# Eisenhower and Kefauver Score Decisive Victories in New Hampshire Ballot

MANCHESTER, N. H., March 12 (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Sen. Estes Kefauver scored grand-slam victories in the New Hampshire primary today, crushing Sen. Robert A. Taft and President Truman, and capturing every delegate race.

The results of the election, stunning to both major parties can cause a complete re-drafting of strategy for the presidential election in November.

Eisenhower swamped Taft in the preferential vote, the "popularity contest," by some 48,407 votes to the senator's 85,820.

Kefauver took on the Democratic machine in New Hampshire. Against the odds he won the primary with a score of 20,147 against Truman's 18,752.

The total vote approximated 192,000 and was divided into the 1948 primary by upwards of 49,000.

Kefauver modestly said only that he thought he had "made some friends." Many observers expected a defeat for Taft.

Record noted that Mr. Taft served 12 years as governor of the state before entering the Republican ticket in 1948.

### TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The United States must assume heavy responsibility for "setting Europe down" and reopening on the Truman-Acheson pledge to build a strong and sane European community on the old continent, in the opinion of foreign diplomats at Washington.

This indictment of Uncle Sam may come as a surprise to millions of Americans. In view of our war-time role as the big power, and the fact that the Truman family, after having been complaining that Europe was not sharing the world burden.

UPBEAT—The French refusal to raise money to finance the force blueprint at Lisbon has disappointed President Truman and Secretary Acheson, who hailed the European defense community agreement as a "great victory."

They have also been upset by Prime Minister Churchill's admission in comments that the United States had not made good on deliveries of supplies, and that it was not going to carry out, her rearming assignment.

Sen. Mike Monroney, Oklahoma Democrat, recently bemoaned up with a concrete proposal to that effect. He wanted to create a three or five-member fact-finding commission to conduct on-the-spot inquiries into campaigns and ensure unfair practices.

The idea, of course, would be to discourage irresponsible, mud-slinging activity by candidates seeking either a seat in congress or the presidency. Monroney feels that the commission needs elder statesmen as members if it is to be effective.

On the face of it, there is a lot to be said for this plan, or one with this general aim. Campaigning in the United States has always been a pretty rough and tumble affair.

Here and there in the congressional campaigns of 1950 tactics were used which any American who honors fair play could only view with shame. There is already ample evidence that the pattern thus established is being repeated in 1952.

The feeling seems to have got about that the end justifies the means, the important thing is to elect or to defeat; it matters not how this is accomplished.

Politics never was an enterprise for the thin-skinned. A candidate has to expect abuse and a stretching of the facts. But there is a limit to everything. And any politician or citizen who believes that unbridled and venomous attacks are legitimate strategy has lost touch with American tradition.

We like to look down our noses at the "fanatics" of the middle east and other areas who today are stirring so much trouble in the world. Yet there is in this country an equal number of fanatics who are not so easily distinguished from the antics of the Arab nationalists.

The middle eastern extremist includes assassination in his bag of tricks. Our more violent campaigners seldom go that far. But they do not lack for a certain vicious character. There is perhaps some question which type of assault is the less kindly.

Lawmakers who revere the American tradition of fair play, who believe in honest presentation of men and issues, ought to take a good look at Monroney's plan.

FRANCE AND GERMANY  
A European army with German units participating is not yet a reality. But it has advanced a significant step closer to that stage with the formal endorsement of the plan by the North Atlantic treaty organization at Lisbon.

The idea of a six-nation army that would include Western Germany was born in London. Negotiations looking toward its creation began last summer. But then serious snags developed in both Germany and France.

In Germany, the difficulty is that the Bonn government, while it professes to be open to political equality and greater independence. The Germans, vanquished though they were in World War II, see the paradox in their being asked to contribute to the defense of free Europe without sharing equally in its privilege.

There may be sudden, even arrogance, in a defeated nation's boldly calling for equal status a mere six and a half years since it fell in the dust. But there is also an inexorable logic in it. How can we convince the Germans that they should be our "partners" in military matters only?

As for France, the problem is simply fear of a rearmaged Germany. Torn by this fear and the counter-balancing necessity to have German attacks thrust into the front-line, the communists, the French devised the Eleven plan for a European army.

On its face, this appears a far-seeing gesture aimed at the ultimate unity of Europe. But from the French viewpoint it is primarily a compromise between reality and the free of gaining the German strength for the free nations without exposing France to the dangers of an independent German military force operating under its own general staff.

This inherent contradiction in the French attitude has become increasingly apparent in recent months. The French national assembly now has approved the European army with German elements, but not without conditions that would gravely slow down the program.

Nothing yet done by NATO at Lisbon, nothing yet on the European horizon any other way, seems to offer a solution to the German and French puzzle. The only way the use of the arts of statesmanship will be needed to win Germany's support without yielding more to them seems wise to offer a nation still untripped as a member of the democratic family.

If it weren't for enemies; whom would we blame for troubles we bring on ourselves?

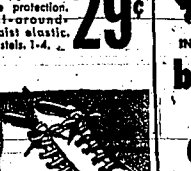

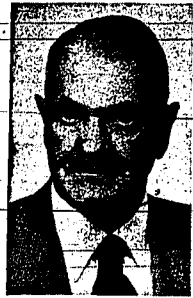

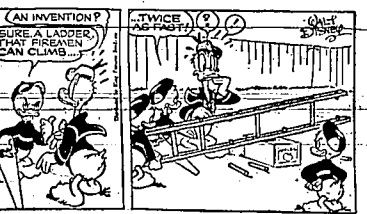

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### Adviser Says Tax Increase Best for U.S.

WASHINGTON, March 13 (AP)—Leon H. Keyserling, chairman of President Truman's committee of economic advisers, emphatically disagreed with congressional warning that the United States should be spending itself into "bankruptcy."

His also believed it would be better to raise taxes enough to put the government program on a budgetary basis. That would require a tax increase of some \$14,000,000,000 a year, he said. He said the U.S. would be "cheaper in the long run than inflation."

His belief that the United States is still in healthy economic conditions despite the strains of the defense program was expounded in recent testimony before a House subcommittee on appropriations. His testimony was the first in a series of "closed-door" testimony was published in the House.

Rep. Sidney R. Yates, D., Ill., asked Keyserling about the frequent warnings of congressional economy bloc leaders that "the United States is on the brink of bankruptcy."

Keyserling replied: "The nation's economic situation is national output has been rising five, six or seven per cent a year, and which is fully using its manpower and services in the production of goods and services. I believe, very strong economically."

He said that a nation in which private enterprise was investing last year in the annual rate of about \$3,000,000,000 is in bad shape economically."

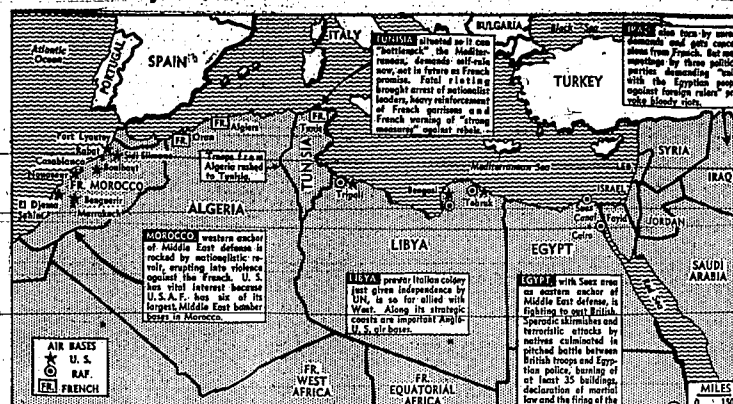
