### U. S. Seeking End of Greek Coalition Rule

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—The state department in an almost unprecedented move is trying to end government by coalition in Greece for the avowed purpose of getting better use of American economic and military aid.

The move may have repercussions elsewhere although officials said today that it is not a precedent for action in other countries.

Regime Unstable

The situation which the United States would like to correct in Greece, where a minority party takes part in coalition rule, may at any time wreck the government, has a parallel in France. The turnover in French governments has in fact been a source of great concern to American officials.

Responsible informants here ruled out any plan for the use of American influence in France to the same end as it is being used in Greece but evidence of U. S. "interference" in affairs of another country—there was a fed flag to politicians and diplomats may stir up interest and debate in countries receiving United States help.

The U. S. enters French affairs, it is charged, because of the U. S. ambassador John G. Periwé made a public statement today that plunges the rift between Premier Nicholas Plastiras and Deputy Premier Sophocles Venizelos over the issue of a new electoral system. Saturday the state department supported Periwé's declaration.

At present Greece has a coalition government set up under a complicated electoral law. Plastiras and other members of his slightly leftist party favor a direct majority system. Venizelos wants a proportional representation system—dividing parliamentary seats according to vote percentages. Plastiras was driving toward his goal when he had a paralytic stroke Monday. Venizelos, a right wing politician, tried to push through a law providing for his proportional system.

It was at this point that Periwé issued a statement supporting Plastiras and opposing Venizelos. Proportional representation, he said, would cause continuous government instability and have "disastrous effect upon efficient use of American aid to Greece."

Saturday the cabinet issued a statement saying that the American government was naturally interested in the best use of American aid but that the Greek government and people would decide "which electoral system—Greece is to be governed by."

State department officials had no quarrel with that. It is only when both Periwé and the cabinet view that the matter is one for Government decision. What was emphasized, that if the Greeks made such a decision as will continue or increase the instability of the government, then the United States will have to determine whether its money to help Greece is to be "wasted."

"It scares you the way they have everything worked out," Rayborn said. "They pronounced it cleverly prepared and aimed at the working man." He said communists plan to get rid of the government by election and election, not by force.

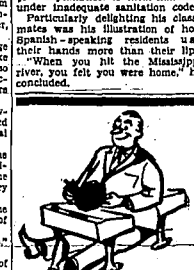

### Man Weights Self; Jumps in River at A. F.

AMERICAN FALLS, March 15.—An Aberdeen area farmer committed suicide here Friday afternoon by stepping off the flanging bridge over American Falls rapids with a rope and rock tied around his neck. He has been identified as William (Bill) Black, about 50.

Several fishermen saw Black walk out about 100 feet on the bridge carrying a rope tied around his neck. They kidded him about the "flanging" before they realized his intentions. He stepped off the bridge in 14 feet of water.

Deputy Sheriff William Hoehman and a volunteer crew attempted to find Black with grappling hooks but were unsuccessful. He stepped off the bridge about 4 p.m. but it was seven hours later that his body was recovered 100 feet downstream where it was carried by the current.

Employees at the power plant were unable to shut off the water in the forebay because of a power failure at Grand Coulee dam. At 10 p.m., however, the water flow was stopped and the search crew was able to walk into the forebay to recover Black's body.

The victim had been in ill health for some time, according to friends. He had farmed near Aberdeen for 25 years and recently had been in California. He had been planning to leave for Alaska in a few days with friends.

Mr. Black was a veteran of World war I. He is survived by a sister living in Aberdeen, Mrs. Pete Kirby, and other brothers and sisters.

HEYBURN, March 15.—Approximately 40 pictures have been catalogued to date for the Heyburn art exhibit which is opening Sunday in the school auditorium. More paintings will be received later in the week.

Artists whose exhibits already have been received are Olaf Miller, Rupert; LeRoy E. Green, Billings, Mont.; Irene Buckley, Albion; George J. Dunphy, Salt Lake City; Laura M. Bellville, Cincinnati, O.; Michael Cannon, Salt Lake City; Elizabeth Blindee, Burley; Jack Vige, Salt Lake City; Nell Kilgore, Preston; O. Conrad Schwiering, Jackson, Wyo.; Garnet W. Jex, Arington, Va.; and Clara Mary Ten Ha, College of St. Mary's of the Wash-ton, Salt Lake City. Other entrants are anticipated.

The exhibit will open at 2 p.m. and will be open every afternoon, except Saturdays, until March 20. It will be open Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Conducted tours for groups of 12 to 20 will be made, other than on Sundays.

Ladies' day will be observed the first Thursday at which time Heyburn women will be in charge of the program. The first Friday night, March 20 has been set aside for annual day with Lund Christensen, principal of Heyburn grade school, in charge of the program. Numbers will be presented by various high schools in the vicinity. On this day there will be a business meeting of

Heyburn Alumni association at 2 p.m. In the past years, alumni have come from California, Utah and northern Idaho.

Five of paintings will be emphasized this year. The number of exhibits has been increasing in the last few years because of the low sales of paintings. Of the 30 exhibits last year, only four were sold.

Irene Buckley will be in charge of sales this year. Only exhibits meeting professional standards are hung during an exhibit. Quality, the quantity, of work is demanded.

The Heyburn art exhibit dates back to March, 1923. That first year 114 paintings by 19 artists from only Utah and Idaho were exhibited in a small combination auditorium- gymnasium on the second floor of the high school building located in a town which 30 years before had been a metropolis. In 1933 it seemed tucked between two larger communities that had thrived at its expense.

The driving force behind the art show was J. M. Whiting, superintendent of Heyburn schools from 1923 to 1940. Before coming to Heyburn, he had been associated with Pocatello, Idaho, where the nationally recognized Springville art exhibit was held. Recognizing the cultural benefits of such a project, Whiting wanted to bring those benefits into Heyburn.

Capable of handling the business and advertising end of the project, he recognized his inadequate background in the field of art handling. In 1928 he started a program.

A young artist, Olaf Moller, recently had returned to his home town, Rupert, from the east, where he had attended school for many years. Whiting explained his project to Moller and immediately received the artist's professional advice and assistance.

During the years that followed the inception of the exhibit, Moller extended the list of exhibitors through his personal and professional contacts with other artists.

As well as his former eastern acquaintances, the artist became personally acquainted with artists travelling through the Teton National park as the painter's summer paradise, where Moller had a summer studio. These people responded to the spirit of a community that was small but still big-spirited. Cooperating with zest, these artists sought the cooperation of others from their own localities until the catalogue of exhibiting artists came

to represent most of the states in the United States. It was the desire of Whiting to start a collection of paintings for Heyburn and each year at least one artist, cooperating with the exhibit committee, was to be selected to put their prices to fit the school's budget and many artists presented paintings as gifts to the school. The Heyburn permanent collection now includes 40 paintings, the largest privately owned collection in Idaho.

The financing of this annual art exhibit and permanent art collection is made possible by the art fund to which Burley, Rupert, Paul and Heyburn contribute. Merchants in these communities purchase advertising space in a printed program that lists the activities of an exhibit.

The exhibit has become an anticipated annual event not only by the people of Heyburn but by residents within several hundred miles of Heyburn.

Each year, four evening programs of outstanding quality are presented free of charge. The best talent for miles around is sought for the programs. Having built a reputation for fine entertainment consisting of music, drama and dancing, along with the art exhibit, these festivals find the auditorium packed to capacity each year.

Those in charge of the program this year are Mrs. Dell Holmes, general chairman; Mrs. Boone Eyle and Mrs. Ernest Erwin, co-chairmen; Louis Mathias, communications; Leo Handy and Mrs. Walt Nelson, receptionists; Keith Merrill, receiving and handling; Lund Christensen, program; Albert Craven, alumni night chairman; and Howard Mathias, advisory and photography.

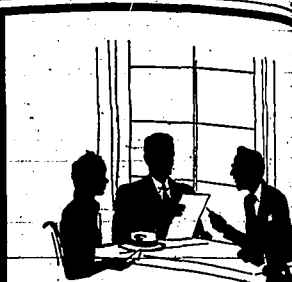

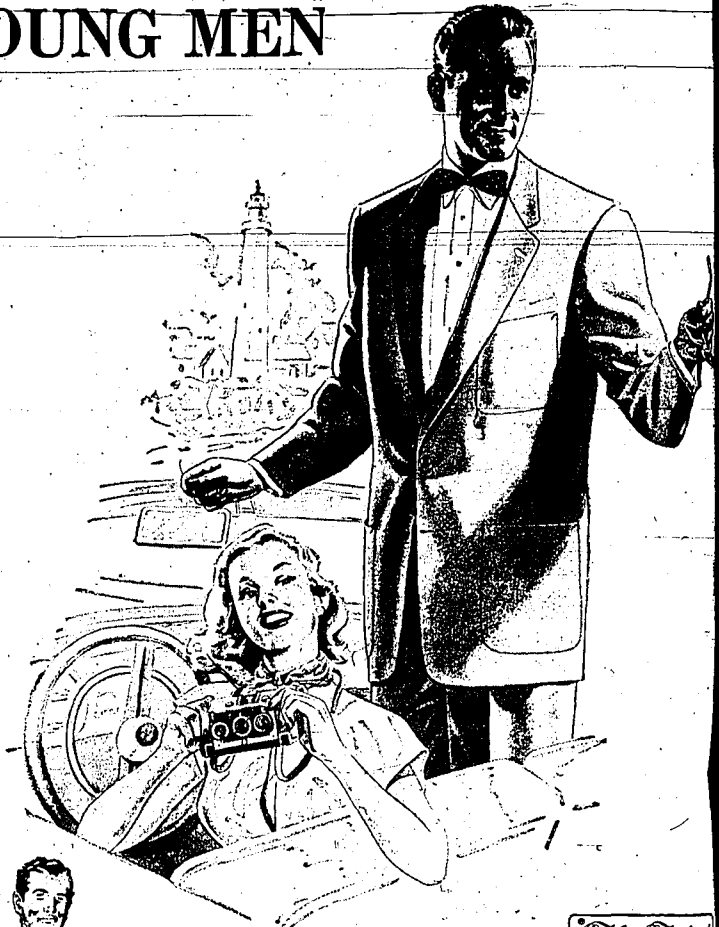

### Mercury Now In Best Place For Observer

By J. HUGH FREEST  
Astronomer, Extension Division  
Oregon Higher Education System

The little planet Mercury has inspired annual discussions in this column at about this time of year almost without fail since 1914. The reason is that many persons, even those well along in life, are sure they have never spotted this little messenger of the gods of ancient mythology; and further, that he flies most boldly in the western twilight at this season, and for only a comparatively short time in succession.

Most of the year Mercury is so nearly in the direction of the sun that he is lost in its brilliant rays. This year he is in the best position for evening observation during this present week. He will be farthest east of the sun on March 15, but is somewhat brighter at present than then. During the next few evenings our little planet will set at almost one and one-half hours after the sun, so the observer should begin to scan the darkening skies much earlier than this.

Mercury will be sinking into the horizon almost due west and will excel in brightness everything in the entire lower western sky with the exception of brilliant Jupiter. In fact, the two are now only five degrees apart and present a very fine combination. The separation will be slightly less as the week advances. This proximity to Jupiter will point out the location of Mercury most easily.

Now for a few astronomical facts about this tiny little world. Mercury is the smallest of the nine principal planets, with a diameter of 3,100 miles as compared with 7,926 for our earth. His orbit is the nearest to the sun of any of the regular planets, and a round trip requires only 88 days compared with the year for our earth. Next out from the sun comes Venus and the earth. Because of Mercury's relatively small orbit inside the earth's path, he always appears to us in the general direction of the sun.

Mercury is best seen in the eastern dawn at certain times in the fall. The fact that he was sometimes seen in the western twilight and at other times in the dawn

Likely Mercury keeps one side constantly toward the sun as does our moon toward the earth. It seems there can be little atmosphere present and that the side toward the sun is extremely torrid—but enough to melt lead. All water would boil away, Deans has said, "if there are rivers on Mercury, they are rivers of lead."

If clear skies prevail during the next few days, do not fail to look for Mercury as he glides down the western twilight.
