plane circled Twin Falls, 200 cars had shown up at the airport.

Gasser returned to Las Vegas the same night. The plane doesn't require a particularly long runway for its takeoff but Gasser said it uses a mere 35 gallons of fuel per minute during its takeoff.

Those who didn't see the jet craft may have another opportunity: Later this spring, the civil air patrol is planning a free air show so that the public may view the latest jet fighters, heavy bombers and other air force craft.
