## Political Opponents Still Rating Truman and Taft as Formidable

NOTON, March 13 (P)—Opponents of President Truman's reelection are still rating Truman and Taft as formidable political opponents. Senator Taft ranked as a "tall formidable" opponent, while Truman was rated as a "tall formidable" opponent. The primary victors are Senator Taft and Truman. The Democratic candidate in Tuesday's election was Truman. He has not yet been named as the Republican candidate. "Don't anyone think for a minute that Bob Taft is out of the race. On the contrary, we are sure for our side, that July nominating convention is still a long way off. In anything can happen in politics," said a Taft supporter. Well Will Replace Little Wood River in Shoshone's New Water System for City

SHOSHONE, March 13—Sho-  
shone's new well, drilled last October, will pay into use this spring, replacing a system that has been termed obsolete for several years.

But Terry, city water superintendent, says he has not had time to test the water in the old system for the last year. He thinks the system is safe to replace by the water in the new well. The Little Wood River is the source of supply and it will be replaced by the water in the new well.

During a muddy season, for example, it takes one grain of alum per gallon and six pounds of chlorine a day to purify the water. In addition, the water has to flow through a settling basin to help remove the impurities. The bacteria and alum settle to the bottom of the basin and the water flows through a series of pipe lines leading to the filter. The alumonia acts as a carrying agent to keep the bacteria from clogging the filter. The filters, installed in 1914 and 1917, are massive barrels. Filtration with the bacteria system of the graded sand and rock formation. The water flows to the bottom and through the bacteria system.

When H. C. Clare, director of public health, near the tank, took office he didn't feel satisfied with the reports and doubted if the water was pure. Although samples were passing the test.

He treated the vessels used in trying samples to those used in chlorine activity work. His hunch was right. The water was not pure. The continued activity of the chlorine during transportation was killing the bacteria. The following analysis discovery of chlorine was injected into the water for filtration rather than job afterwards. It apparently did not because no positive tests have been made since that time.

Until 1921, Terry said, filtration was the only means of purification. In spite of positive reports and apparent inadequate purification, though, there is no record of water-borne diseases in Shoshone.

Filters must be cleaned every five years, Terry continued. This job takes two men 30 days. After the barrel is cleaned out-of-the-barrels the men move in through man-holes-and wash the sand and gravel with a machine of their own invention. The sand is washed by the men, the filtering sand used in the barrels was purchased for \$12.75 a ton in 1920.

An spite of precautions a certain amount of sand gets away every time the sand is washed and usually ends up in some woman's newly acquired kitchen sink. A favorite stopping place for some of the sand seems to be the fire hydrant across from the Gross drug store. A few years ago three dump trucks of sand was salvaged from fire hydrants. It was taken back to the pump house where it was washed and put back into the filters. Some, until for use in the water, was used in making walks in the city park.

Five big wheels at the end of the filters are used in backwashing the filters. This backwashing must be done every day and in the summer during the irrigating season, every few hours. It is the last job Terry does before he goes home. In backwashing the filters, the water is recirculated through the filters, taking the city water into the water.

The first pipes were wooden and when Terry went to work for the city they were full of holes. They were replaced shortly after he became superintendent.

The most exciting day in the superintendent's career was March 1948, when the city water tank collapsed. He and another man were working near the tank, and the tank was being filled that morning for the first time following a lengthy repair job which they had worked on.

Terry and his helper looked up in time to see the tank bursting at the seams and some tumbling to the ground. Water and metal were thrown in all directions. Buildings collapsed and part of the tank fell on the filter house roof. Water pressure knocked one of the pumps off its foundation and the building fell in.

Once the metal landed, it was too hot. But not so with the water. It continued to run everywhere. By the time Terry entered the pump house water was waist deep. His shirt off the pumps and the chlorine people wearing overalls in water plant, asking Terry what he was going to do.

He said he was too confused to think. He borrowed a car, his own was half full of water, and drove to the south edge of town. Picking a quiet spot he stopped and did a little thinking.

Water was flowing from open pipes at the base of the tank and there were no blueprints of the design, only Terry's memory. The control valves were under the floor of the pump house. After a few minutes of measurement he returned to the scene of the devastation and shut off the proper valves. The pipes were plugged and in two hours Terry had the water running again, using pump pressure rather than tank pressure.

Terry pumped water for the city for almost a year. But it happened that the winter of 1944 was one of the coldest on record. There were two days of below zero weather. Every tap in the city was left open almost from freezing.

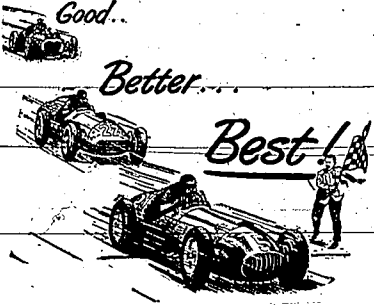

### Eight Officers Assured Cars After Release

DETROIT, March 13 (AP)—Eight American officers held as war prisoners by the Communists have been assured they will have little trouble buying new cars when they are released.

The eight, who placed orders by letter with General Motors corporation here, were told that the cars will be big on the delivery list in the event of a car shortage at the time of their repatriation.

The letter was written Jan. 10 and signed by First Lieut. Robert C. Lemke, Warren, Wis. It said requests were circulating in their camp "somewhere in North Korea" that "automobiles are beginning to become hard to get."

"A group of us not together and decided to try to get a letter through for you requesting that you put us on your lists for new automobile purchases," the letter said. "As most of us do not have any idea what our families know we are alive or not we would appreciate it if you would drop a card to our home addresses saying you have heard from us."

The names of all eight men appeared on the lists of war prisoners released by the communists recently. Besides Lemke, they are Capt. Claude W. Hooten, Santa Rosa, Calif.; Capt. Nicholas J. Lesmon, Philadelphia; Lieut. Joseph E. Breton, Rochester, N. Y.; Capt. G. J. Dennis, Springfield, O.; Capt. Lawrence W. Bach, Grand Forks, N. D.; Lieut. Lloyd O. Wortman, Jr., Springfield, Mo.; and Capt. James C. Williams, Warner, Okla.

GM Vice President W. F. Huftader said in a return letter that delivery of their new cars would be "expedited" and that the company was writing to their families.

"With this letter goes our very deep respect and admiration for you and the hope and prayer that your repatriation will be as speedy as possible," Huftader wrote. "Our hats are off to you."

### Army Tests New Nylon Armor Vest to Reduce Fatal Wounds

SEOUL, Korea, March 13 (AP)—The army is testing a new nylon armor vest which it hopes will cut fatal wounds as much as 30 to 40 per cent.

A new metal vest has been tested previously and in several instances has prevented possibly fatal wounds. The new vest, made of 12 layers of nylon, will be tested in combat for about four months before the army decides whether or not it should be put into mass production.

The purpose of the test, said Lieut.-Col. Andrew A. Aines, head of a 40-man test team, is more to save life than limb.

"The test, called 'operation box' has among its implications the possibility that the vest will reduce serious wounds and the number of soldiers killed in action, through protection of the torso.

"The army said that 60 to 80 per cent of United Nations casualties in Korea have been caused by fragmentation—chunks of metal from bursting mortar and artillery shells—the most serious of which were in the torso area.

More than 50 per cent of these wounds have been fatal.

The vest will be tested in two sizes, one, size 42, weight seven pounds and 12 ounces. The other, size 46, weighs eight pounds and four ounces. They are composed of 12 layers of nylon, padded with a one-fourth inch sponge rubber around the bony parts of the torso.

Aines stressed that the vest is not the experimental stage, costing now about \$100 each. But he said the cost, once the vest is in mass production, should drop to about \$25 each.

The nylon vest also has been worn by U.S. troops in combat, but with no results. In its first use by combat-troops, only men without the vests were hit.

During future tests, Aines said, his 40-man team will try to determine if the weight of the vest hampers the soldier, whether in hot weather it will reduce his efficiency and whether it increases the efficiency of the soldier through psychological effect.

"The vest does not provide protection to the arms or legs. Neither will it stop small arms fire—bits of machine-gun—as a rule, Aines said. It is designed to stop fragmentation casualties only.

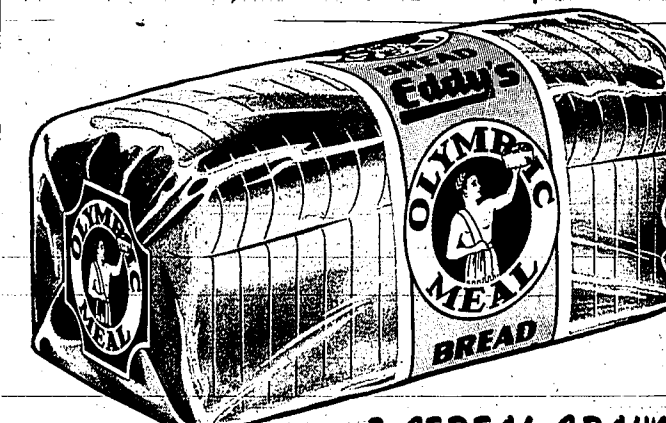

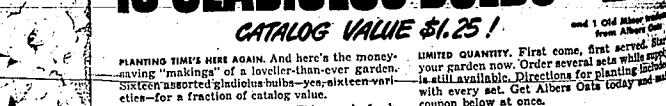

# Actively Few Voters Get Direct Role In First Round of Electing President

But do not have a preferential poll as used to tie up a state's convention votes until the party leaders determine which candidate's bandwagon they want to ride.

The primary system in selecting delegates to the national convention is a 20th century innovation. Wisconsin started it in 1906. The idea grew until, in 1916, there were direct primaries in 24 of the 48 states. From 1916 to 1928, more than half the delegates to the national convention were chosen by the primary system.

But primaries were abandoned by some states when it became evident that the crazy quilt pattern of separate state laws failed to provide a real national pull on presidential sentiment.

President Truman called the present system of state primaries a lot of eyewash. But he favors some kind of a national presidential preference primary. Woodrow Wilson advocated a primary system as far back as 1913.

Bills to provide a national primary have been introduced again in congress this year. But two-thirds of the states still choose their delegates in state party conventions or by decision of the party-governing state central committee.

(Tomorrow—the national convention.)

These—Illinois, Nebraska, Nebraska, New Jersey, Oregon, Virginia and West Virginia—presidential preference along with the election of the presidential preference is a sort of "popularity" for candidates for the national nomination. Some call it "popularity" contests.

Oregon does this "popularity" have any direct bearing on the election of a nominee at the convention. Oregon delegates to support the candidate to poll the most votes in a state ballot.

These three states merely advisory. Pennsylvania and West Virginia are not pledged "popularity" poll cannot states which elect delegates by primary vote

The delegates are pledged in California, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin, Florida, Massachusetts, South Dakota and New York.

The delegates are pledged in California, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin. They may be in Massachusetts—South Dakota and Florida—But New York, with the biggest delegation at either party convention, makes no provision for delegates to show their preference for a nominee.

Maryland has a primary to elect delegates to the state convention which in turn picks those who go to the national convention. In Alabama, the Democrats elect their convention delegates, but the Republicans use the state convention or committee system.

The value for primaries for testing nationwide sentiment is further reduced by the fact that all candidates for the presidential nomination don't enter the same races. New Hampshire's curtain-raising primary offered the widest field so far this year. President Truman and Sen. Estes Kefauver, Tennessee, were on the Democratic ballot. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Sen. Robert A. Taft, Ohio; Harold E. Stassen and Gen. Douglas MacArthur were on the Republican ballot.

Taft and Stassen are entered in Ohio, Illinois and West Virginia. They also are entered in Wisconsin along with Gov. Earl Warren, California, and a pro-MacArthur slate of delegates.

Pennsylvania offers a primary contest between Stassen and Eisenhower forces. But Taft, while not entered, has a good chance of getting the backing of some Pennsylvania delegates at the national convention.

Kefauver is pitted against Sen. Robert E. Kerr, D., Okla., in the Nebraska primary and against Sen. Richard B. Russell, D., Ga., in the Florida voting.

Kefauver pulled out of the Minnesota primary, where Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey is running as a "favorite son" but stayed in the Ohio contest, where the state organization is backing former Sen. Robert J. Bulkeley as a "favorite son." Kefauver is alone in Maryland.

### Patients Get Guide Folder For Hospital

Guide folders now are being given to patients entering the hospital. The folders are made available at the doctor's office. The folder's introduction reads:

"The hospital is perhaps for you an untried experience. That your stay may be pleasant, your stay more pleasant, we present this little guide with a cordial welcome to you, our guest."

The folder explains entrance procedure, pointing out reservations for an array of service are made by the patient's physician. Arrival hours are explained and the folder answers the question of what items a patient should bring.

Deposits and insurance verification requirements are described in a section on the patient's account. In an explanation of various charges, the folder states:

"The only charge the hospital makes for all patients is the room charge which covers your board, medicine, food and nursing care. The other charges are for services which your doctor will order for you, and the hospital only provides them on the doctor's orders."

The folder also does any more paid to the hospital cover the fee of the attending physician. This matter is wholly between you and your doctor."

The folder points out the same situation exists between the patient and a private duty nurse as contrasted to the staff nurse provided by the hospital.

Other sections of the guide concern meals, visiting hours in private rooms, semi-private rooms and wards, the hospital's laundry department, dismissal procedure and a set of special suggestions to parents of child patients.

The guide's concluding statement is, "We want you to feel that this is a hospital and that we are endeavoring to operate it with your welfare always foremost in mind."

Medium Tanks of America Labeled 'Best' for World  
 WASHINGTON, March 13—The War Relocation Authority has found America's medium tanks superior to any in the world, it has been disclosed.

Landon said that the election results of one state don't rule out anyone in the Republican party as the GOP standard bearer.

"But it indicates that Eisenhower is a lot stronger than most people thought," he said.

"His New Hampshire showing puts him in a class by himself. Few men have been able to score such a political victory without a personal campaign."

### Snow Measurements in Forest Show Abundant Water for '52

BURLEY, March 13—Snow measurements over the Minidoka national forest watersheds show an above-average water supply for this season, A. E. Briggs, supervisor, announces. A condition similar to last year in the watershed, he added.

Magie Mountain snow course on the Coosa creek-Rock creek divide shows an average snow depth of 77 inches and a water content of 24.4 inches as compared to 70 inches of snow and 24.8 inches of water in 1951. The six-year water measurement is 19.7 inches. The course was surveyed by Ranger Lewis Clark on March 2.

The Sublett snow course was measured Feb. 28 by Glen Simmons of the bureau, of Pocatello, by using a snowplane, Simmons was able to complete the survey in less than one day. The trip on skis or snowshoes previously required two full days. Measurements indicated 51 inches of snow and 16.2 inches of water as compared to last year's record of 24 inches of snow and 12.3 inches of water. The 11-year average is 10.5 inches of water.

On March 4 a group of men endeavored to reach the Howell canyon snow course by use of a weasel owned by W. H. Thompson. Because of the loose snow, the machine was unable to reach further than the range station. Thompson, Ranger John Tucker and Victor Barrett, both Albion, used skis to reach the course. Other members of the party, Nolan Winward and W. H. Thompson, waited for their return. Hamburgers were fried on a hot rock instead of on the stove in Thompson's summer home cabin as originally planned.

Snow in Howell canyon measured 83 inches with a water content of 29.9 inches as compared to 106 inches of snow and 36.9 inches of water last year. The three-year average is 51.2 inches.

On March 5 and 6 Glen Simmons of the bureau of reclamation and Ranger J. H. Tall, Oakley, and Victor Barrett, both Albion, used skis to reach the course. Other members of the party, Nolan Winward and W. H. Thompson, waited for their return. Hamburgers were fried on a hot rock instead of on the stove in Thompson's summer home cabin as originally planned.

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Measurements gave readings of 68 inches of snow and 24.1 inches of water as compared to last year's measurement of 67 inches of snow and 24.6 inches of water. The five-year average is 14 inches of water.

The snow measurements show that over the Minidoka watersheds, there is an average of 27.7 inches of water as compared to 24.9 inches last year and the long-time average of 14.4 inches." Briggs said. "Since there are approximately 63,000 acres of land on the watersheds there now is approximately 1,760,000 gallons of water stored on the mountains. Some of this water will be lost by evaporation. Some will be used by plants and some will be used by domestic and livestock."

Project Backers Rap Water Right Protection Group

BOISE, March 13—The Idaho-Oregon Hells Canyon association criticizes the formation of a water rights protection committee by the Idaho State Reclamation association.

The association announced appointment of the committee to fight "federal encroachment" on water rights.

A statement issued by George H. Taylor, secretary of the canyon association, said the action "brings into focus the fact that the organization is more concerned over the interests of private power companies than in the irrigation-rights of farmers."

Taylor said the latest reports of the Oregon and Washington public utilities commissions showed Idaho Power company and Washington Water Power company each contributed \$450 to the reclamation association.

He noted that the association did not protest when Idaho Power company filed a water right on 16,000 cubic second feet of Snake river waters, which will be binding against future upstream use of water for irrigation forevermore.

### Farmers Hold First Meeting On Soil Plans

W. A. Loughmiller, chairman of the board of supervisors of the Twin Falls district, has called a district-wide meeting of about 30 farmers to discuss the soil conservation program at the Hollister Orange hall this week.

Conservation surveys made of individual farms in the Hollister Orange area were shown and explained in detail.

Individual farmer interest ran high as each one found out how much "green" or best land he has on his farm as appraised by soil experts from the soil conservation service. The experts work cooperatively with the district.

Quick Method

Tests at the county agricultural laboratory in the hospital is the quick method of learning what factors are adversely affecting crops and soil.

County Agent C. W. Dalgle, however, says on your individual fertilizer tests are very successful because of the huge differences between one field and another. In addition he pointed out past history of crops grown and the management given these crops form the primary basis for fertilizer recommendations.

Surveys Completed

Conservation surveys on 46,830 acres have been completed in the district. Loughmiller says the district's accomplishments.

He said the district's most important program now is to inform residents what has been done and obtain their cooperation for procedure and programs being planned for the future.

"We want all the farmers of our district to be conversant with the Loughmiller stated, "and to use and apply these conservation measures which it is their duty to do."

A film, "Neighbors of the Land," was shown to portray how group work was carried out in midwest soil conservation districts.

The board of supervisors is planning other educational meetings at Rock Creek and Roseworth.

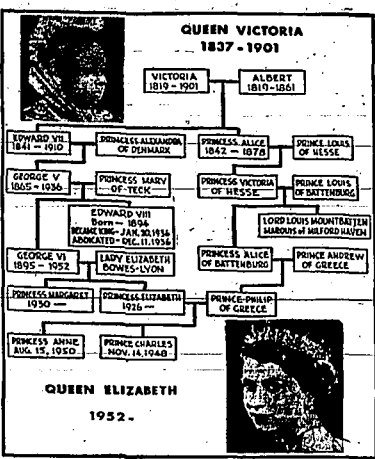

### Irish Have Fine Time Trying To Get Mrs. Shaw's Bequest

DUBLIN, March 13 (U. P.)—It was a great day for the Irish when George Bernard Shaw left \$250,000 to teach them the social graces.

They are flooding the executors with suggestions on how to do it. The executors who have the prickly job of administering the fund set up by the great playwright's wife, are grumpy because just how Irishmen want the money spread around. They flatly characterize some of the suggestions as "crackpots."

So far, requests are docketed from the Irish Republic's two universities, public libraries, vocational education committees, a number of cultural bodies, singers, musicians, building architects, painters, and so on.

The "crackpot" folder kept by the executors at the National City bank of Dublin.

The actual money, incidentally, won't be in the hands of the bank for at least a year. But that isn't discouraging Irishmen with ideas.

The fund was set aside by Mrs. Shaw, who died in 1924, to teach her bearded husband's compatriots self-control, eloquence, deportment, the art of personal contact and social intercourse.

According to a bank official, the letters in the folder are mostly in English and words are smooth as a flight of larks.

In a way, the letters are all pretty much alike, added the spokesman; the writers are all convinced they can set Irish feet back on the road marked out for them by the saints.

That is, of course, if they can just connect with a bit of that money.

The trouble is, the bank officials indicated that the Irish are never small-minded when they're talking about money.

"Even two or three of the claims would eat up the bequest and if we were to meet all the demands so far received we would need four or five times the money available."

Mrs. Shaw, who was Irish on her father's side and wealthy, was once referred to by Shaw as "the green-eyed millionaire."

When Mrs. Shaw's will was published, a British newspaper noted the culture trust fund called for teaching the Irish diction and oratory—"two arts in which by popular repute they already excel."

When suggestions for using the culture fund are coming in from the rear end of the world, too, the bank spokesman said, but he added:

"At the moment no funds are available. We have examined none of the applications as to their merits. They are simply being acknowledged and filed."

### Average Man Takes Red Cross On Faith; Definition Repeated

 NEW YORK, March 13 (AP)—The Red Cross is something the average man takes on faith, just as he does mother love, the wings of an airplane in which he flies.

Unless he is involved in a general calamity, he may never see at first hand what the organization does. But he trusts the "goods" to which it is pledged.

This year the Red Cross in America is trying to raise at least \$85,000,000 to carry out its widening program, which just year included raising 1,000,000 pints of blood.

Just what is the Red Cross? One of the most beautiful definitions was penned long ago by the late James A. Mills, famous Associated Press foreign correspondent. Jim Mills, who died 10 years ago this month, roved five continents in quest of news and was once told by Mahatma Gandhi, "When I enter heaven I expect find you waiting to interview me at the gates."

As a young man Mills served with the Red Cross in seven European countries during and after the first world war. What he saw, then and later, of the organization's international work for the good of mankind led him to write the following tribute to it:

"I am the Red Cross. I was born of the hearts of men. I am sustained by 400,000,000 souls. My mission is of mercy, kindness and charity. My bounds are the limits of the earth. I am my brother's keeper. I know neither color, race nor religion. My creed is the creed of service. My voice is the voice of the American people. My goal is the goal of a higher humanity. My present is the present of God. My

reward is the gratitude of the widow and orphan, of the strong and the sick, of the happy and the bereaved.

"I go forth into the darkness of the night; into the uncertainties of the day. I penetrate the fields of battle—I defy the peril of shell and bullet. I lighten the horrors of the combat. I encourage and inspire the soldier. I give him a thousand comforts. I minister to those he has left at home. I claim the wounded from the battlefield; I bind their wounds and ease their sufferings. I mark the graves of the dead.

"I eradicate epidemics. I am the foe of plague and pestilence. I mitigate the horrors of floods and fires and wrecks. I am the arch-enemy of calamities. I triumph over poverty, want and woe. I hunger. I clothe the naked. I protect the widow and the orphan.

"I am the friend and helper of all nations. My hand and heart encompass the globe. My legionaries march to the uttermost parts of the earth—across the threatened ocean, through war-swept territories, over infested lands. I am the sentinel of the health of the human race. My sympathy and succor are boundless. A dozen nations return me homage; a dozen potentates pay me tribute. The people of the earth offer me their prayers.

"My emblem is the cross—symbol of supreme charity and of the savior of men. Before me, the enemy stays his hand and bows in reverence to my challenge. Behind me march 10,000,000 soldiers, with hearts for any fate. I believe and triumph over death. My strength and struggles are for the living; my prayers and compassion for the dead.

"I am the savior of life, the assuager of death. I am my brother's keeper. I am the Red Cross."
